The Lions Step In

The Lions club in Palmerston saw the need to clean up the area. They also saw the possibility of making it an incredible public space for the whole community to enjoy and take pride in. And they got the entire community involved. "It has been a partnership right from the beginning with the town and our Lions club and the residents of Palmerston," says Dave Wilson of the Palmerston Lions Club. "Residents of Palmerston stop while we are working and lend a hand. They make donations. It's been great the support we've had."

Hard Work Pays Off

The Lions realize such a large project will take years to complete. They have worked at the park two times a week for three years, laying cobblestones, and putting in equipment and pathways. "We started with the front entrance, playground and splash pool and we're continuing on," says Joanne Klonikowski of the Palmerston Lions Club. "Now it's a real gathering point. We're going to have a memorial forest and stage areas and all sorts of lovely things including pathways and lighting." A beautifully restored pedestrian bridge offers residents a commanding view of the park. And a restored locomotive engine - "old 81" - stands at the entrance to the park, near a Lions sign and statues of lions.

Fast Facts

Lions have more than 4,000 feet of eight-foot wide brick pathways to lay, as well as hundreds of trees to plant and stage and sports areas, including basketball and road hockey courts, to build.



China

In China where Lionism took root only a few short years ago, we have grown by more than 50% this year, increasing from 4,000 members to more than 6,200. The growth is happening in most major cities in China, and three new provisional districts have been formed as a result. But most impressive of all, is the real spirit of service displayed by our Lions in China. Just last week, following the recent quake in western China, a group of Chinese Lions traveled for several days, under very difficult circumstances, to reach the affected areas with relief supplies. I sometimes wonder if my fellow Lions in my own district could respond in such a way.

Dual Strategy and the Ginkgo Leadership Award

The next ginkgo award emphasizes both aspects of the dual strategy: new growth and maintaining what we have through caring for existing clubs.

To qualify for the award, between February 1 and May 31, 2010, a district will have to:

• Charter 2 new clubs or reorganize 2 cancelled clubs

• Improve membership results from January 31, 2010

• Increase the average size of existing clubs by one member

Have no clubs on status quo or suspension as of May 31, 2010

Other News

• Women at Lions now approaching 295,000 members

• Lions Quest expanded to three more countries

• Sightfirst treats 5 million people this year for river blindness and trachoma

Lions in Africa

Another story of success and inspiration are the Lions in Africa -- a continent known for 'despair' a few years ago which is now moving to be a continent of 'hope and development'. Lions in Africa have grown grow by 10% in since 2007-08 and are their own way to yet another stellar year. Most impressively, Africa Lions are leading through service. They not only lead some our more impressive global service projects but they have produced several lead gift donors for Campaign SightFirst II and LCIF's Lions Hope for Haiti relief fund.

Recognizing the African continent's further potential, I am very proud to report that your board of directors at our recent meeting in early April, passed a resolution to give more support for Africa, to treat the continent as its own distinct area in LCI, and to put the African continent on the pathway to becoming its own LCI constitutional area when it reaches a total membership of 30.000 - a feat that I know will be achieved soon.

Dual Strategy for All Lions

Our success stories span well beyond our new areas of China and emerging areas like Africa. For example, the country of Australia is having growth, most of Latin America and Europe too, and even the United States of America and Canada are doing quite well by historic standards though I am convinced the latter two can make history this year by erasing past patterns.

But as highlighted below, the future of our organization will need to rely increasingly on the 'dual strategy.' The strategy is simple -- emphasizing on one side, that we need new clubs and membership growth to make up for those who leave or pass away, but on the other side, we need a focus on keeping the members we have and increasing the size of existing clubs to control long term retention.

"We need you"

We will need our children to become the members of the future but, in fact, we need your family members right now. <u>"We need you"</u> is the message that must be conveyed to current and prospective members. We need members to invite their partners and spouses to become Lions Club members and we need these new members to energize our clubs and open-up new avenues of service. The best place to look for qualified members may also be the closest -- right in our own homes.

There are many strategies that can help existing clubs grow, such as:

- Inviting more spouses and women through the We Need You campaign.
- Organizing recruiting campaigns using Lions Clubs International's "Best Practices."
- Forming club branches
- Identifying clubs below 20 members in need of special assistance.

We know there are Lions ready to respond. All we need do is ask.

NAMES, UGLY LION RELATIONSHIPS, AND TOO MUCH WORK (CLUB ACTIONS TO AVOID THE DISAPPEARANCE OF LIONS)

Do you know the names of every Lion in your club? Frankly, I have always had trouble remembering the names of everyone in my club. In fact, as I have told Lions over the years, when I first visited my soon to be Oconee Lions Club, I noticed that members were wearing <u>name tags</u>. What I thought at the time, and I have not changed my mind about, is that I could be a member of an organization that encouraged members to wear name tags!

It isn't knowing the names of the members of your club that is especially important though. Indeed, it isn't the names so much as knowing who the person is that has that name. That is, what do you know about the person with a name? Nevertheless, interaction starts with names. When you are introduced to a prospective member, you often only hear their name. Then, if your club is fortunate and this person becomes a member, the next time you see him or her, do you remember his or her name? In all likelihood, the answer is "No." Therefore, we are now back to the importance of the new member's sponsor to know <u>your name</u> and repeatedly introduce you until the new member gets a name tag!

New members need to begin to feel accepted in the club they have joined. What does it take to make this happen? As Lions understand, it is one of the duties of a Lion Tamer and past club presidents to greet members as they arrive. A new member definitely needs to be greeted, but it isn't just "thanking them for coming." Rather, new members need to be continuously linked to club members. Again, the new member sponsor has a significant duty here, but **all** members need to make certain that new Lions are continuously interact with fellow Lions. Over time multiple interactions form friendship relationships that solidly retain new members.

Unfortunately, all relationships between Lions are not positive. How does this happen? That is, since we all have the same sight and hearing related goals, how is it that we aren't all positively related to each other? There are numerous reasons, but some of them can be controlled by club leadership and members. It is here that Lions need to be sensitive about politics, religion, gender, race, etc. Among the controls here are avoiding the "minor things" like jokes that may end up negatively creating relationships between Lions. Interestingly, people often think that silence by others means that they agree with or approve of what someone has said, but this is not accurate. Negative relationships can potentially lead to the disappearance of club members.

The final club action item among the nine I have been discussing this year is one that many Lions are likely to not see coming. Clubs need to figure out a way to equalize the volunteer labor of their members. I still remember being around a member of my club who was continuously involved in every club activity and then one day he wasn't a member anymore! What behavioral research has discovered is that volunteers can become so intensely involved in club activities that they eventually remove themselves from the club. Yes, participation in events is volunteerism, but club leaders need to control their activities and the involvement of members. Losing a very active member is a real loss!




This is another way of getting Lions in your club, new members and prospective members interested in doing something new and different. Getting involved is another word for WE SERVE.

Toccoa Lions Club = Toccoa Lions Club Accomplishments for 2009 – 2010 = The most significant work that the Toccoa Lions Club accomplished this year and in previous years is helping over eighty needy people in Stephens County with eye examinations and eye glasses. The local sight conservation program is our main focus each year. Over the past three years ending June 30, 2009 the Toccoa Lions have provided glasses to 250 Stephens County residents. The next most significant work of the Toccoa Lions Club is assisting the Open Arms Clinic. This free medical clinic started in February 2006 with seed money from the Toccoa Lions Club has served over 550 needy residents in Stephens County to date. The Toccoa Lions Club has held a pancake breakfast the last two years with all the proceeds going to the Open Arms Clinic. This year the club raised \$3,300.00 for the Open Arms Clinic. The next most significant work of the Toccoa Lions Club is assisting the Georgia Lions Lighthouse Foundation in Decatur. The Lions Lighthouse serves as a central clearing house and coordinates all the efforts of the 241 Lions Clubs in Georgia. In a typical year the Lighthouse will perform over 300 eve surgeries, provide glasses for over 2,500 needy Georgians and provide over 900 hearing aids for needy Georgians. This year the Toccoa Loins did a public solicitation in front of Wal-Mart during White Cane Days raising nearly \$1,000.00. This coupled with a matching grant from Wal-Mart will provide \$2,000.00 to the Lighthouse for operations. In addition to supporting the current needs of the Lighthouse the Toccoa Lions Club pledged \$10,000.00 toward the Lions Lighthouse capital campaign to build a new Lighthouse and expand services. \$1,000.00 of this pledge has been sent to the Lighthouse in April 2010. The Toccoa Lions provide a rest area during the Toccoa Harvest Festival the first weekend in November each year. This is a place for people to sit in the shade, drink water and rest. At the rest area the Toccoa Lions provide free vision screening tests. Over eighty people were screened during the Harvest Festival this year. The Toccoa Lions also provided vision screenings at the YMCA's Healthy Kids Day fair this April. The Toccoa Lions also work with youth by sponsoring a little league team in Stephens County. The club financially supports the Georgia Lions Camp for the Blind in Waycross, Camp Kudzu for diabetic children in Cleveland and the Top Five program with the Toccoa Rotary for graduating seniors for Stephens County High School. The Toccoa Lions also support financially the Leader Dog School for the Blind, The Recordings for the Blind and Dyslexic and Lions Club International Foundation. Toccoa Lions also collect used eye glasses, cases, hearing aids and cell phones. These are sent to the Georgia Lions Lighthouse Foundation where they are cleaned, refurbished and graded to determine the prescription of the lenses. Last year over 106,000 pairs of glasses were distributed to needy people in foreign countries by the Lions Lighthouse. Money to support all this programming is raised through a variety of fund raising activities all year long in our community. The generosity of people in Toccoa and Stephens County keep the Toccoa Lions programs vibrant. The Toccoa Lions publish a community calendar every year. They hold two pancake breakfasts and host a golf outing in March. The club sells flower bulbs in the fall, mops and brooms as well as walking sticks all year long. The Toccoa Lions sell at public craft fairs, farmers markets and the Harvest Festival. The Toccoa Lions operate a food concession during the Harvest Festival. The Toccoa Lions operate candy and nut vending machines in the community. The club also receives grants from the Mitchell-Allen Foundation and Wal-Mart during the year.

The grant puts us over half-way to our \$2.75 million dollar goal, but more important, it shows that others truly believe in the mission and direction of your Lighthouse. Lighthouse Capital Campaign FAQ:

How will individuals be recognized for their capital campaign contributions?

There will be a recognition wall at the new home of the Lighthouse. Permanent recognition for individuals starts at \$2,500. There will also be a directory of all donors in the new building. Please remember that pledges can be fulfilled over three years.

How will my club be recognized for its capital campaign contribution?

All clubs giving over \$1,000 will receive a commemorative banner patch. Clubs giving at the \$5,000, \$10,000, and \$15,000 levels will receive permanent recognition in the building. Naming opportunities are available from \$20,000.

Will my individual contribution count for my club?

On the recognition wall, individual and club contributions can be double counted. For example, say John Doe from Roaring Rock Lions Club contributes \$5,000 and his club contributes \$10,000. Lion John will be recognized as an individual at the \$5,000 level, and Roaring Rock will be recognized at the \$15,000 level.

Can my individual contribution count toward my club's pledged amount?

No. When Lions Clubs make pledges to the capital campaign, it is with the expectation that the amount of the pledge will come from the club's account. Any additional funds given by the individuals in a club will count toward the amount the club is recognized for in the end, but not toward the club's original pledge. 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SERVICE REPORTS:

Vision Clinic Report: In the first nine (9) months of this Lion's Year, we have served 2701 individuals at the Vision Clinics compared to 2051 individuals served for the same period last year. Funding for the Vision Clinics come from grants, which are great but not on going. March 22, 2010 was a big day for the Citizens of Dahlonega and Lumpkin County. It was on this date that the Dahlonega Vision Clinic officially opened. A total of 15 people needy citizens from Lumpkin County were touched when they received a thorough eye exam. For some it was their first eye exam. Special Thanks go out to the members of the Dahlonega Lions Club especially Lions Bill Mundy, David Lancaster, and Gary Vaughters who worked so hard over three years to see this clinic become a reality. I want to Thank Dr Lori Lebeau and Ms. Paula Payne for all their help. Let me encourage you to volunteer to work at one of the Clinics. By working at a Clinic you experience firsthand what Lionism is all about especially when the clients come up and Thank you for we are doing to help them.

Two hundred and thirty six individuals from 18-D have been served at the Clinics during the first nine (9) months of this year compared to 127 individuals for the same period last year. The total cost to operate the Clinics for the first nine (9) months of this Lion's Year is \$85,167.66.

Surgery Reports: In the first nine (9) months of this year, the Lighthouse has completed 211 surgeries compared to 263 surgeries for the same period last year. Forty one (41) needy citizens from 18-D have had surgeries in the first nine (9) months of this year compared to 28 for the same period last year. We knew that we could not do as many surgeries this year compared to last year because we overspent on surgeries last year. In addition to the fact that we are paying for initial evaluations. These are a few reasons why our surgery numbers are well below last year's figure.

The costs of surgeries in the first nine (9) months are \$1,599,096.53 after receiving discounts of \$1,273,995.07; The Lighthouse only paid \$325,101.46.

Hearing Aid Program: In the first nine (9) months of this year, the Lighthouse has touched the lives of 727 individuals by providing 1336 hearing aids compared to 1167 hearing aids to 634 individuals for the same period last year.

Eighty-three (83) needy citizens from District 18-D have received 153 hearing aids in the first (9) months of this year compared to 75 people receiving 139 hearing aids for the same period last year.

IBSSS grad Carroll Jackson tells Lions of changes in leader dog program

Last year, in Minneapolis, a group of Lions Club members gathered around the hotel welcome desk, trying to get directions to their meeting site during their Convention. The woman behind the desk was trying to tell the men which way to turn at which corner when a blind man with a leader dog walked up to the group with a message that left them dumbfounded: "Follow me."

That man was Carroll Jackson, a 1967 graduate of the Iowa Braille and Sight-Saving School.

Leading others in a world of changing technology is a way of life for Jackson, who went on to college after graduating from IBSSS. He eventually became a principal at the Ohio institute for the Blind and the Superintendent at the Illinois facility.

Jackson returned to Vinton, Iowa this week, where he shared with the Vinton Lions Club the changes he has experienced in technology and leader dog training that help a blind man who has never been to a city before safely and efficiently find his way around it.

First, Jackson showed the Lions the computer device he uses to obtain reading material. Virtually every book -- even college textbooks -- can be downloaded to the hand-held device within minutes. Then Jackson told the Lions that while the technology for obtaining reading materials has changed, the options of on-foot transportation for blind people is the same as it was decades ago: A white cane or a leader dog.

The difference between using a cane and a dog, Jackson told the Lions, is like the difference between having a driver's license and a pilot's license. Then he explained how GPS technology can help him find his way to any building in any city, with the help of his dog. The GPS tells him which street his is on, and which streets are near him.

"All I have to do is say 'find the door' or 'find the elevator' or 'find the room' and I am there," Jackson said. And the dog does the rest. Once the pair has found their way in a new city, the dog remembers the doors, elevators and even the way to the hotel room, he adds.

Jackson is totally blind, but he wears glasses that look like regular prescription lenses. It fools people into thinking he has sight. At one time, he had some tunnel vision. But now, he said, he is totally blind.

The Lions laughed on Tuesday when Jackson told his story about leading the group last year in Minneapolis. "That is not the response I got that day," he recalled. On that day, the group of Lions looked at him silently. Finally, one of them agreed to follow Jackson. The others went along. After the group arrived at the meeting site several blocks away from where they had begun, one of the men asked Jackson how long he had been in Minneapolis.

"It's my first day here," he said.

On another occasion, Jackson was able to use his GPS locator to tell a group of Australians how to find a restaurant for breakfast. He gave them specific directions to a Perkins restaurant. Later the group found him and told him that his directions were totally correct.

Jackson told the local Lions how he is trying to make this kind of safe and efficient mobility possible for more visuallyimpaired people.

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Heroes Growing up All Around You

Who would ever think that a life-enhancing, sometimes life-saving resource could begin as a fuzzy little puppy? At Leader Dogs for the Blind, that's exactly how each four-legged Leader Dog hero gets his start. Future Leader Dogs grow up in homes just like yours, all around the United States.

Volunteer Puppy Raisers name the puppies, teach them house manners, basic obedience and expose them to the world. Puppy raisers are volunteers who generously take puppies into their homes and provide them with health care, food and life experiences. Some raisers are able to bring the puppy to work with them.

"We would not be able to provide Leader Dogs at all if it weren't for volunteer puppy raisers. Right now we have about 400 puppies in 22 states and Canada growing up learning about the world around them. The exposure that the puppy raisers provide is an intricate part of the dog's extensive training needed to become a Leader Dog," said Beverly Blanchard, puppy program development manager for Leader Dogs for the Blind.

Creating a responsible candidate to become a Leader Dog entails a great deal of socialization. The more the puppy sees and experiences during the first year of its life, the more adapting and calm it will be when exposed to future experiences. Many puppy raisers expose their puppies to shopping malls, loud sirens, cats and other animals, different kinds of staircases and floor surfaces, busy sidewalks, bicycles, sporting events, grocery stores, churches and much more.

When the puppies return to Leader Dogs for the Blind, they are thoroughly evaluated for medical soundness and personality traits. Puppies that pass this evaluation are trained one-on-one for the next four months by a professional instructor. The instructor then carefully matches each Leader Dog with an individual who is legally blind. The team trains together at Leader Dogs for the Blind for a month before leaving the facility and returning home.

Leader Dogs are provided completely free to qualified individuals, including travel and 26 days of room and board at the Leader Dog facility. Leader Dogs for the Blind is funded by donations from Lions and Lioness Club members, individuals, foundations and corporations dedicated to community service.

Man's best friend brings help, smiles

A little girl tugged on her mom's pants and pointed at the yellow Labrador retriever strolling through a Harrisburg grocery store last week. A curious employee peered over a stack of fruit. Seagar didn't notice. He was working. Gloria Bush of Harrisburg pushed her son, Andy, in his wheelchair through the store as Seagar, Andy's trained assistance dog, tagged along.

The Bush family received 2-year-old Seagar in November from Canine Companions for Independence. Seagar responds to more than 50 commands. He uses his nose to push round handicapped buttons to open automatic doors when Gloria is pushing Andy's wheelchair, and he even helps take off Andy's socks. But for Andy, having Seagar around isn't about having a helping hand. It's about having a friend.

"Having Seagar around makes him smile," Gloria said. When Andy was 2 years old, he snuck out of the house and fell into a construction ditch filled with rainwater as he tried to reach a ball in the water. Gloria found him floating face down. He suffered brain damage as a result of lack of oxygen to the brain. Now 36 years old, Andy can't do much on his own. He requires help for basic tasks.

"Seagar is the perfect dog for Andy," said Gloria, explaining that Seagar isn't demanding of her time. "He's very giving." The Bush family was on Canine Companions for Independence's waiting list for two years before Andy, Gloria and her husband, Roy, were invited to the organization's southeast regional center in Orlando, Fla., for a two-week training session in November to learn commands and how to care for Seagar, whom they received for free. CCI, headquartered in California, gave out more than 240 assistance dogs last year. Seagar is meant to provide companionship and a means of socialization for Andy, said Martha Johnson, spokeswoman for CCI.

Seagar jumped to put his front paws on Andy's lap, drawing a grin from Andy. Seagar goes out to eat with the Bushes, and goes on walks with them around the Town Center neighborhood in Harrisburg. Gloria said Andy has been calmer and more content since they brought Seagar home.

"Where's Seagar?" Gloria asked her son. Andy glanced around the room and his eyes settled on Seagar sleeping on his pillow on the floor before looking back to his mother. "There's Seagar."

Special Diabetes Programs



Legislation to increase funding for diabetes research.

Since 1997, the Special Diabetes Programs have provided critical funding for diabetes research, prevention, and education at the Indian Health Service (IHS) and the National Institutes of Health (NIH). These are substantial type 1 diabetes research programs and prevention and treatment programs for Native American communities.

Legislative Update

- Sept. 29, 2009 H.R. 3668 was introduced in the House of Representatives by Reps. Diana DeGette (D-CO) and Mike Castle (R-DE), cochairs of the House Diabetes Caucus.
- March 3, 2010 S. 3058 introduced in the Senate by Senators Byron Dorgan (D-ND) and Susan Collins (R-ME). <u>Take Action!</u>
- Both bills will renew the Special Diabetes Programs for five years and includes \$200 million per year in federal funding for each program.

Special Statutory Funding Program for Type 1 Diabetes Research (SDP-Type 1)

SDP-Type 1 is special funding for research on the prevention and cure of type 1 diabetes. It provides researchers the chance they need to carry out long-term research that can have an impact on thousands of lives.

SDP-Type 1 has lead to real advances in many areas of type 1 diabetes research. Demonstrating an excellent return on federal investment, it has yielded advances in drugs and therapies for halting and reversing diabetic complications.

Special Diabetes Program for Indians (SDPI)

SDPI gives Indian health programs and tribal communities the resources and tools they need to both prevent and treat diabetes. <u>American Indians</u> and Alaska Natives have the highest age-adjusted prevalence of diabetes among all U.S. racial and ethnic groups – nearly 17%!

SDPI funding has led to demonstrated and continued improvements in diabetes prevention and care in American Indian and Alaska Native communities. These improvements ultimately benefit all people with diabetes.

Funding nearly 400 community-directed programs, local tribes and health programs are provided the opportunity to set priorities that meet the needs of the community, whether it be prevention activities or treatment.

These needed programs help translate the science of diabetes into real-world settings by providing improved care for our patients and prevention efforts that are turning the hope of a diabetes-free future into a reality.

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

International Friendships

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The International Club Twinning Program is a voluntary and mutual agreement between clubs in different countries. Lions and Leos can participate; however, twinning must occur between like clubs (i.e., Lions with Lions, Leos with Leos).

Twinning provides an opportunity to learn about another club and its culture. Club twins actively illustrate the Third Purpose of the Association, *To create and foster a spirit of understanding among the peoples of the world*.

Members of international organizations often develop international friendships. This is certainly true of Lions and Leos who attend international forums or conventions. After an initial meeting, Lions or Leos often continue their friendship through long-distance correspondence. After many months or years, the two clubs may decide to formalize their friendship as international club twins.

At this time, the two clubs may decide to sign the International Club Twinning Recognition Application (IAD 603) and become club twins. Often, the clubs organize a formal signing ceremony to celebrate the official club twinning relationship.
