Did you know that in May 2010, half a million nonprofits could find themselves stripped of their exempt status. The IRS estimates that is the number of small organizations that have failed to file a Form 990-N. Small clubs with gross receipts under \$25,000 can simply go online and file Form 990-N. There are no amounts required.

All you have to do is provide a contact person, mailing address and check a box saying the organization is still alive.

So BE SMART and get your records up to date and file the required tax returns before you lose your tax-exempt status.

Greetings Dear Lion,

As you gather this holiday season with your family and friends, I ask that you take a moment to reflect on all the good work LCIF has done worldwide over the last year. Together, we have brought joy and happiness to so many



people who would have otherwise gone without. I would like to share a story about how Lions' good will has changed the life of a little girl from Texas and her family.

Good will in Texas, USA

Emelly was born with a chromosome disorder that resulted in her being intellectually disabled, unable to move and afflicted regular with seizures, she was unable to sit upright and indicated little, or no, awareness of activity or people.

With grant funding made possible from LCIF, Emelly attended a program at the Houston Therapeutic Equestrian Centers, whose mission is to improve the quality of life for people with disabilities through therapeutic horseback riding and related activities.

Since participating in the therapeutic riding program, Emelly has developed sufficient strength to sit upright. Her breathing has improved and the seizures are much less frequent.

"We're so grateful to the Houston East End Lions in Texas who helped make this program possible for our darling Emelly. I know that Lions do so much to help children," said Maria, Emelly's mother. "It really is difficult to describe the benefits of the therapy, but quality of life for Emelly and all our family members, has improved so much. We anticipate continued improvement with this invaluable therapy."

You have the power to help us help many more people this coming year.

In appreciation of the holiday spirit, Maureen and I are making a personal contribution to LCIF to help those in need worldwide. We ask that each of you consider helping someone during this season of giving, as many of you have done before.

ORIENTATION <u>PLUS</u> NEW MEMBER LIONS' GOALS

We are at the half way point in this Lions' year. I can't tell you what our MD-18 membership retention loss will look like, but I do know that after five months, i.e., November 2009, we have lost a total of 1330 (20%) of our Lions. Indeed, since the monthly loss rate has been increasing every month, 6.4% of our members in November, I'm inclined to predict that we'll have lost over 25% of our members by the end of last year. I'd be delighted to not see this happen, but I'll know fairly soon and let you know next month in your District Bulletin.

The question I have for you is the same question I will repeatedly ask you: What is your club doing to help stop this significant loss of members every month? And, no, I am not asking you whether you are recruiting new members! Recruiting new members is extremely important, but my focus is exclusively on retention. Although the membership loss I report each month is an MD-18 retention rate loss, the fact is that it really is an individual club by club loss of members that is the retention problem. What is your club doing to retain the members you currently have and to retain the new Lions you recruit?

In the past two District Bulletins I have singled out two actions. The first action I mentioned was that after you have inducted your new member or members, you need to provide a Lions' Orientation Program. New Lions need to fully understand and internally support what it is that Lion Clubs do locally and world wide. The second thing I singled out was more leadership related. That is, who is responsible for ensuring that a club's orientation action is routinely done? In this case I noted that a few years ago LCI created an elected Membership Committee structure, which includes a Retention Chairperson. If your club only has a Membership Chair, then this Lion is also your Retention Chair. However, if you don't have a three person elected Membership Committee, then you need to add this to your up-coming elections.

In the next <u>State Lions Newspaper</u>, you will find that in addition to a Lions Club Orientation Program, I have identified eight more club actions to reduce the loss of members. Over the next several months I will be discussing these actions. However, Action # 2 is very simple and could easily be a part of your Orientation Program. This action requires that you ask each new Lion what he or she wants to do as a member of your club? After you ask the question, record it, and then pass it on to your club president and your retention chair. Implementing this action requires that a club allow its new members to accomplish the community service they want to do as a Lion. Why is this important? Behavioral science research has discovered that volunteers who do not get an opportunity to accomplish their club goals will likely leave a club. Matching Lion goals to Lion Club actions should increase the retention of Lions.

THE CONTINUING SAGA OF MEMBERSHIP!

It is hard to believe that it is the middle of December. Our Lions year is almost one-half over. Remember those goals that were established by each District Governor at the beginning of his/her term of office? Well, I guess they are kind of like New Year's resolutions—easy to make, and hard to follow through with. But the difference with the goals is that they are not just for the DGs who made them, they are for all of us. And our District Governors need all of our help to reach those goals.

At the end of November, District A was at 1,340 members—a decrease of 10. This is after an increase of 15 during the month of October. District B was a plus 28—bringing them up to 1,145. Keep it up! District C is at 1,019. The new clubs are helping, but the drops continue. District D is up 15 to 1,109. Way to go, District D! District E had a plus 3, but are still only at 954, and have quite a way to go to reach that magic 1,250! District F remains at 1,077. As a whole, the Multiple District is now at 6,644.

What is the importance of these numbers? They reflect the efforts of the clubs to increase the ability of Lions to provide needed services in their communities. If each of the 244 clubs in Georgia added only one member each, what a wonderful thing that would be, and what a way to make a difference in the community.

Every District has a MERL team that is ready and willing to help any and every club within their district to strengthen their existing clubs, to branch out, and to start new clubs. With the help of Guiding Lions, every club, every District, and the entire Multiple District has the opportunity to Move to Grow.

If you do not know how to improve your club or your District, contact your MERL team members, or contact me. We are all ready and willing to do whatever it takes to make MD 18 a better and stronger place to be. And if you have been successful in helping your club or your District to grow, share your secrets of success with others. That is what Lionism is all about.





White Cane: It's not just bucket drives anymore!

Curtis Thompson lost his job as a skilled craftsman due to his deteriorating eyesight. He later discovered his vision problems were caused by cataracts, but he could not afford surgery unless he returned to work, and he couldn't return to work until he had the surgery. Seemingly trapped, Curtis turned to the Lighthouse for help. He was back to his job soon after the surgery was complete.

More than 1,500 Georgians lost their health coverage each week of this year, and your Lighthouse is one of the few places they can turn for sight-saving surgeries. We rely on the White Cane fundraisers held by the Lions clubs of Georgia to support the eye surgery program.

The traditional method of fundraising through bucket drives is becoming more difficult each year. Fewer people are out buying, and those who are shopping don't carry cash as often. A number of clubs have found alternative ways to fundraise. They are recycling soda cans and bottles, writing and hand-delivering letters to small businesses, hosting pancake breakfasts and barbecues, putting on car shows, and ushering at local sporting events. The Tifton Lions Club put in a lot of work and pulled off a very successful male beauty pageant (see previous page).

Not only do White Cane activities help the Lighthouse, they also provide an avenue for spreading the word about the amazing work Lions do in the community. In addition, they are a great opportunity to get new club members actively involved in Lionism.





WHITE CANE EMPHASIS IS APRIL, but don't wait until then to start planning your club's participation. A few clubs report they are too small, or they are rebuilding, or not sure how to hold a White Cane Drive. NO club is too small (or too large) to participate. A White Cane Drive can be a terrific incentive for a rebuilding club. So how about some ideas on how to begin or improve your club's efforts.

Here are some ideas:

- * Place plastic jars on check-out counters of convenience and fast food stores. This could be done 4-6 weeks in April and can be handled by 1 or 2 Lions. Special jar lids and decals are available through White Cane Days, Inc.
- * Write letters to businesses of your community soliciting donations. Then follow up with a personal visit.
- * Hold a pancake breakfast, chili supper, chicken BBQ, or other project designated for White Cane.
- * Get publicity through having a community leader (mayor, administrator, or commissioner) sign a proclamation declaring your club's White Cane Drive and publishing it in your local newspaper.
- * If you have a Wal-Mart, K-Mart, Kroger's, or some other large retail outlet, approach management about a matching grant for White Cane.
- * Utilize your White Cane efforts to educate your community about the Georgia Lions Lighthouse in general, and your club in particular. You may be able to recruit a few new members.

Leader Dogs for the Blind Receives the Alfred P. Sloan Award

Leader Dog is proud to be a 2009 recipient of the Alfred P. Sloan Award for Business Excellence in Workplace Flexibility. This prestigious award recognizes employers across the country that are successfully using flexibility to meet both business and employee goals.

Applicants are measured against national data from the Families and Work Institute's National Study of Employers in the areas of workplace flexibility programs, policies and culture. Those ranking in the top 20% become finalists and an extensive survey on the organizations practices is sent to all employees. Winners are chosen based on a combined score of both employer and employee survey responses.

Some of the practices that lead Leader Dog to receive the award are:

- o Many team members choose their own starting and quitting times and flex their daily work hours and weekly work schedules.

Rejected. With good intentions etched into every ounce of his puppy body, Finn still managed to start out on the wrong paw. He was dismissed from another assistance dog program due to a dental problem that kept him from doing some essential tasks—like plucking a dropped credit card off the floor.

Finn proved himself to be fearless and sportsmanlike as he learned that soccer balls on the field

"My Eyes. My best friend. My inspiration."



The connection is obvious. You see it in the young man's face and in his long, sensitive fingers stroking the head of the big yellow dog. And you see it in the dog's body pressed against his master's leg, and in his alert expression with eyes scanning his environment, ready for anything. 'Finn is my eyes, inspiration, the other half of my heart," Fernando Benitez says. 'He completes me, and, together, we're going to experience a new life."

For Fernando, that new life means more freedom. Increased independence. Getting places faster than he could with a cane. For Finn, that new life means learning the hilly streets of Xalapa, Mexico, and Fernando's far-from-routine life as a university student, concert pianist and composer.

This is the next chapter in Finn's life, a life made possible by supporters like you.

Fernando has wanted a Leader Dog since, as a 12-year-old, he watched an older friend with a dog guide. 'I was amazed she could say, 'Find the door,' and her dog would. And she walked so fast with her dog." 'He will make it possible to do all I've dreamed of. We are inseparable. Finn's unconditional love for me fills up an empty space in my heart."

Finn will help Fernando do his shopping. Travel between home and class. And accompany him as he plays at night in local jazz clubs. 'The people at Leader Dog are the best," Fernando enthuses. 'They have given me eyes, and an opportunity to be in charge of my life." We believe that everyone who needs a Finn should get one. Everyone deserves the opportunity to be in charge of their own lives—lives full of freedom and mobility. We have a 70-year commitment to respecting people and dogs, and ensuring that thousands of them get to build fuller lives together. Fernando has waited for Finn since he was 12, and the power of their new relationship is undeniable. Fernando says Finn completes him. "He can retrieve my phone and other dropped items, pull my wheelchair and open doors for me," she continues.

Wallis has a condition known as dystonia, a disease that causes her muscles to spasm spontaneously. She was at the pharmacy when a "dystonic attack" came on and she could not move. Caspin helped her pay the cashier, get the bag from the cashier and gracefully exit the store.

Wallis wanted to learn more about a career in the assistance dog world, and is currently participating in a summer internship at Canine Companions headquarters in Santa Rosa, CA.

Robin knew an assistance dog would help her son Braden, challenged with autism. She contacted several organizations who expected her to do a great deal of fundraising before receiving a dog.

"I had basically given up hope, then I learned that Canine Companions for Independence was training dogs for autistic children," says Robin.

In May 2007 Robin and Braden graduated from Team Training with Skilled Companion Camille, free of charge and free of fundraising. Since then, Camille has changed Braden's life.

"Braden is much more social, calmer in public, and is developing empathy," Robin continues. "Camille gives Braden acceptance and love, without expecting him to be like everyone else."

Diabetes on the Rise in U.S

A new Gallup-Healthways Well-Being Index survey found that cases of diabetes are rapidly increasing in the United States, with the disease now affecting 11.3 percent of U.S. adults, up from 10.4 percent in the first quarter of 2008.

The survey found that approximately 26 million people in the U.S. have diabetes, and if the trend continues more than 37 million people will be living with the disease by the end of 2015. The survey also found that the U.S. obesity rate is up about 1 percent over last year. People who are obese are almost three times as likely to be diagnosed with diabetes than those who are not obese, according to the survey. "The upward trends in obesity rates almost certainly play a substantive role in the increase in diabetes rates over the same time period," the survey's report says.

Between January and September 2009, the Gallup-Healthways survey also found a significantly higher incidence of diabetes among those who did not exercise at least a half hour on any given day in the previous week. The survey found that 8 percent of people with diabetes exercised at least 30 minutes a day four to six times per week, 9.5 percent exercised at least half an hour daily in the previous week, and 15 percent did not exercise at least 30 minutes in the week before they were surveyed. The 10 states with the highest increases in obesity from 2008 to 2009 also had a related 0.5 percent increase in diabetes incidence.

Diabetes Drug Helps Obese Adults Lose Weight

Obese adults may shed more weight with the diabetes drug liraglutide than with the weight-loss drug orlistat (Xenical, Alli), suggests a study in The Lancet this week. The finding that liraglutide was superior to orlistat was "unexpected," Dr. Arne Astrup, from the University of Copenhagen, Denmark, told Reuters Health.

Until now, liraglutide has only been tested for its blood sugarlowering abilities in people with type 2 diabetes. "This is the first state of the art trial to test its weight loss properties" in obese adults without diabetes, Astrup said.

The biggest findings with liraglutide, Astrup said, were the "clear-cut" dose-response relationship with weight loss (the higher the dose, the greater the weight loss), "the nice reduction in blood pressure, and the "cure" of patients with "pre-diabetes" - that is, poor blood sugar control not yet bad enough to qualify as diabetes.

In the study, 564 obese adults without diabetes were randomly assigned to receive liraglutide at one of four doses (1.2, 1.8, 2.4, or 3.0 milligrams), placebo, or orlistat (120 milligrams). Liraglutide and placebo were given once daily as an injection, while orlistat was given three times a day in pill form.

All participants in the study increased their physical activity throughout the trial and followed a calorie-restricted diet, which contained approximately 500 calories less than they needed each day.

People who took liraglutide lost significantly more weight than people who took placebo or orlistat, Astrup and colleagues found. Liraglutide contains a satiety hormone that helps curb appetite. Average weight loss with the lowest liraglutide dose (1.2 mg) was 4.8 kilograms (10.6 pounds); with 1.8 mg liraglutide, subjects lost an average of 5.5 kg (12.1 pounds); with 2.4 and 3.0 mg liraglutide, subjects lost an average of 6.3 kg (13.9 pounds) and 7.2 kg (15.8 pounds), respectively.

This compares with an average weight loss of only 2.8 kg (6.2 pounds) with placebo and 4.1 kg (9 pounds) with orlistat. Moreover, 76 percent of subjects taking the highest dose of liraglutide lost more than 5 percent of their body weight compared with only 30 percent on placebo and 44 percent on orlistat. Liraglutide also lowered blood pressure at all doses.

At the start of the study, about a third of subjects in each group were considered "pre-diabetic." At the higher doses, liraglutide cut the number of pre-diabetics significantly -- by 84 to 96 percent. Nausea and vomiting were reported more often with liraglutide than with placebo, but side effects were usually transient and seldom led to discontinuation of treatment.

Astrup, who is a member of the Liraglutide Obesity Advisory Board of Novo Nordisk, the company developing the drug, noted that "liraglutide has to pass phase III trials before it can reach the market in the coming years. However, the drug is available for the treatment of type 2 diabetes in Europe."

Dr. George A. Bray, from Louisiana State University, Baton Rouge, comments in a related editorial: "Whether long-term use of an injectable drug is palatable as a treatment for obesity is yet to be established."

_Provide opportunities for interaction between children and the elderly so that both groups can learn to communicate across generations.

- _ Teach children simple life skills such as how to make a sandwich, fry an egg, make a bed, or clean the dishes.
- _ Give children an allowance to teach them how to manage money.
- _ Ask a child for his or her opinion.
- _ Share stories from your life with a child.
- _ Donate your old eyeglasses to the Lighthouse.

Lions Services for Children Projects

The problems children face vary in degree from country to country, but the need for health and education services is constant and universal. Lions clubs help address these needs by developing projects with specific, attainable goals, including:

- Collecting food, clothes or books
- Organizing a vision or hearing screening
- Providing immunizations through a vaccination drive
- Starting a literacy program with a local school, library, community center or <u>Leo</u> <u>club</u>
- Supporting a nutritional program for undernourished children
- Securing wheelchairs for disabled children
- Sending a child with diabetes or physical challenges to a specialized camp

Lions have also constructed hospitals, schools, orphanages and children's centers throughout the world to serve youth in need.

- Live with a family in another country
- Meet people your age from around the world
- Learn about the bonds we all share and the differences we respect in each other no matter where we live

Youth Camp and Exchange Types

An **Exchange** can be arranged in hundreds of countries and geographic locations where there are Lions clubs. Most exchanges last between four and six weeks during which the participants (ages 15-21) stay with one or more host families in another country.

Camps are one or two weeks long and bring together young people (ages 16-22) from around the world. Camps usually include a family stay that lasts between one and four weeks. More than 100 Lions camps are held each year in about 39 countries. Activities include visits to places of cultural or natural interest, sporting events and country presentations by the camp participants.

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Welcome to Liberty Day!

Liberty Day is a program for our youth. It is a way to strength citizenship in our youth through a program based on the Constitution of the United States. This is a program started by the Lions Clubs of Denver. Georgia adopted this program in the late 1990s.

There are several ways a Lions Club can sponsor a Liberty Day program. The first way is through a school program. Lions Clubs should arrange a speaker who would be interesting to the students. This speaker could be an elected official or someone who could speak on the rights and responsibilities of citizens as granted by the Constitution.

Once you have your speaker, you can receive permission of the school system to sponsor a Liberty Day event to a class or a group of students. I have found that 8th grade and up is ideal. Then order the number of Liberty Day booklets you need from me. The cost is \$.60 each and includes shipping.

Also work with the teachers) so that they reinforce what the speaker has said through an essay or other classroom work. The students could even write a letter of thanks to the speaker / Lions Club on the subject. Another project is with a Boy Scout troop. Boy Scouts must earn the Citizenship in the Nation merit badge as a requirement for rank promotion. Again, use the speaker and the booklets. The Liberty Day project has been endorsed by the National Council of the Boy Scouts of America. A third project is when a group of youth work a project in a public place to promote the Constitution. There are a series of questions that they can use. They would ask an adult the question-- whether it is right or wrong, the adult receives either a flag pin or flag sticker. The booklets are used to coach the youth on the Constitution so that they are more confident in asking the questions as they know the answers themselves. They should work under the guidance of adults and in a place that has given permission for them to be there.
