Even though we have two new clubs in the District, we must continue to build our existing clubs. I was encouraged by a meeting held by Zone Chair Pete Stamsen with his Club Presidents and Membership Chairs. This was a brainstorming session to determine how to recruit new members for our clubs in our Zone. It was a great meeting with many new ideas.

It was decided that we will hold a Zone-wide Orientation session on March 27th. I would encourage all our other Zone Chairs to hold their own sessions like this. We must stop the loss of our members and get some new Lions involved. Each club must decide if they will keep on losing members or whether they will get involved and help grow their club.

The Georgia Lions Lighthouse held their winter meeting January 23rd. We heard from people who had received help from the Lighthouse. The highlight of the meeting was the Capital Campaign Kick-Off. I was also honored to be named a Trustee for the Lighthouse.

The winter meeting of the Georgia Lions Camp for the Blind will be held February 6-7 in Warner Robins. Don't forget to send your raffle ticket stubs and money to PDG Thois Masters. The Camp needs our support also. Plan to attend the meeting and learn what is going on at our Camp.

We have another opportunity to build our leadership skills at the Southeast Lions Leadership Institute. It will be held at Hickory Nob State Park at McCormick, SC April 15-18, 2010. Federation Lions recently received an honorable recognition for outstanding service in diabetes from the International Diabetes Federation (IDF). At the 20th World Diabetes Congress in October, the IDF presented an award to Lions Clubs International during the General Council assembly of its more than 200 member associations representing more than 160 countries. The award formally recognizes Lions Clubs International for its consideration of

diabetes as a growing global concern.

Lions Again Challenged to be Knights of the Blind

Helen Keller described Braille as "The Magic Wand of the Blind." In keeping with her challenge to be Knights of the Blind, Lions have an important responsibility to support Braille literacy. According to the National Federation of the Blind (NFB), there is a Braille literacy crisis in the United States. Although Braille is vital to all blind individuals, today only 10 percent of blind children in America are learning to read Braille in school. Braille literacy is the key to employment and full participation in society.

The NFB is raising awareness of this issue through a Braille literacy campaign, and the sale of a commemorative 2009 Louis Braille Bicentennial Silver Dollar. Greetings Dear Lion,

Maureen and I have just returned from Haiti where we led a team of Lions and Leos to distribute relief supplies. It brought tears to our eyes to witness the despair of the people, but Lions are committed to meeting these needs in the days and years ahead.



I'd like to first thank all of you for your tremendous generosity. Lions Hope for Haiti mobilized more than US\$1.5 million. By the time you receive this message, I'm sure it will be even more.

While in Haiti, we met with local Lions to discuss immediate needs and long-term reconstruction. They appointed a committee and are discussing long-term relief efforts.

The Foundation is partnering with the Lions of Sweden to provide 200 large tents to house those who are now homeless as well as relief workers. Haitian Lions established three tent cities in the Port au Prince area, where they are focusing their immediate relief efforts. This weekend, Lions delivered additional relief supplies from the Dominican Republic.

We have launched a Haiti section on the Lions Web site, with photos, video and other news. As we receive additional information, we will continue to add it to the http://lionsclubs.org/EN/lci-foundation/haiti-relief/index.php.

Zone Chairperson William Eliacin's initial desperation turned to hope and gratitude for the people of Haiti when he learned of the great outpouring of support from Lions around the world.

He said, "We want to show the Lions and the Haitian people in general that the Lions Club is an extraordinary organization, that we are here and that our motto is, "We Serve". We serve our peers, we serve our brothers who are in need. That is why we are here. So I am appealing to you. You can count on us to achieve as much as we

can with your contribution to help those who are in need."



These reports were developed to assist District Governors in assessing current membership status and to help guide decisions on whether to continue with current growth plans or rethink and reorganize for more positive results.

and new club consultants are ready to help your district in forming new clubs and club branches - so sign up now for a workshop if you haven't done so already.

GETTING TO KNOW TO OTHER LIONS

As you may recall, I made a loss prediction of 25% for the Lions of Georgia at the half way point of our Lions year. I was slightly wrong: the loss is actually 27.4% (1825 members). And, yes, the loss of members increased to 7.4% for the month of December. How do we reduce this loss of members in our clubs and possibly your club?

To date I have discussed two related club actions: (1) making certain that new members receive Lions' Orientation and (2) that the activity goals of these new Lions are matched with the activities of the club they joined. New club members need to understand what your club does and what we jointly do as Lions. If this does not happen, they are likely to no longer remain Lions. In reverse, a club needs to know what new members want to accomplish as a Lions. If new Lions can't pursue their goals, then they are likely to become retention drop outs.

The third club action I am going to discuss now concerns the connection between a new Lion and his or her sponsor as well as the other members of the club this new member joined. Who recruited your new members? As all Lions know, they are most of the time the club sponsors. However, what is the relationship between the sponsor and the new Lion? Is the new Lion a relative, personal friend, co-worker, fellow church member, neighbor, etc., of their sponsor? Are there any similar relationships between the new member and other members of your club?

The strength and type of relationship between a new member and their sponsor is related to the retention of this new Lion. Sponsors need to strengthen their relationship to a new Lion if he or she is going to continue to be a member of your club. Yes, this does mean that a Lion Sponsor will have to slightly modify their club behavior a bit to ensure that a new member is talked to, sat with at meetings, etc. Similarly, it is important for new members to develop solid relationships with other members of a club. We often say that it is important to get new members involved in club activities quickly. One of the key reasons this is an important club action is that it encourages new members to become linked to current members of a club. Lions with good relations with multiple members of a club are more likely to remain members.

My discussion of retention actions has been focused on actions we should be doing with the new members to keep them as Lions. However, many of these actions can also help us keep current members. Current members may not need orientation, but are their goals need to match what they are doing for your club. Equally or perhaps even more important, is the strength of the relationships between current members. Members who end up becoming weakly connected to other Lions are likely to drop out

Family Membership. Looking for special programs and activities you can do with your family? A family membership allows relatives to volunteer together at a reduced dues rate. Family members must meet membership requirements, live in the same household and belong to the same club. Children cannot become members, but can participate in age-appropriate activities and attend club meetings. Tell the club you are joining you want to join as a family.

How can my family join a Lions club?

Clubs are always looking for people who want to make a difference in their community. Contact your local Lions club or tell a Lion that you would like to attend a meeting or help out with a service project to learn more. Or, join with family and friends who share your interests and want to meet needs in your community to start a Lions club. Consider starting a club at your workplace or a club of people with similar interests, such as families from your children's school or those who are active in sports or music. If your parents and family members of friends live at a retirement center, consider starting a club there—it will be a great way to get multiple generations to have fun together while helping others.

What will it cost in time and money to be a Lion?

Most Lions clubs meet once or twice a month but many have flexible formats and schedules. Since you will be volunteering with your family, this will be time spent together with your children, parents, brothers and sisters or other family members.

You can commit as much time as you wish and as your schedule allows.

There is a one-time entry fee and modest yearly dues. Lions are the first volunteer service organization to offer a reduced family dues plan. You can learn more on the Lions Clubs International Web site. Young people under the age of majority can't become official Lions members, but family clubs welcome them and provide special activities for children.

This is another way of getting Lions in your club, new members and prospective members interested in doing something new and different. Getting involved is another word for **WE SERVE**.



Certain things can happen when your Lions Club gets involved. If we have to find something new – go for it – because the more we raise – the more we can give. Also, the more members who get involved also create a bundle of fun and more money raised. The information that appears may benefit another club – for here is where we get ideas and we might be able to use those ideas within your own club.

Lion Bill told us about his experiences with blindness and how training and technology allow him to continue a "normal" life style. He related his recent experience at the Veteran's Blind Rehabilitation Center. The main purpose of the VA Blind Rehab Center (BRC) is to give the veteran the training, techniques and tools (3T's) to allow the veterans to live as normal a life as possible. Most veterans are not totally blind, but have some very limited sight capability. Rarely is a person only problem blindness. Blindness is frequently caused by diabetes, stroke, kidney failure or other medical reason. The 3T's are divided into four areas: "Orientation and Mobility" is focused on allowing the blind person to be able to move about with limited or no assistance. "Visual Skills" gives the veteran the 3T's to make use of the limited vision they have. "Learning Skills" gives the veteran the 3T's to cope with everyday life. "Manual Skills" is designed to give the veteran practice with manual dexterity and to build confidence. He said one of the main problems he experienced was in locating information on what is available to help blind people. Lion Bill said he hopes to publish information on our Toccoa Lions Club Website that will help others with sights loss.

Successful Letter-Writing Campaigns

Lions Clubs participate in White Cane as a way of supporting your Lighthouse's eye surgery program. The traditional method of fundraising is a Bucket Drive, but the poor economy and the move away from carrying cash make these drives increasingly difficult. In an effort to increase funds raised and provide more surgeries for Georgians in need, many clubs are moving away from Bucket Drives, or adding other fundraisers.

A few Lions Clubs have been very successful with letter writing campaigns. They do take advanced preparation, but there is no standing in the cold! In preparing for the campaign, every member of their clubs made a list of 10-15 influential people they knew, and 10-15 companies they thought should receive a letter. One member of the club compiled that information on a spreadsheet, and noted who submitted which names. The letters were then mail merged, printed onto Lions Club letterhead, and brought to a club meeting. The person who submitted each name included a short, hand-written note such as, "I hope you can support this wonderful cause!" When possible, the letters were hand delivered. Individual Lions also followed up 2 weeks after delivery.

While the compilation of names, hand-written notes, and individual follow-up makes the letter-writing campaign more complex than simply sending form letters and waiting for a reply, it is also much more effective. The clubs who put the extra effort into their campaigns raised \$5,000-\$10,000, without the stress of having to hold a major event.

If your club would like to hold a letter writing campaign, you will find sample ask and thank you letters, as well as a step-by-step guide to the process in the new White Cane Packet. The packet will be available at the January Conference, and it will be mailed shortly afterward to the clubs that did not receive one at the meeting.

White Cane: It's not just bucket drives anymore!

Curtis Thompson lost his job as a skilled craftsman due to his deteriorating eyesight. He later discovered his vision problems were caused by cataracts, but he could not afford surgery unless he returned to work, and he couldn't return to work until he had the surgery. Seemingly trapped, Curtis turned to the Lighthouse for help. He was back to his job soon after the surgery was complete.

More than 1,500 Georgians lost their health coverage each week of this year, and your Lighthouse is one of the few places they can turn for sight-saving surgeries. We rely on the White Cane fundraisers held by the Lions clubs of Georgia to support the eye surgery program.

The traditional method of fundraising through bucket drives is becoming more difficult each year. Fewer people are out buying, and those who are shopping don't carry cash as often. A number of clubs have found alternative ways to fundraise. They are recycling soda cans and bottles, writing and hand-delivering letters to small businesses, hosting pancake breakfasts and barbecues, putting on car shows, and ushering at local sporting events. The Tifton Lions Club put in a lot of work and pulled off a very successful male beauty pageant (see previous page).

Not only do White Cane activities help the Lighthouse, they also provide an avenue for spreading the word about the amazing work Lions do in the community. In addition, they are a great opportunity to get new club members actively involved in Lionism.

WHITE CANE EMPHASIS IS APRIL,

but don't wait until then to start planning your club's participation. A few clubs report they are too small, or they are rebuilding, or not sure how to hold a White Cane Drive. NO club is too small (or too large) to participate. A White Cane Drive can be a terrific incentive for a rebuilding club. So, how about some ideas on how to begin or improve your club's efforts.

Here are some ideas:

- * Place plastic jars on check-out counters of convenience and fast food stores. This could be done 4-6 weeks in April and can be handled by 1 or 2 Lions. Special jar lids and decals are available through White Cane Days, Inc.
- * Write letters to businesses of your community soliciting donations. Then follow up with a personal visit.
- * Hold a pancake breakfast, chili supper, chicken BBQ, or other project designated for White Cane.
- * Get publicity through having a community leader (mayor, administrator, or commissioner) sign a proclamation declaring your club's White Cane Drive and publishing it in your local newspaper.
- * If you have a Wal-Mart, K-Mart, Kroger's, or some other large retail outlet, approach management about a matching grant for White Cane.
- * Utilize your White Cane efforts to educate your community about the Georgia Lions Lighthouse in general, and your club in particular. You may be able to recruit a few new members.

The future of our dog guide program depends in large part on volunteer families that host specially selected breeding dogs. This dedicated group of volunteers provides foster homes for breeding stock moms and dads for the life of the dog.

Leader Dog provides veterinary care, as well as heartworm and flea preventative. The host family is responsible for all costs related to routine care, feeding and transporting their dog to our campus in Rochester Hills. Families hosting a female dog are also responsible for the care and whelping of puppies for the first six weeks of life.

Deaf-blind Communications

Many people are familiar with the famous scene from "The Miracle Worker" when Anne Sullivan pumps water into a young Helen Keller's hand while signing the word "water" into the other. It is a life-changing moment for Helen; she is learning tactile sign language.

Tactile sign language requires the people in the conversation to physically touch each other in order to communicate. The person "speaking" signs into the hand of the "listener," while the "listener" cups their hands around the "speakers" hands to feel the words being formed. Because this is such an intimate form of communication, instructors only train one or two people per class.

Some of the Deaf-blind students that come to Leader Dog do not use tactile sign language. They may have enough sight to see sign language close-up or may have enough hearing, with the help of hearing aides or cochlear implants, to hear someone from extremely close range.

Name Signing

In the Deaf community, the sign representing a person's name is given to the person by someone that is Deaf. Often the sign combines the first letter of the person's name with an attribute distinct to the individual – their vocation, a favorite hobby, or a personality trait. This is also true when a person who is Deaf-blind "names" their Leader Dog.

Student Ricky Enger Finds Her Tempo

Ricky Enger was born blind. But it hasn't stood in her way. Married for 10 years and the mother of 6-year-old Kyle, Ricky works for the Serotek Corporation in sales and marketing. It's a job with a lot of responsibility and she travels all over the country giving presentations.

For many years, she wasn't interested in a guide dog – because "you can't fold it up and put it in your purse" and a dog seemed, in some ways, a bother. She'd think, in fact, that people with visual impairments used their dogs more as pals than as bona fide guides.

She slowly became aware, however, that people using a guide dog were somehow more independent than she was and determined to give it a try. The results have been lifealtering. "For the first time in my life," Ricky says "I can walk at the speed I want to walk. I wasn't fully aware of the extent to which I'd adjust my gait to situations — the speed of a crowd or the pace of my sighted guide or the built-in hazards of using a cane — but I never walked at my pace."

"All that has changed since I've been working with Eddy," she says. "I can walk at the pace I was meant to; I can rest when I want to rest and I can go when I want to go. This is a new level of independence that I've never had in my life and I love it!"

Together with her new found freedom and independence, Ricky also has a pal named Eddy who loves her; who will keep her safe; who will always be at her side.

Service dog Wyatt III to help Roman be more independent – Rome, GA.



Bruce Van Hoorn and his service dog Wyatt III Roman Bruce Van Hoorn recently graduated from two weeks of training and received an assistance dog from Canine Companions for Independence, a non-profit organization that breeds, trains and places assistance dogs for people with disabilities.

Van Hoorn was matched with Wyatt III, a 2-year-old black labrador/golden retriever mix who responds to up to 50 commands.

Wyatt assists Van Hoorn, who is a paraplegic, by opening doors, retrieving dropped items and other tasks that enable him to lead a more independent life.

In addition to helping him with physical tasks, Wyatt will offer emotional support and daily companionship. Companion dogs also serve as a social bridge to people who are not used to relating to a person with a disability.

Wyatt is the second dog that Van Hoorn has received from CCI. Van Hoorn said he is looking forward to taking Wyatt along with him on his adventures.

To prepare for Wyatt's arrival, Van Hoorn completed a twoweek training session where he learned all of Wyatt's commands and how to properly care for him.

CCI assistance dogs are provided free of charge, though costs to CCI exceed \$45,000 to breed, raise train and provide ongoing support. Charitable contributions, grants and corporate support fund the substantial costs involved with this process.

CCI has its own breeding program in California. When the puppies are 8-weeks old, they are placed with volunteer puppy raisers across the country who will teach them up to 30 basic commands. When the puppy is 14-16 months old, the puppy raiser returns the dog to one of CCI's regional training centers for six months of advanced training.

Lions Services for Children Projects

The problems children face vary in degree from country to country, but the need for health and education services is constant and universal. Lions clubs help address these needs by developing projects with specific, attainable goals, including:

- Collecting food, clothes or books
- Organizing a vision or hearing screening
- Providing immunizations through a vaccination drive
- Starting a literacy program with a local school, library, community center or <u>Leo club</u>
- Supporting a nutritional program for undernourished children
- Securing wheelchairs for disabled children
- Sending a child with diabetes or physical challenges to a specialized camp

Lions have also constructed hospitals, schools, orphanages and children's centers throughout the world to serve youth in need.

Youth Camp and Exchange Types

An **Exchange** can be arranged in hundreds of countries and geographic locations where there are Lions clubs. Most exchanges last between four and six weeks during which the participants (ages 15-21) stay with one or more host families in another country.

Camps are one or two weeks long and bring together young people (ages 16-22) from around the world. Camps usually include a family stay that lasts between one and four weeks. More than 100 Lions camps are held each year in about 39 countries. Activities include visits to places of cultural or natural interest, sporting events and country presentations by the camp participants.

Welcome to Liberty Day!

Liberty Day is a program for our youth. It is a way to strength citizenship in our youth through a program based on the Constitution of the United States. This is a program started by the Lions Clubs of Denver. Georgia adopted this program in the late 1990s.

There are several ways a Lions Club can sponsor a Liberty Day program. The first way is through a school program. Lions Clubs should arrange a speaker who would be interesting to the students. This speaker could be an elected official or someone who could speak on the rights and responsibilities of citizens as granted by the Constitution.

Once you have your speaker, you can receive permission of the school system to sponsor a Liberty Day event to a class or a group of students. I have found that 8th grade and up is ideal. Then order the number of Liberty Day booklets you need from me. The cost is \$.60 each and includes shipping.

Also work with the teachers) so that they reinforce what the speaker has said through an essay or other classroom work. The students could even write a letter of thanks to the speaker / Lions Club on the subject. Another project is with a Boy Scout troop. Boy Scouts must earn the Citizenship in the Nation merit badge as a requirement for rank promotion. Again, use the speaker and the booklets. The Liberty Day project has been endorsed by the National Council of the Boy Scouts of America. A third project is when a group of youth work a project in a public place to promote the Constitution. There are a series of questions that they can use. They would ask an adult the question-- whether it is right or wrong, the adult receives either a flag pin or flag sticker. The booklets are used to coach the youth on the Constitution so that they are more confident in asking the questions as they know the answers themselves. They should work under the guidance of adults and in a place that has given permission for them to be there.
