State News



SE AREA GLT COORDINATOR, MD 18 CONSTITUTION & BY-LAWS CHAIR AND MD 18 LONG RANGE PLANNING CHAIR – LION C. MARK MILLER, PCC:

Very specific changes will affect 2nd Vice District Governors. District Governor training next year will be totally different from anything done in the past. It will be a regionalized training. PCC Miller will be in charge of training all the District Governors Elect in the southeast. District Governors Elect will still go to International Convention but only about a day in advance and there will be some celebration and promotion but the training will be on an area basis, and the southeast area is seven states.

Lion Miller discussed the Forum. He pointed out that PID Beverly Roberts has been added to the Forum Committee for next year in charge of Seminars. Tampa is the site for next year's forum. He stated that he has been asked to talk with the Council and if it would be appropriate, they may need some help in host staffing at the event next year, 2012, and whether or not we could officially solicit people to sign up to be a part of the host team for Tampa. He asked for permission to use the state magazine to promote hosting opportunities in Tampa. DG Bethel, 18-A, made a motion to promote working with Tampa on hosting the Forum; motion seconded by DG Phillips, 18-F, and motion carried.

PCC Miller stated that President Tam's emphasis this quarter is on the family and treating Lions as family. Treat people like family. Be up front with each other; confront the conflict on the conflict not about the person. The focus should be on building positive futures. President Tam encourages Lions to Plant Trees – start with a seedling, plant it, nourish it, let it grow healthy and strong – this is the same in regards to membership. We are family.

July 3rd fireworks, we sell hamburgers, hot dogs, chips, soda, pop corn, Hot Boiled Peanuts. We also have a Duck race. Then at dark we have our fireworks. People came from Florida, Alabama, and Carolina.

During Champaign Sight First 11, Lake Seminole club is one of three Clubs in 18- C that was identified as a model club.

We have Harvest Festival in Donalsonville in October; we also give out Christmas Baskets. We help people in our community, and assist with our Spring Creek Volunteer Fire Department. We also give to our State and International Outreach projects.

The big push for our club was the 16th Annual John Garner Memorial Lions Charity Golf Tournament Fundraiser. This is our biggest fundraiser for the year that allows us to pay for all the nonprofits we support as well as other community work. We start planning the tournament beginning January and the drive for sponsors, golf teams, and donations for silent auction and raffle items gets really hectic in June, July, and August. The tournament was held August 31, 2011.

October 24 through 26 we will have 2 tents at the Dawsonville Moonshine Festival. One will be for eye and diabetes screening and the other will sell food and drink for our second largest fundraiser for the year. Hope to see other Lions from our district here. You'll have a good time.

There is one sad note to advise. One of our long standing contributors passed away in August. She supported our scholarship effort for many years as she believed strongly in education. Her brother, George David, is a long standing Dawsonville Lion. Reverend Nancy Noblin will be missed. Many Dawsonville Lions attended her celebration of life at the Humane Society and also helped shuttle friends to the service which had limited parking.

The story goes like this: Football season is here! I'm sure there will be some times when you might ask yourself, as you spend 3-4 hours in the concession stand, "Why am I doing this?" Four words should suffice: MAKING OTHERS LIVES BETTER. The same holds true for why we go door-to-door selling brooms and stand out in the hot sun taking up money on White Cane Day. Because We Serve, others' lives are better. I didn't get my first pair of glasses until Jr. High. Before then, I always sat on the front row in class so I could see the blackboard, and I suffered from what we called "sick headaches" when trying to read my homework assignments. I have extreme nearsightedness (when I'm wearing glasses instead of contacts, it looks like I'm wearing Coke bottles!). But after I got my glasses, the headaches went away. And I couldn't believe it. I could actually see individual leaves on trees! And they were so bright!

There are children in Screven County just that way today, but their parents can't afford to get them glasses. So they continue to sit at the front of the room (if they're not too embarrassed) and have those headaches trying to read their homework assignments. There are also older folks who take the wrong amounts of medications because they forgot what the pharmacist said and can't read the prescription label. Others may have lost their jobs or can't get a job because they can't read well. And forget about reading a newspaper! Life for them is really a blur.

This year we have budgeted about \$4,200.00 for our Sight Conservation Program. We do expect a rise in applications and have been prepared. We also give to our Camp for the Blind, Leader Dog and Lighthouse. Besides much more for our community. We also do our Soup Kitchen. We gave 90 cases of water had been taken to the recreation department as a good will gesture.

One item of importance is having good Programs – we try to have a good mix with Lions programs and other programs from within the community and outside of the community. Such as more understanding of the SPLOST program, Air EVAC, other community affairs of interest and the list goes on.

LION GARY VAUGHTERS, CHAIR, GA LIONS LIGHTHOUSE FOUNDATION, INC.:

Proudly, I share with you that the Georgia Lions Lighthouse Optical Shop has now produced over 1,000 pairs of glasses for clients all across Georgia. We are now making glasses for all of our clinic locations ahead of schedule. 2010-11 presented excitement along with challenges for all of us. The Optical Shop was the final part of our expansion plan. The efficiencies the new facility provides allowed us to provide more service for less cost. The timing for these efficiencies could have not come at a better time. Our total revenue was \$1,642,286 for last year. This is \$128,406 less than the previous year and we ended the year \$48,618 in the red. We anticipated a difficult year and had saved previous years' excess revenue to cover this shortfall without difficultly.

Today many non-profits are not only reducing services, some are closing their doors and leaving needy citizens with fewer options to find help. However, the Georgia Lions Lighthouse is providing service to more fellow Georgians than in our long history.

In the first two months of this year alone the clinic program has served 721 individuals with 665 pairs of glasses with many of the glasses being produced in our own shop. The efficiencies created with the new facilities has reduced the per person cost significantly so each donated dollar goes further. Details of how our clubs may utilize the Optical Lab will be shared as soon as we are ready to serve more than our clinics.

59 individuals have received assistance with surgery to preserve their sight. The average cost of surgery is declined to just over \$1,100 due to great negotiations with hospitals and even greater relations with our medical providers.

The hearing program is remaining constant with 173 individuals receiving 321 new hearing aids. We are providing all the hearing aids our contract with the Public Service Commission affords us to provide. Executive Director Lennon and some Board Members have met individually with all of the members of the Public Service Commission to preserve, and hopefully increase, our contract to provide hearing services.

Our partnerships continue to pay dividends on our investment. Lions Club International is assisting us with lens for the optical laboratory. We requested 4, 000 new lens from LCI and were graciously given 10,000. We wanted to serve more children; grants have been made available to allow us to go into some school systems to provide exams and glasses as needed for the underserved. In addition, a new program will allow us to serve band students with hearing protection and education about noise levels that can cause hearing damage. These and other partnerships are bringing multiple positive results to those in need all across the state. More about these exciting programs will be shared at the Joint Meeting banquet this Saturday.

I ask each of you to continue encouraging our clubs to maintain and, when possible, increase their support both financially and through other means for their Georgia Lions Lighthouse. Everyone's support is needed and appreciated as we carry out our mission. In exchange for your support, I commit to continuing excellent service at an amazingly low cost for all.


Demand for Surgery Rises Due to Economy (from the 2011 Annual Report)

As of this year, the Lighthouse is the only organization providing eye assistance to Georgians in financial need. That Lighthouse partners with ophthalmologists and hospitals to provide over 300 sight-saving surgeries each year.

Notes from a First Timer to the US/Canada Forum

I normally do not attend "Orientation" sessions but I did at this Forum and it really paid dividends. Not only did I learn what was going on but I got to hear our new LCI President Tam speak and I got a picture of President Tam and myself. Of course, I was holding my mouth open in the picture but what the heck, I got a picture with LCI President Tam.

The first seminar I attended was on LCI & the National Eye Institute (NEI). I found that the NEI is an excellent source for information on Fighting Blindness. The great thing is that the information is basically free and they let us brand it with the Lions Logo. Contact information is: www.nei.nih.org or Rosie 301-496-5248.

I attended two seminars on using the internet to improve our Lions communications, both with members and with the public. One seminar was "Web-Conferencing 101" and the other seminar was "I Believe in the Power of Websites". Both of these seminars were general information and motivation presentations and did not get into too many specifics. Besides websites they discuss social media such as Facebook, Twitter and web conferencing products such as Skype, etc. Once you decide to use some of these products the questions become: Who is going to develop the site/product for your club? Who is going to develop the content about your club? Who is going to maintain the site/product? And how much is it going to cost? On the cost issue, if you go too cheap you will defeat the whole process because a site that is not updated on a regular basis is just as bad as having no site at all. Some suggestions on how to control cost include having a member write and maintain the site/products, have students from a local school or college help the club with developing and maintaining the site/product or using a professional developer. Our club uses a Seminary student, Kevin Lockey kevinlockey201@comcast.net, to maintain our site. He does charge a little but mostly it is service of his time. I would say your best option is to get a member to maintain your site/product, then a student and finally a paid professional.

Using the internet effectively might be a good project for our District Governor Ed to sponsor. Let DG Ed know what you think.

I also attended a seminar about the Hadley School for the Blind. This is a free resource that every Lion should

know about. Hadley provides free educational services to people who are visually impaired. This is a great organization. I have taken several courses from Hadley myself and I can personally verify that they are a great and effective organization. If someone approaches your organization asking for help, this is a great place to refer them. Contact information is www.hadley.edu.

I attended several other seminars and all were very good and the presenters were well prepared. I would encourage anyone who gets a chance to attend a US/Canada Forum. It will be worthwhile.

I would like to close with some comments on our roles as Lions and our mission of "Knights of the Blind". My trip to Alaska was long, five different airline flights. I was wearing my Lions gear, so it was obvious that I was a Lion. On two occasions I was approached by people with severe visual impairment asking for information on how to get help. I gave them verbal information but I was woefully unprepared. The lessons I learned from this is 1) Wearing Lion gear will let people know what organization you are part of, 2) Always carry a Lions Business Card so you can give contact information, and 3) develop a list of resources that visually impaired people can use. I personally am going to develop a 3 by 5 card that list organizations such as the Lighthouse, Hadley, etc. that I can pass out in the future.

Chris McNamee & Max

Chris McNamee remembers all too well his life before Max. Chris suffers from Retinitis Pigmentosa, a progressive, degenerative retinal disease. He remembers losing his peripheral and night vision. He remembers people tripping over his cane and then scolding him for not watching where he was going. He vividly remembers not seeing the large column in a client's building. Five stitches later, not to mention his bruised dignity, Chris decided to research guide dogs. He discovered Southeastern Guide Dogs and graduated with a delightfully intelligent yellow lab named Max in 2007.

He recalls his apprehension before coming to campus for training. "I never had a dog before," he shares. "But the school is so friendly and relaxed...they made it easy!" Max changed everything. "Max has restored my confidence and mobility," Chris says. "Now I can go anywhere."

Today, Chris, his wife Lynn, and Max have become unofficial ambassadors for Southeastern Guide Dogs. When vision loss forced Chris to retire, the McNamees moved from Wisconsin to Lakewood Ranch just to be near campus. They were drawn there by Southeastern Guide Dogs' generosity and the warm Florida sunshine.

"We felt a calling to come, to help and promote the school wherever we could," Chris says. When they built a beautiful new dog-friendly home, they held an open house fundraiser. Chris often speaks at civic and social groups about the impact the school has made on his independence. And during the McNamee's world travels, Max instantly breaks the ice for conversations about Southeastern Guide Dogs.

"It's an amazing school providing the amazing gift of mobility," Chris shares. "And we are blessed to be a part of it!"





The Omega-3 Connection



Children at increased risk for developing type 1 diabetes may benefit from getting more omega-3 fatty acids in their diets.

The Diabetes Autoimmunity Study in the Young enrolled 1,770 children who either had genes associated with

the development of type 1 or a siding or parent with type 1. Researchers found that children who ate foods high in omega-3s were less likely to develop antibodies associated with type 1 diabetes.

Between 1994 and 2006, parents of the children enrolled in the study answered yearly questionnaires about their children's diet. The questionnaires asked how often, on average, their children ate certain foods, with possible answers ranging from "never" to "more than 6 times per day." Meals known to be high in omega-3s—such as canned tuna, shellfish, and "dark meat" fish such as salmon, mackerel, and swordfish—were specifically included.

The children had yearly blood tests that measured antibodies associated with type 1. If a child developed such antibodies, he or she then had blood drawn every 3 to 6 months for the remainder of the study. The researchers also measured blood glucose for children with antibodies. At study's end, the researchers found that children who were reported to have had the highest intake of omega-3s had a 55-percent lower risk of developing antibodies associated with type 1.

This study was published in the Sept. 26, 2007, issue of the *Journal of the American Medical Association*.

A Sense of Where They Are: Children, Parents, and Lows

* * * * * * * * * * * *

Severe low blood glucose (hypoglycemia) can be terrifying and dangerous. In the worst cases, seizures or coma can result. Preventing hypoglycemia can be especially challenging for children. But it may be even more difficult for their parents, according to a new study.



The research, published in the Mar. 2008 issue of *Pediatrics*, tested the ability of 6- to 11-year-olds with type 1 diabetes and their parents to accurately estimate blood glucose. "They both did terribly, but the parents were even worse," says lead author Linda Gonder-Frederick, PhD, an associate professor at the University of Virginia.

The 61 families enrolled in the study estimated the children's current blood glucose three to four times a day, in addition to those times when they thought the glucose might be too low or high. The researchers then compared their estimates with actual measures of the children's blood glucose.

After 70 blood glucose estimation trials over one month, the researchers tallied the scores. Children did somewhat better than their parents, detecting hypoglycemia 54 percent of the time, compared with 41 percent for their parents. The researchers were particularly concerned to see parents guessing a high level 17 percent of the time when the blood glucose was actually low.

"Clinically, it's a very serious error, because you would take the opposite treatment actions," says Gonder-Frederick. For example, a parent working under the assumption that a child is hyperglycemic may limit food intake, which could make hypoglycemia worse.

During six months of follow-up, the researchers sent an e-mail to parents every two weeks asking how many times their children experienced severe hypoglycemic episodes. They found that children who scored lowest on detecting hypoglycemia during the trial period were most likely to suffer severe hypoglycemia. "That's one of the major take home messages," says Gonder-Frederick: "Hypoglycemia unawareness is a risk factor for future severe hypoglycemia."

Children were worse at estimating their glucose levels if they were younger, had fluctuating levels, or were depressed. And yet anxiety seemed to help children detect hypoglycemia. "Anxiety is associated with hyper vigilance," explains Gonder-Frederick. "Hypervigilance of symptoms ... can cause people to be more aware of body changes." Of course, anxiety brings its own problems in the form of stress and unhappiness.

As for parents, the duration of their child's diabetes and the ability to recognize symptoms of hypoglycemia improved blood glucose estimation accuracy. Yet, surprisingly, better predictions by parents did not translate into a reduction of severe hypoglycemia. "One thing we learned: Parents of young children need a lot more education on hypoglycemia. A lot more," says Gonder-Frederick, noting that she and her colleagues are developing a training course to help fill that need.

Lions Young Leaders In Service Award

The <u>Lions Young Leaders in Service Award</u> allows Lions the opportunity to give formal recognition to young volunteers with in their community, ages 12-18, who have completed 50 or 100 hours of community service, within a 12-month period.

MD 18 SERVICES FOR CHILDREN – CO-CHAIR LION MARK BRADLEY:

With this being my first year serving the Lions of Georgia in this capacity, my initial objective has been to familiarize myself with the many programs available to us that will involve our youth in Lionism. I am also looking for opportunities to speak to clubs in hopes of identifying more leaders with a passion for the youth in our communities so that we can localize our goals and implement programs that are community specific. In addition to the various programs offered through Lions International, the following are some of the programs that I am suggesting Georgia Lions incorporate into their plans for now and in the future:

*Dictionary Program: This is a valuable program that will enable any size club the opportunity to provide the third and fourth graders in their area dictionaries at very little cost to the club. For \$1.75

we can give these children their own Student Dictionary. According to the latest figures available, we have 1241 qualifying public schools in Georgia with over 131,000 third graders. As of this report, only about 6.29% of these students had received dictionaries. Info at www.dictionaryproject.org

*GACHIP: This would be a great opportunity for Lions Clubs to partner with another organization in providing child identification packets to the parents and guardians of Georgia. Since 2007, the Georgia Masons have been involved in a program that offers, at no charge to the parents, a packet for each child that includes all personal data, a DNA sample, five digital fingerprints, four digital photographs and a brief video/audio interview of the child. This is all burned to a CD which the parent takes with them, leaving none of the information with anyone involved in the program. These are done at local school events. community festivals and other youth related activities. In addition to needing partner organizations, the Masons have been assisted at many events by young people in the Order of DeMolay, Rainbow Girls, Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts, Church Youth Groups as well as many of our own children. To date, over 59,000 children have been processed. Info at www.gachip.org

*Tree Planting: This would be a perfect way to include the youth in our communities in an environmental program that impacts them immediately. Through a pilot study by the Georgia Forestry Commission's Sustainable Community Forest Program called The School Yard Shade Program, Gaines Elementary School in Athens participated in an effort to demonstrate how tree placement can offset the negative effects of ultraviolet light and high temperatures on a school landscape. This could soon be available at many other schools. Also, many Georgia communities are now hosting Arbor Day activities during the third week of February culminating in tree planting ceremonies on Friday that involve many civic organizations. Many times these could include youth organizations such as our Leo Clubs, Boy Scout troops, Girl Scout troops and Boys & Girls Club Members. As an active member of the Jackson County Boys & Girls Club Board of Directors, I have seen firsthand the pride that these children take in being a part of this program. *Liberty Day: This program is provided by a non-profit group dedicated to providing the tools necessary to teach students about The Constitution of the United States. Even the smallest clubs can distribute booklets containing the Constitution, as well as The Declaration of Independence to children in their communities at very little cost. For as little as \$1.00 per booklet, we can better educate our next generation about the principles and values that this country was founded on. I have ordered a small supply of materials to help get me started. Info at www.libertyday.org

Engage Youth Through Lions Quest

To aid Lions in beginning and expanding Lions Quest in their communities, a number of new materials are available. A new video highlights the success of the program in urban areas, including in Baltimore, Maryland, USA. A new Howto-Kit includes a video to show the program's success globally as well as a step-by-step guide for implementing the program.



Tooele City Raises Hopes and Lowers Risk with Lions Quest

Tooele City, Utah, decided that local schools needed some retooling. In 2003, Tooele City's youth were found to have the greatest level of risk in antisocial behavior, lack of commitment to school, and family conflict. The Lions Quest program was selected by Communities That Care (CTC), a community

coalition committed to supporting youth, to help address those issues. Lions Quest has the full support of Tooele



County School

District and has been required curriculum in all 6th grade classrooms since 2006.

"Teachers love how it helps to facilitate a structured way to promote bonding within the classroom, and how it gives students a chance to vent and talk about real life issues while in school," explained CTC School Programs Coordinator Heidi Schofield.

The program also gives students the chance to connect with the community. Tooele City schools partnered with the local police department to teach the Lions Quest drug, tobacco and alcohol prevention unit. Valley Mental Health donated backpacks so Lions Quest students could decorate them with antidrug and -tobacco messages and pictures. Growing up may not be easy, but with backpacks, and the caring community in Tooele City, the burden gets easier to carry.



Dear Lion,

As a parent and grandparent, one area of service that is especially important to me is programs that benefit our youth. Our Foundation offers this service opportunity through Lions Quest. Our kids are learning more than what is printed in a textbook; they are developing vital skills that will



fully prepare them for their teen and adult years. I've witnessed the success of this program from my home state of North Carolina, USA, to Thailand.



Lions in these areas and around the world know the value Lions Quest has for kids. It's exciting that this program continues to grow each year, and this is only

possible because of you, Lions. Just last month during our Lions Quest Advisory Committee Meeting, we awarded <u>26 grants</u> for more than US\$1.2 million-a new record! Three of these grants are for France, the Republic of Georgia and Slovenia to begin the program, bringing the total number of Lions Quest countries to 69.

We are also working with new partners and organizations to help us in our expansion efforts. In August, a training workshop was held for 31 teachers and personnel from Joint Base Lewis McChord, a U.S. military installation in the state of Washington. These educators will use Lions Quest to positively impact the lives of kids whose parents have been repeatedly deployed for active duty. With grant funding from the U.S. State Department, we will adapt Lions Quest materials for use in Africa and expand our programs in five countries. And many Lions have successfully partnered with their local

governments and ministries of education. In Lithuania, for example, the Lions received a 500,000 Euro grant from the European Union to expand the program nationwide.

We are eager to work with you, and I encourage you to appoint a Lions Quest chairperson in your district, if you do not have one, to help lead this effort locally. I invite all of you to learn more about this important program during the area Forums, where we will have a Lions Quest seminar or training. If you are unable to attend, all of these materials will be available on our new LCIF Web site.
