Dear "Snow" I mean "Gold Standard" Lions of 18-D,

However, we have room for a few more Lions, so if you would like to help the district recruit some new Lions, then please contact me and I'll add your name to the list. I assure you that you will learn some things that will prove useful.

For many reasons, May is an extremely important month. The key results of your April club elections are required to be submitted to LCI in the form of a PU-101 by 15 May 2009. That is, the names of your president, secretary, treasurer, and membership chair need to sent to LCI; with a copy sent to me! Failure to submit these names means that these club officers will not get

password access to the LCI web site and your club officers may not appear in our district directory. Also, by the end of May, LCI and the district expect you to have paid all of your club bills.

For most clubs, May brings to an end your fundraising and you will be cutting checks to the Lions charities we support. Further, by the end of the month, your Applications for State Awards must be in the hands of Lion Bryson Tanner. Both of these actions are very noteworthy. What you are doing is taking action that fully reveals what your club has done this year. Yes, you are patting yourself on the back when you submit your state award applications and cut your checks. However, these acts tell all of the Lions in District 18-D how important your actions have been to your local communities and to the district. They are important recognition actions to make!

Clearly, May begins to make it clear that this Lions year is nearing its end. What will be your club's history for the year? Among the things I want you to carefully look at is your membership. At the end of March our district net growth and loss for the year was zero. We were back to where we started the year. We still have April results to see, but May is the key last month for you to have a positive net membership gain for the year. You still have time to bring in a few new members and May is the month you need to make certain that June isn't going to be your month of dropping club members. May is the month you need to ensure that all your Lions are actively involved in your club. Everyone needs to be celebrating the end of this year and looking forward to next year!




New Parade Shirt Proposed



Passwords By Email - If you are a current club or district officer, your password can be sent to you by email. You must have a current email address on file with headquarters. See the "Need your password" link on this page. Then enter your member ID number and click "Submit." Your password will be sent to you shortly via an automatic e-mail response.

These three things are very important Mail will be forwarded to those you select as Associate Directors. These members will be responsible in regards to informing your club members of any and all affairs going on with the Lighthouse / Camp / and RFB&D. As President elect, I would advise that you begin NOW to formulate any and all plans for your upcoming year. You should be prepared to assign all members to specific committees. Make note: Try not to overload you Club Secretary......Also – encourage the Secretary to go online to make out MMR reports, A-1 and PU-101 reports. Going on-line can save time and money. Membership Updates

Lions, Leos and now Lion Cubs. The Lions family keeps growing! At it's March meeting in New York, the membership development committee of the international board of directors approved the Lion Cub program. This will enable family-oriented clubs to include children under the age of 12 in their activities.

The committee also approved extending the entrance fee waiver from six to 12 months for transfer and reinstated members who resigned in good standing.



Ideas Clubs Use To Get And Keep Members Involved

Strike up a friendly rivalry with another service club on a community service project. One club does this by seeing which club can raise the most money ringing the Salvation Army bell. They even have a song to motivate the members to participate and a joint meeting to share in the fun.

Invite Children to participate in fund raising and community service projects AND TO CLUB MEETINGS. Market the club as a family oriented group. Have a Leo or a scout care for the children at meetings.

Let newer members (1-5 years) come up with a project and let them run it.

Have an occasional joint meeting with another service club. This helps with networking and lets Lions know they are not an island unto themselves.

Hold a family outing. Be sure to include the kids – including grandchildren. Make it fun with maybe just hot dogs and burgers. Have fun games for both kids and adults.

Set aside one meeting to brainstorm new ideas for community service and/or fund raising projects. Have a newer member act as a facilitator and an experienced Lion as scribe.

A Direct Approach to Membership Growth

As a Lion, your task is to encourage growth in club . Much like any business, you search for new ways for your club to gain new "customers" or members. Why not try direct marketing?

Direct marketing is a method of influencing a target audience using available media such as ecommunication, a mail campaign, or phone calling.

Successful direct marketing campaigns follow certain best practices such as: using targeted lists, creating an effective message, and following up after distribution. • Minding the contact list. A targeted list should be developed and maintained including former members, those in the area who have been positively affected by Lions, and other influential or active members of the community.

• Creating and distributing the message. A communication piece should be produced that can be used to contact those on the target list. Incentives to join can be offered, new programs and improvements can be highlighted, and a brief explanation of the importance and impact of Lions locally and worldwide should be included. The message can be distributed via e-mail, postal service, or by phone call utilizing a pre-written script.

• Follow up. After the mailing or distribution of the direct marketing piece, it is important to follow-up with prospects and to encourage their attendance at upcoming events. Offer to meet prospects before meetings and to save them a seat. Update them on planned service projects and activities.

Does your club have a direct marketing plan? What other marketing ideas are right for your club?

It's true. A Lion who feels welcome in their club is more likely to maintain their membership than a Lion who feels overlooked or unappreciated.

Encourage your club leadership by suggesting the following:

• Member visits to Lions who have missed meetings or are losing interest.

• Introductions when Lions may not know one another.

• Recognition for participation in events.

The **Children's Eye Care Center at Emory University** was started by the Lions of GA in 1995. It has become one of the top Centers in the United States in the field of Pediatric ophthalmology. The Children's Eye Center provides a team of Specialists for the care of our children's vision. It is hard to get such Quality Care anywhere else in the Southeast. At the present time there are 3 research projects underway that will have direct effect on the health of children's eyes.

FIRST is the Infant Aphakia Treatment Study. This is a significant national study that is headed by Dr. Scott Lambert, who runs the Eye Center's pediatric section. There are 11 patients at Emory and 125 nationwide. Babies born with cataracts have to have them removed. In this study, they are randomized to either intra-ocular lenses or contact lenses. They will be followed until 5 years of age and the visual outcomes between the two groups will be compared.

SECOND is Pediatric Eye Disease Investigator Group. In this study it is comparing the corneal thickness in children with their intraocular pressure, a key indication for glaucoma. This will be wrapping up soon.

THIRD is study with this group involves children who need a procedure for tear duct obstruction. They are randomized to an immediate in office procedure versus delaying treatment for 6 months, then it in the operating room (The goal will be to avoid those OR visits if we can). Dr Phoebe Lenhart, the fellow in pediatrics, will be presenting a research project on vision screening at the annual Academy of Pediatric Ophthalmologists meeting.

These are important steps on helping the young babies overcome vision problems. If your Club has not contributed to the Lions Children's Eye Care Center I encourage you to do so. Make the Check to the GA Lions Lighthouse Foundation and mark on the check for the Children's Eye Care Center. Also place the name of your club on the check where your club will get credit for the donation.

Lighthouse Mobile Eye Clinic Program Aims to Prevent Serious Eye Disease

The Lighthouse Foundation partners with 10 nonprofit clinics and community centers throughout the state to provide eye exams and eyeglasses on a monthly and bi-monthly basis with their Mobile Vision Clinic.

Clinic locations include Albany, Atlanta, Athens, Augusta,



Brunswick, Decatur, Macon, Savannah, Tifton, and Waycross. The emphasis of this mobile eye clinic is to serve areas with high populations of diabetic and hypertension patients and provide treatment before eye conditions worsen.

With the clinic program approaching its two year anniversary, the Lighthouse has more than met it's goal of increasing services and access for patients who could not otherwise afford these preventative exams. Eddie Smith is one such patient.

Gail Kilbourn Keeps Her Household Moving

Imagine a household of three boys, a German exchange student, and two dogs - seems like a busy

place, but it works just fine for Gail Kilbourn. "It's nice having to care for my family every day," says Gail with a laugh, "sometimes they run me ragged, but someone has to do it." Gail is often surprised when people are amazed that she can raise three boys with her visual impairment. Blind since birth, Gail is just living her life the way she knows how for her, not seeing is normal.

Gail received her first Leader Dog in 1990 and has been working with dog guides ever since. Her sons (Joshua – 8, Jacob – 7, and Matthew – 1) are used to having Gail's current Leader Dog "Mya" go everywhere with them. "I don't need to explain to people that they can't pet Mya when she is working," she says. "The boys do it for me. When told to, Mya will even follow Joshua through stores and restaurants. She won't follow Jacob yet, I guess she thinks he's still too small."

Pnina (pronounced "Pa-nee-nah") is the first exchange student placed with a blind person by the Youth for Understanding program.

Even though Gail and Mya have only been working

together since October of 2008, they have developed an unspoken understanding of how fast to walk in different situations. "I've noticed that Mya is extra careful and walks slower if I'm carrying the baby or have the older boys with me. When it's just her and I, we both take advantage of the fact that we can walk at a faster pace."

"I think having Skye (her retired Leader Dog) and Mya in our family adds as much to my husband and sons' lives as it does to mine. They really are a part of your life in a way that most family pets aren't."

National Estimates on Diabetes Estimation methods

The diabetes estimates in this fact sheet were derived from various data systems of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the user population database of the Indian Health Service (IHS), the U.S. Renal Data System of the National Institutes of Health (NIH), the U.S. Census Bureau, and published studies. Estimates of the total number of persons with diabetes and the prevalence of diabetes in 2007 were derived using 2003–2006 National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey (NHANES), 2004–2006 National Health Interview Survey (NHIS), 2005 IHS data, and 2007 resident population estimates. Many of the estimated numbers and percentages of people with diabetes were derived by applying diabetes prevalence estimates from health surveys of the civilian, noninstitutionalized population to the most recent 2007 resident population estimates. These estimates have some variability due to the limits of the measurements and estimation procedures. The procedures assumed that age-race-sex-specific percentages of adults with diabetes (diagnosed and undiagnosed) in 2007 are the same as they were in earlier time periods (e.g., 2003–2006), and that the age-race-sex-specific percentages of adults with diabetes in the resident population are identical to those in the civilian, noninstitutionalized population. Deviations from these assumptions may result in over- or under-estimated numbers and percentages. Prevalence of diagnosed diabetes in people younger than 20 years of age, United States, 2007



LIBERTY DAY—YOUR LIONS CLUB AND SCOUTING PROJECT

The National Council of the Boy Scouts of America has recognized Liberty Day as a citizenship project. Older Cub Scouts (Webelos 4th and 5th grade), Boy Scout troops, and Venturing crews are encouraged to undertake a project at least once a year under the BSA program, Good Turn for America. Liberty Day is now listed as one of the suggested projects.

Liberty Day Kids is the ideal method of a Webelos den, Boy Scout troop or Venturing Crew to complete a Good Turn for America project using Liberty Day. For Liberty Day Kids, the scouts learn a set of questions and answers directly out of the Constitution. They then take these questions and answers out to the public in a mall, post office, or other gathering place and ask adults the questions. Every adult questioned is given an "I Got Quizzed" sticker or an American flag lapel pin along with a pocket Liberty Day booklet.


