President's Service Blog: Sulur Vocational Training Centre, India

March 8, 2011

Judy and I traveled to India recently and visited an extraordinary facility offering training and job placement assistance. At the Sulur Lions Vocational Training Centre, more than 700 people per year learn computer skills, tailoring, jewelry making, and cosmetology and handbag construction. This project is supported by the Lions of India's District 324-B1 and with a grant from the Lions Clubs International Foundation.

We had the opportunity to watch a bookbinding class as well as textile print training and to see sewing machines donated to the school. Judy received a handbag made by one of the students there. Centre students receive four months of instruction, and then spend two months working at apprenticeships, all at no cost to the participants.

Lions clubs and districts are required to file tax forms in accordance with the United States tax laws. Information and filing requirements and instructions are available on the Lions Clubs International website in the Tax Information section.

In this section you will find: detailed information concerning the requirements for filing Form 990, 990-N (E-Postcard), 990-EZ; a sample Form 990-EZ, with explanations; a blank Form 990-EZ; guidelines for disclosures regarding nondeductibility of contributions or gifts to Lions districts and clubs; and a summary of provisions concerning possible tax liability for Unrelated **Business Income Tax (UBIT). Additional information** concerning United States tax laws may be obtained from the **IRS** website. Please review this information at your earliest convenience. Dear Lion,

I am deeply humbled by the generous outp support from Lions worldwide to my call last week to donate funds to the Foundation's Japan Relief Fund. Already, LCIF has received donations or commitments exceeding US\$6 million, including US\$3 million that the Lions of Japan are working to raise themselves during their own crisis. Again, it's so very humbling to see such compassion by the network of caring Lions and Leos worldwide. I thank all who have already donated from the bottom of my heart.



With the expected death toll now exceeding 18,000 and rising, the devastation is clearly greater than anyone could have imagined. And more than 400,000 people are still in shelters, in the cold, often going without a hot meal for days on end.

Now that the roads have re-opened, Lions from all over Japan are sending relief aid from every corner of the country -- 30 tons of rice is being sent from Sapporo, US\$50,000 worth of baby formula from Hokkaido, and women's health products from the southern area of Shikoku - all through the Lions network in Japan. Within a day of the disaster, many courageous clubs distributed 20 tons of food, water and emergency supplies, despite great risks and challenges to

themselves. Even our Lions blue-colored Lions relief tents are being delivered to give shelter for Lions volunteers and other relief workers in the hardest-hit



areas.

To distribute the aid effectively, the Lions of Japan quickly set up four Lions relief aid warehouses in affected areas. Lions are coordinating relief aid distribution with local government officials and with the Japanese Red Cross. As a result, Lions are helping coordinate blood donation campaigns within Japan.

As you know, we have 31 Lions clubs in Sendai - the largest city affected by the quake - and nearly a club in every town up and down the coastline. Whether it's clothes and food today, or shelter next week, or a wheel chair the week after, Lions will be there to give dignity to those who have suffered such unimaginable pain and suffering.

While many of you have <u>already generously donated</u>, for which I am very thankful, please encourage your fellow Lions, Leos and friends to also <u>donate</u>. Please know that every donation will be put to careful use, and 100 percent will go to the cause. Also, donations received between March 11 and June 30, 2011 will be eligible for Melvin Jones Fellowships.

I am again humbled by your generosity to date. The Lions of Japan have always been there for the rest of us in times of need. So I am proud of you, and never prouder to be a Lion, when we come to their aid in the wake of this historic, awful tragedy.

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Lions, LCIF Providing US\$1.25 Million in Relief for Devastated Japan

In the case of disasters, we Lions are often the first to respond, and continue to provide for as long as it takes until all work is done. Lions Clubs International Foundation and Lions are providing relief in devastated Japan. The Tohoku Region Pacific Ocean Coast Earthquake is the worst earthquake to hit Japan in over 100 years triggered a powerful tsunami throughout the Pacific Ocean.

Lions Clubs International Foundation is providing over US\$1.25 million, or 100 million Japanese Yen, for immediate relief. This includes major catastrophe and emergency grant funds as well as designated donations from Lions around the world. The Foundation has also established a <u>designated fund</u> for Lions to directly support this disaster. LCIF is also monitoring the impact to other Pacific Ocean nations. Lions in Japan are coordinating their relief efforts through LionNet Japan and are using the Japan Lions Office as emergency relief headquarters. Japanese media, citing local and national police, said hundreds of people were dead and hundreds more missing. The 2:46 p.m. quake struck 373 kilometers (230 miles) from Tokyo, the United States Geological Survey said. In Sendai, 60,000 to 70,000 people are being evacuated to shelters in the area.

"I just returned from Christchurch, New Zealand, and I thought I had seen it all, but this is unbelievable. Looking to the extraordinary dimension of this earthquake and tsunami, LCIF and Lions are committed to providing immediate and long-term relief. Lions of Japan are often the first to respond to other disasters, and I ask all Lions of the world to show their solidarity and help the Japanese Lions during their time of need," said LCIF Chairperson Eberhard J. Wirfs.

LCIF has established a designated account for Lions around the world to directly support this disaster. Lions from around the world are responding generously. The 48th OSEAL Forum Committee has committed US\$10,000 and the Annur Town Lions Club in India has committed US\$5,000. Donors can:

Club Secretaries ---- April, as you know, is Club Elections. (This means it is time for each Lions Club to elect its officers—President, Vice Presidents, Secretary, Treasurer (or Secretary-Treasurer), Directors, and Membership Committee—for the 2011-2012 Lions year!).

It is VERY important that you submit your PU-101 Form AS SOON AS POSSIBLE - the present Secretary should go online and complete the PU-101 Report of Officers for LCI. Please do it now. Make sure the original goes to Lions Clubs International by snail mail or you can go on-line. Make sure you make a copy and send to District Governor Ron Bennetti. Now, a small change – please make an extra copy of the PU-101 and send it to DGE Ed Hashbarger. He has the important task of using these copies (PU-101) to make up a portion of the State and District Directory. Oh, before entering the information on the PU-101, please make sure that the individual Lions information is correct. DG Ron and DGE Ed need CORRECT names, addresses, phone numbers, and email addresses.

As President elect – you should be ready to appoint members to specific committees. You will find in your current State Directory in the back a copy of 2010-11 Lighthouse / Camp / RFB&D appointment form (just change the year date) – or you can try to enlarge the one below I will try and put a link on the web site. You should make a copy of and fill out and send to each address indicated with a courtesy copy to the new District Governor.

These three things are very important Mail will be forwarded to those you select as Associate Directors. These members will be responsible in regards to informing your club members of any and all affairs going on with the Lighthouse / Camp / and RFB&D. As President elect, I would advise that you begin NOW to formulate any and all plans for your upcoming year. You should be prepared to assign all members to specific committees.

Make note: Try not to overload you Club Secretary......Also – encourage the Secretary to go on-line to make out MMR reports, A-1 and PU-101 reports. Going on-line can save time and money. For ALL members check out www.lionsclubs.org

LEADERSHIP

This time of year, clubs are preparing their slate of officers for 2011-2012. Give each Lion in your club the job descriptions of the elected positions to include the responsibility of becoming a trained leader. All clubs should adopt a simple rule that if the Lion will not fulfill the responsibility of the position, than that Lion should not be elected an officer. The members of a club also have a responsibility, of insisting that their club be lead by trained Lion leaders.

Leadership is defined as guidance and management with the ability to influence others to see a vision of what should and could be accomplished. A leaders has a responsibility to those he or she leads—the responsibility to do the best he or she can for those people.

Each elected officer of a Lions Club is a leader. The problem is that many elected officers are not trained to be leaders and cannot communicate, cannot guide, and therefore, cannot influence others to see what should be accomplished. The training or education of leaders must start with the basics. Each and every officer of a Lions Club must know the basics of Lionism and of the position to which he or she was elected.

This training starts with the officer participating in the leadership training offered by the district. It does not matter if you are elected as the president, vice president, secretary, treasurer, director, or membership committee member. There will be training for each and it is the responsibility of the Lion and the responsibility of the club to see that that Lion attends training as a prerequisite to being installed in that position.

The educational process does not stop there. Each officer has the responsibility to attend all cabinet meetings and all zone meetings. These should be the most important item on the calendar other than family. From the cabinet and zone meetings, the officers receive information on events in the district, the multiple district, and Lions Clubs International, including happenings within the state.

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

Host seminars regarding simple practices that "Protect our Environment."


Raise awareness about the benefits of "going green."

Global Leadership Team

The great success that the Global Membership Team has achieved in membership worldwide has provided a model for enhancing an equally critical function of our association — leadership development. Solid leaders who provide vision, guidance and motivation will be needed in coming years to sustain membership growth and assure that Lions Clubs International continues to fulfill its mission of providing quality, relevant service to communities around the world.

A new Global Leadership Team has been established to identify and cultivate effective Lion leaders through new and existing training and leadership development programs. With similar structures and methods of operation the GMT and GLT will work as a mutually supportive team designed to more closely integrate the association's membership and leadership development functions. As of July 1, 2011 the GMT and GLT will replace the MERL program.

In January, a group of 57 experienced and knowledgeable Lions gathered at international headquarters for a three-day GLT orientation. This group, appointed by Lions Clubs International executive officers, has already begun its task of developing the next generation of Lion leaders.

"ATTACHMENT TO VOLUNTEERING"

This title is from an article by John Wilson and Marc A. Musick, published in <u>Sociological Forum</u>, Vol. 14, No. 2, 1999, pages 243 – 270. Unlike last month's article, "A Time to Join, A Time to Quit," by Thomas Rotolo, this article is exclusively focused on retention.

The research methods for both articles were surveys, i.e., individuals were asked questions about their volunteerism. The only question supported in both articles was about the children of volunteers. Indeed, Wilson and Musick's findings, like Rotolo's, confirmed that "The presence of children in the household has a stronger effect on women than men." (page 262) Since Rotolo's research was more concerned about marriage and volunteerism, his research was more detailed, including the finding that women were more likely to leave volunteerism when their children are born, but as their children become older they become volunteers again. Wilson and Musick's research confirmed "Hypothesis 7: The more children volunteers have in their household, the less likely are they to drop out." (page 253) Both articles jointly found that as children get older, women tend to rejoin volunteer organizations and then remain volunteers.

Both articles recorded the age of their participants, so there was some age related retention findings. Rotolo's research found that young adults join many volunteer organizations and leave quickly, middle aged adults join fewer volunteer organizations, but remain members longer, and older adults join fewer volunteer organizations, but continue to be members. Wilson and Musick's research only compared "... middle-aged people with younger adults. The data fit the expected pattern, except that the highest rate of attachment is found in the 55-64 age group rather than the group preceding it ..." (page 264) Except for the latter age group, both articles found that as adults get older they tend to remain volunteers longer.

I am now going to add a possible explanation to Wilson and Musick's finding that volunteers, aged 55 – 64, had a better retention rate than those aged 45 - 54. Except for this one age group, the highest rates of <u>volunteer attachment</u> kept going up in each older age group, which is an excellent retention finding!

What I want to point out is that the results of their first two hypotheses were confirmed:

"Hypothesis 1: The greater the decline in their functional health, the more likely are respondents to stop volunteering.

"Hypothesis 2: The greater the increase in their regular working hours, the more likely are respondents to stop volunteering." (page 252)

However, what they should have done is compare these findings to their age discussion. They did suggest that ". . . the functional health measure is biased in the direction of physical limitations and little of the work volunteers do entails strenuous physical labor." (page 260) Accordingly, senior volunteers tend to not work full-time, so they can and do volunteer part-time work. Similarly, aging adults do not end up with longer regular working hours than younger adults, which would result in departing volunteerism. Hence, it is likely that physical labor and working hours were greater for adults aged 45-54 than those aged 55-64, which resulted in the higher loss of volunteers in the younger group. This is my possible explanation, not the authors, but it is consistent with the rest of their research and discussion.

Kids, age, and increased regular working hours have been found to relate to retention loss. Next month I will return to more discussion of "Attachment to Volunteering." Unfortunately, what I will leave with you now is that as of the end of February our retention loss rate has slightly exceeded last year by .4%. Please continue to focus on the retention of your members.


Loganville Lions Club =

WHITE CANE EMPHASIS IS APRIL, but don't wait until then to start planning your club's participation. A few clubs report they are too small, or they are rebuilding, or not sure how to hold a White Cane Drive. NO club is too small (or too large) to participate. A White Cane Drive can be a terrific incentive for a rebuilding club. So, how about some ideas on how to begin or improve your club's efforts.

Here are some ideas:

- * Utilize your White Cane efforts to educate your community about the Georgia Lions Lighthouse in general, and your club in particular. You may be able to recruit a few new members.

White Cane had its beginning in Georgia in 1980 as White Cane Day. We no longer limit White Cane to just a day in the year. Lions get an excellent return on their investment in the Lighthouse. The Lighthouse is now able to get \$5 in services for every dollar.

ATLANTA (**MyFOX ATLANTA**) - Located on the backside of the Georgia's Lion's Club Lighthouse Foundation on Clairmont Road Wednesday was a free eye clinic.

Carolyn Allen hasn't had her eyes examined for three or four years, and on her visit Wednesday, they were bothering her.

"They were running a whole lot, and the reading glasses I was buying in the store weren't working," said Allen. The 54-year-old Atlanta woman received a full eye exam she said she couldn't have afforded without the free clinic.

"It's expensive, getting your eye exam and getting your glasses, and in my case, it helps a lot," Allen said.

"The majority of our patients are the working poor, they have jobs, or they're looking for work," said Christina Lennon.

On a typical day, volunteer optometrists like Dr. Kelly Spetalnisk and her colleagues will examine dozens of patients. "We're seeing more and more people coming in. They're almost apologetic for why they're here, 'I've never had to use these services before. I've been out of a job for a year, I've lost my glasses.' It's a different story that you hear nowadays, a broader range of people that are coming in here now," said Dr. Spetalnisk.

Demand for the Lighthouse Foundation's clinics is up 30 percent this year, because of the number of Georgians without health insurance. "Vision care is very difficult because even if you have insurance, you don't always have vision insurance, even people with Medicaid. Medicaid doesn't cover glasses in most cases," said Lennon.

The Lighthouse Foundation holds 17 clinics every month across Georgia and for a lot of the clients they serve, there is more at stake than just trying on and finding the right pair of glasses. About 30 percent of the clinics clients have diabetes, and about half have high blood pressure. Both are leading causes of blindness that can be prevented with regular care. "So if we can see changes in your eyes, those changes are going on throughout your body, so we may pick up things patients aren't even aware of," said Dr. Spetalnisk.

A Leader Dog Graduate Giving Back

Shawna Carothers Shows Her Support for Leader Dog

Many of the people who come to Leader Dog to receive a guide dog end up as donors and supporters. That is the case for Shawna Carothers, a 2009 graduate.

Shawna Carothers believes that raising money for Leader Dog is a natural fit for her. "They helped me by giving me wonderful guide dog, Ellie, who is my best friend. She is worth more than any amount of money, but, of course, Leader Dog needs money to be able to provide these wonderful dogs. This is why it is important for others to get out there and make donations and raise funds."

Shawna enlisted the help of BraVo! (which stands for Building Relationships and Volunteer Opportunities), a group of individuals with disabilities that works together to give back to the community. Each quarter, BraVo! selects a different charity to support.

To raise money for Leader Dog, BraVo! hosted a pulled pork luncheon at United Disability Services in Akron, Ohio. To bring in the "dog" aspect of Leader Dog, the group also sold homemade dog treats.

Orientation and Mobility Training

Where Am I and How Do I Get Where I Need to Go?

"After years of slowly losing my vision due to retinitis pigmentosa, I finally got to the point where I needed some cane training. I looked for resources, but didn't find anything available until I learned about Leader Dog. Leader Dog's orientation and mobility program taught me how to travel independently with a cane and how to survive. I felt very empowered when I came home after completing training." Susan Calhoun of Oxford, Georgia

For Susan, and millions of other people who have lost their sight, getting a guide dog was not the first step in regaining her ability to travel independently. The first step was to learn how to use a white cane and how to understand where she is in the environment—she needed orientation and mobility skills.



What is Orientation and Mobility (O&M)?



During AMP training, clients learn to use their arm to protect their face from protruding objects. In this case, the side view mirror of a truck.

Every time you leave your home, whether you are blind or sighted, you use orientation and mobility skills to get where you need to go. Orientation is knowing where you are in your environment and how to get back on track if you get lost. When you are visually impaired, you lose the ability to maintain your orientation by using visual signs and landmarks. You must be taught how to use common patterns in society like how grass often appears between the sidewalk and a street, and how traffic sounds will be on your right or left side as you travel down a sidewalk, to maintain your orientation.

Mobility is the ability to physically get to where you need to go. Often, travel aids are used such as a car or bike. For a person who is blind, travel aids usually consist of a white cane or a guide dog.

Leader Dog's accelerated mobility program (AMP), like all O&M courses, has the ultimate goal of teaching a person how to travel safely and independently with a white cane.

Why Use a White Cane?

One important function of a white cane is to identify the person using it as being visually impaired. This is helpful when the person is crossing the street or needs to ask for assistance. Cane users receive tactile feedback about their immediate surroundings through the cane. When their cane touches a soft surface the user may interpret that they are near grass, or if the cane contacts a hard surface, the user may interpret that they are next to a wall.

People using a cane can quickly identify elevation changes such as curbs and stairs as well as obstructions like fire hydrants and benches in their travel path. These obstacles can help them determine their location on a street or in a building.

Developing excellent O&M skills and being able to use a cane to travel independently are prerequisites to getting a Leader Dog. Because people often walk much faster with a guide dog and because they do not receive the tactile feedback that a cane provides, they can also get lost faster if they lack good orientation skills.

Cane Before Leader Dog

Leader Dog was motivated to develop our accelerated mobility program because many of our potential guide dog clients lacked the required O&M skills. In order to prepare these people for guide dog training, we decided to teach them the skills needed to succeed. To date, over 200 people have completed our O&M program with over 50% of them returning to Leader Dog to train with a guide dog.

History of Orientation and Mobility at Leader Dog

"It was all about getting people to move." — Rod Haneline, Chief Operating Officer 1991: Rod Haneline, an experienced Leader Dog instructor, took classes at Western Michigan University and received his Master's Degree in Orientation & Mobility Early 90s: Accelerated Mobility Program (AMP) designed to condense training time and focus on: awareness of the environment, awareness of traffic, and increasing travel speed 1995–96: First Accelerated Mobility Program clients receive O&M training 2002: First AMP class designed with the dual purpose of training AMP clients and university students studying to be O&M instructors



Learning to maintain a straight street crossing is an important part of O&M training. Clients learn that listening to the flow of traffic next to them can help them continue in a straight line to walk safely to the opposite curb.
