We still need to form some new LEO clubs and campus clubs. Our greatest challenge is to stop the loss of our members. Many good Lions are dropping out of our clubs. We need to determine why and correct the problem.

Our main goal has been and will continue to be service to our communities. You have certainly met that goal. You have lived out our motto, "We Serve" in communities all over Northeast Georgia. District 18-D has been instrumental in helping our Lighthouse move into a new home this year. We have exceeded our goal for the Lighthouse Capital Campaign. At the same time, we have supported our Camp for the Blind with monetary donations and many hours of work at the Camp work weekends.

The culmination of our year was the MD-18 Lions Convention in Tifton this past weekend. Our District was recognized with awards from the Camp for the Blind for having the largest percentage of our clubs donating to the Camp (86.51%). Our District also donated the largest amount of money in the State to RFB & D (\$8298.00). Club Excellence Awards were presented to: Small Clubs: Lawrenceville,  $1^{st}$  and Norcross  $2^{nd}$ ; Medium Clubs: Clarkesville,  $1^{st}$  and Clermont/North Hall,  $2^{nd}$ ; and Large Clubs: Union County,  $1^{st}$ , Snellville,  $2^{nd}$ , and Oconee  $3^{rd}$ . Thanks for all the hard work all the clubs have done this year!

Individual awards that were given were Lion Pete Stamsen, Lawrenceville Lions Club, Presidential Leadership Award; PDG Dick Smith, Oconee Lions Club, International Presidential Medal; PDG Beverly Shirley, Ervin-Crumbley Award (the highest award given in MD-18). Presidential Certificates of Appreciation were awarded to Cabinet Secretary-Treasurer PDG Steve Hart, Lion Lisa Little, Union County Lions Club, and District Governor Elect Ron Bennetti. Progressive Melvin Jones Fellows were awarded to PDG Ed Hashbarger (9 yrs.) and District Governor Grace Clower (1st yr.).

At our Cabinet Meeting in April, Presidential Certificates of Appreciation were awarded to Lion Judy Stamsen, Lawrenceville Lions Club and Lion Susan Hart, Snellville Lions Club. Melvin Jones Fellows were presented to Lion Herman Mooney, Martin Lions Club and Lion Dot Hunt, Jefferson Lions Club.

I wish I had an award to present to every Lion in 18-D. Without every one of you, we would not have accomplished any of this. It has been my honor and privilege to serve as the District Governor of the best district in the State of Georgia. I hope you will give your full support to incoming District Governor Ron Bennetti and his team.

# INTENT TO LEVY AND COLLECT ADDITIONAL PER CAPITA TAX OF \$3.00

MD 18 CONSTITUTION—Article VI - SECTION 2— DISTRICT ADMINISTRATIVE FUND— (b) In addition to the Multiple District Annual per capita tax levied upon each Member of the Lions Clubs in the State by Article VI, Section 1, the individual Districts of this State are authorized and empowered to levy and to collect an additional per capita tax, up to, but not to exceed, Three Dollars (\$3.00) upon each member of the Lions Clubs in their respective Districts, subject to the following terms and conditions: (1) Notice of intention to levy and collect said additional per capita tax and notice of the maximum amount to be levied and collected must be forwarded to the Secretary and President of each Club in said District at least ten days prior to the date of the first Cabinet Meeting is to be held for said year. (2) Levy and collection of said tax, the exact amount thereof and the date on which the same shall be levied and collected shall be approved by a two-thirds affirmative vote of the members of the District Governor's Cabinet present at the first meeting of said Cabinet for the year.





# Giving Veterans and Their Families a Chance to Heal

For many veterans returning home from combat, reconnecting with their families is a challenge. It takes time and understanding to readjust after living apart – often for more than a year – and for many veterans' families, there is no help.

# The Lions Step In

Lions in Minnesota saw a need to help veterans and their families so they worked with Minnesota's Veteran's Affairs Department to establish Project New Hope. Through this Lionsfunded project, veterans and their families attend retreats free-of-charge and receive time and counseling to reconnect and grow together.

Lions at the camp work hands-on; organizing the retreats, cooking and cleaning, and providing daycare and counseling around the clock. Open to all combat veterans, the Lions are currently

# Dual Strategy and the Ginkgo Leadership Award

# Receiving Help Leads to Helping Others

After being hit by three roadside bombs during his tour in Iraq, SSG (ret) Mike Mills had burns on 35 percent of his body. Mike and his wife came to one of Project New Hope's first retreats and received help.

"When you're in the military, you're told to suck up and drive on. If you accept help, you're weak. And if you go for help, you're going to be passed over for promotion and that's not true. ... We need the help," said Mike.

Mike and his wife are now Lions and members of the project's advisory panel. After donating their time at these retreats, many counselors from the Veterans Administration also became Lions. All of the counselors are veterans, including one active duty major who is on the project's board of directors. She recently became a Lion as well.

#### Fast Facts

To date, 150 veterans and their families have been helped by these retreats. Retreats have been attended by single veterans, couples and families as large as eight. Leisure activities at the retreats include hiking, canoeing, kayaking, swimming, archery, sledding, fishing, ice fishing, arts and crafts, and more. It takes approximately 10 to 15 Lions to plan and execute each retreat.

He had so much fun and was able to share that with his little sister," said Melissa Bowman.

"We left such an impression with them, but I think they left a bigger impression with us," commented Leigh Ann Akard, Zionsville Lion.

The 125 Zionsville Lions Club members organize and run the three-day Fall Festival in Lions Park with crowds of approximately 20,000. More than 500 guests attend the VIP carnival, including several from other states. The club has received many heartfelt thank yous. And, the number of smiles is priceless.

# MEMBERSHIP RETENTION: NECROLOGY SERVICE LIONS OF GEORGIA: 89<sup>th</sup> ANNUAL STATE CONVENTION

Yesterday I returned home from an extremely active weekend of participation in this year's Lions State Convention! Except for a couple of short nights of sleeping, for two and one-half days I attended numerous official Lion programs, ate breakfasts, lunches, and dinners, attended evening hospitality parties, and, without exception, I was continuously surrounded by Lions. Not only was I surrounded by Lions, I was seemingly always interacting with them. Yes, several of these Lions have been Lion friends of mine for various lengths of time, but now I also have better connections to some Lions I haven't known very well in the past and I've begun to be linked to a few Lions I met for the first time. Here is my question for you: What did you do on this weekend? That is, if you weren't attending our state Lions' convention, did you do something that helped strengthen the relationships between you and other Lions?

What about the other members of your club? Did they attend? What about your newer Lion members? Did they travel to Tifton and attend the convention? Indeed, it would have been especially retention helpful if your newer members had attended the convention with you. Not only would you have been strengthening the relationships between you and your newer Lions, but they would have been in an environment in which they would have left the weekend with a much better grasp of what Lions do throughout the state. I do understand the fact that Lions can't attend every Lions' event, but sometimes we fail to understand that attending events like state conventions will improve a club's membership retention.

A few of the programs I attended were membership retention related. However, there is one yearly program that is totally retention focused. Every year our state convention holds a Necrology Service program. Unlike your personal decision as to whether you attended our state convention or not, these Lions could not attend. That is, these Lions died this year. There is nothing on the necrology list that indicates how many years these individuals had been Lions, but it is clear that they had been club members in good standing when they left this life. Under other conditions, a club would no doubt have already have removed them as members. Significantly, only these Lions fully met the Lions Retention Vision Statement I posted on my list of club retention action items. These club members had been "Lions for Life."

What is done in the Necrology Service program is collectively recognize these former Lions for their life-time of service. Prayers are given, a memorial message, a verbal calling out of each Lion's name, and Taps is personally played. It is unfortunate that we lost these Lions this year, but the death of members is something that clubs have no avoidance actions to take. Nevertheless, if the passing of Lions was our only club member retention loss, our yearly loss of members would have been less than 2%.

- (d) What can you do as a club to get new members? Ask them!!
- (e) My goal as your next District Governor is to bring each club with less than 20 members up to more than 20 members; is that too much to ask? Can your club meet that goal?
- (f) How would your club go about this Task?

# Re-ignite


Caring, Sharing and Service...




