State News



Council received reports or comments as follows:

PAST INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT – LION JAMES E. “JIM” ERVIN:

PIP Jim Ervin thanked everyone for the cards, letters and calls from everyone when he had his hip replacement. He thanked Kembra for the great job she is doing. He recognized PIDs Dr. John Pearce, Myers Banister and Beverly Roberts for their continued support. PIP Ervin stated that they have continuously tried to keep the Executive Officers in touch with President Carter and with the Carter Center and all the staff to keep our programs doing well and let them have a real clear understanding of the importance of it not only for Lions Clubs International but for the Lions of Georgia. On February 12 and 13 the International President and his wife, VP Corlew and his wife, and chairman of the Foundation will be there, and ID Kembra Smith will be there representing MD 18.

PIP Ervin discussed the KidSight Program. He asked Governors to go through the material and to see how exciting this program is. There is a lot of opportunity to use the material. He stated this is a great opportunity to screen six month to six year old children and also offers the chance for membership growth.

PIP Ervin discussed the Centennial Program. The GMT Program was discussed. PIP Ervin stated that MD 18 is losing clubs and members and he felt not enough effort was being made to keep the membership up.

CC Newby stated that it has been suggested that possibly the Lighthouse Directors from each District might head up the KidSight Program Committee. DG Hubbard, 18-I, made a motion that the District Lighthouse Directors be the District representatives to KidSight. DG Nedza, 18-N, seconded the motion. Discussion followed. DG Andrews, 18-L, stated that he was worried that the District Director might be overloaded. Vote taken - Motion carried.

INTERNATIONAL DIRECTOR – LION KEMBRA SMITH:

ID Smith stated it was good to be back in Georgia. She stated that Board Members have been advised about the International Convention bids, but they will not receive them for another 60 days or so. She pointed out that she is already getting mailings from some of the other cities who are bidding, so hopefully the Atlanta Convention Center will get something out. She stated she has been distributing the peanut pins.

ID Smith asked PIP Jim Ervin to bring Council up to date on the Board Meeting Proposal for Savannah. PIP Ervin stated that Dr. Yamada and staff will be in Savannah the week of March 2nd for about 4 days. PDG Chris Barbieri is the host Chair in Savannah, and he has asked some of the people in this room and others to be a part of the Committee and they will meet on Tuesday morning the 3rd, so that they can get a full update of what the host committee’s responsibilities are, and after that they will come to the Council with a proposed budget, possible fund raising efforts, special uniform, and some special events that can be held.

CC Newby thanked ID Kembra for her efforts on behalf of the Lions of Georgia and her representation on the International Board.

PAST INTERNATIONAL DIRECTOR – Dr. BEVERLY ROBERTS:

Dr. Roberts thanked the Council for the work they are doing. She stated that exciting things are coming up, and she knows the Council is looking forward to these. Dr. Roberts discussed Protocol. She stated that Protocol is good manners, and shows that you have respect for visiting dignitaries. She stated that she has worked with some of the Governors and Convention Chairs, and that she is available to help and advise in any way possible. This can be done over the computer, or the phone. PID Roberts stated that we have a great state and great Lions and we need to impress our visiting dignitaries and not embarrass ourselves.

PAST INTERNATIONAL DIRECTOR – W.MYERS BANISTER :

PID Banister congratulated the Council on the work accomplished up to this point. He apologized that he was not able to attend the last two Council Meetings due to health issues. He stated that he would not be able to attend any of the District Conventions other than 18-I this year.

PAST INTERNATIONAL DIRECTOR – DR. JOHN PEARCE:

Dr. Pearce stated that he was going to defer to more important parts on the agenda this morning.

REPORT OF STATE CONVENTION – LION BONNIE KELLY, DG 18-0:

A. DG Kelly stated that Georgia Taylor, Convention General Chair for the 2015 Tifton State Convention, could not be present today. DG Kelly talked with PDG Georgia via phone and items were discussed as follows: Hospitality Room will be in the building behind the Holiday Inn Express. The caterer will also handle food for the Hospitality Room. Total registrations at this time -130. The PDG Reception will be held at the College. The Wednesday night pre Council Meeting and the Thursday morning Council Meeting will be held at the Comfort Inn & Suites. CC Newby encouraged District Governors to promote and advertise the Tifton Convention and try to get at least 300 to attend the Convention. The Convention Agenda is being finalized by the Council. The Committee needs to know the number of rooms needed for Training and Seminars, and the seating needed for each. Committee also needs to know how much space they will need for Vendors. If the DGs know of any vendors, please put them in contact with PDG Taylor, so they will know how to plan for that. The Past District Governors Reception has been planned for and the \$2.00 per person has been included in the fee being paid. Each District was asked to remit their \$150.00 to the Committee (for the Hospitality Room) at least a month before the Convention. A speaker for the Convention has not yet been secured, but this is being handled, and information will be forthcoming.

B. CC Newby stated that the 2016 Callaway Gardens Convention contract has been approved and work begun on that Convention.

C. Council Chair Newby stated that the Convention Committee is still working with Jekyll Island to try to get the costs down. There will be a report before the end of the year. He stated the Atlanta Peachtree Lions Club is in a holding pattern until it is known if Jekyll will work out for 2017.

D. CC Newby encouraged anyone interested in pursuing a convention for the Lions of Georgia to get preliminary information and submit it to the State Convention Committee for their investigation or to the State Office or Council Chair.

REPORT OF INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION CHAIR – LION CHIP NEDZA, DG 18-N:

DG Nedza stated that the information on the Convention is the same as at the last meeting. There is still no information on the Southeastern Breakfast being hosted by Florida.

The Jamboree will be held on Sunday, June 28th, from 6:00 to 10:00 PM. This will be held at the Hilton Hawaiian Village, which is where the DGE will attend their school. All paperwork has been filled out and sent in from the Multiple District to participate in the parade.

A. 2020 Atlanta International Convention Bid: PIP Jim Ervin stated that he has spoken with PCC Richard Brown, and the bid for the 2020 International Convention has been submitted. This will be distributed to Board Members for their perusal and vote at the Board Meeting. There are five bids being studied.

REPORT OF MD 18 LONG RANGE PLANNING COMMITTEE CHAIR – LION PDG MARK RICE:

The Long Range Planning Committee has distributed the survey results to CC Olin. Hopefully these have distributed to the appropriate committees and Lions so the information can be acted upon to improve the events and services for the Lions of Georgia. The Committee stands ready to assist with anything the Council needs assistance with. Please let me know how we may be of assistance. CC Newby encouraged Governors to share the results of the survey with the Lions in their District.

REPORT OF MD 18 CHAIR, CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS COMMITTEE – LION C. MARK MILLER, PCC:

PCC Miller stated that the Council has received three previous drafts for the revision of the MD 18 Constitution and By-Laws. PCC Miller stated that he has arranged for a conference that will be available for members of the Council and the Vice District Governors, since this will go into next year, together with the Constitution and By-Laws Committee via a web conference. They will receive an invitation on Monday to join in at 5:30 PM, February 16th for the conference. The Committee will meet in conference prior to this, and then with the Council and VDGs. They will go through the last revision provided, which was the standard Constitution for a Multiple District, as the Constitution and the standard constitution for a district as the By-Laws to that document. We will go through that with what else should be added to make it a Georgia document.

REPORT OF STATE MAGAZINE EDITOR AND MD 18 LCIF CHAIR – LION ED HASHBARGER, PDG:

PDG Hashbarger distributed copies of the latest Magazine. He stated that he needs more information from the Governors to include in the magazine. PDG Hashbarger asked Council and VDGs to try to find someone willing to take on the position of State Magazine Editor.

PDG Hashbarger discussed LCIF. He stated that all clubs in the state should donate to LCIF. He distributed a listing to the Governors of which clubs have donated. Lion Ed will continue as LCIF Chair for another three years. He would like to have 100% participation from all clubs in the state. He needs two persons from each District to serve on LCIF.

He distributed a listing of donations of clubs in each District. He pointed out that there is no reason why a club cannot give \$25.00 to each of the four Georgia Lions initiatives: Lighthouse, Camp, LCIF, and Leader Dogs. He asked each Governor to encourage donations to all.

REPORT OF STATE LION TAMER AND INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY CHAIR – LION RICK MIZELL, PDG:

CC Newby reported that Lion Mizell was unable to attend the meeting this weekend due to work, however he is available to attend the District Conventions, if asked.

REPORT OF MD 18 CENTENNIAL CHAIR – LION PDG CATHY THREATT:

Lion Threatt stated that information on the program can be found at lions100.org. The initial goal is to be able to serve one hundred million by the end of the centennial anniversary. The table of organization is on the website as well. The next service challenge is the Environment program scheduled for April. She asked Governors to please urge Clubs when they do their MMR reports to check any of those programs in which they participated. She discussed the posters which will be at the Atlanta Airport. DG Hubbard pointed out that the Gwinnett College Campus Club has already earned their Centennial Patch.

REPORT ON SOUTHEASTERN GUIDE DOGS:

DG Kelly, 18-O, stated that Lion Steve Humphry has asked to be relieved of his duties as Representative for Southeastern Guide Dogs, due to health issues.

The Leader Dog Program was voted on and is a project of the Lions of Georgia. The Lions Clubs of Georgia may also support Southeastern Guide Dogs, but it is not an official project of Georgia Lions.

REPORT OF STATE HISTORIAN – LION CHIP NEDZA:

DG Nedza presented a printed report: The Lion Magazine has been published continuously since November, 1918. The State Historian is collecting back issues to display in the Museum. Most wanted are issues before 1980. If you have any back issues pre 1980, please bring them to the January meeting of the Council of Governors. Council congratulated DG Nedza for the article on the Museum in the Lions Magazine.

Old Business:

- A. Georgia Towels. CC Newby stated that the Towels have been ordered.
- B. State Pins have been ordered and should be here in December.
- C. KidSight Program. DG Hubbard, 18-I, made a motion that this program be approved; motion seconded by DG Andrews, 18-L, and motion carried.

New Business:

- A. DG Hubbard, 18-I, made a motion that Council move forward with the Ethics Program, each Governor to assign a committee member within the next two weeks, and this will be included in the training at the State Convention. DG Nedza seconded the motion, and motion carried.
- B. DG Kelly, 18-O, made a motion that the Georgia Lions Camp be allowed to conduct a Basket Fundraiser as they have in the past at the State Convention. Motion seconded by DG Hubbard, 18-I, and motion carried.
- C. DG Andrews, 18-L, presented information on the US Blind Golf Association. This organization promotes golf to the blind and youth in general. They have decided to have their version of the US Open in Georgia this year at the Marietta City Club in August. They are asking the Lions to help with promotional information and volunteering. Lion Andrews distributed brochures. This is a free program. He encouraged all Governors to promote this, and asked Governors to recommend persons to work on a steering committee. PIP Jim Ervin suggested that Lion Andrews talk with PIP Sid Scruggs. Council did not object to sending out information on this project to the Clubs.

Centennial Membership Awards Questions

- 1) What are the Centennial Celebration Membership Awards?** The Centennial Celebration Membership Awards recognize Lions and Lions clubs that contribute to membership growth during our Centennial Celebration. Lions and Lions clubs can earn special recognition based on their efforts in two categories: 1. sponsoring new members and 2. chartering new clubs.
- 2) When does the Centennial Celebration Membership Awards begin?** The Awards program begins on April 1, 2015 and ends on June 30, 2018.
- 3) Can any Lion or Lions club earn recognition?** All Lions and Lions clubs have the opportunity to earn recognition.

Individual Lion Recognition

1. Sponsor a new member and be recognized as a **Centennial Sponsor**
2. Help charter a new club and be recognized as a **Centennial Club Organizer**

After a Lion completes one of the above actions, they automatically qualify to earn progressive levels of Centennial Lion Awards:

- **Silver Centennial Lion** – Earned once the new member/club remains in good standing for a consecutive year and a day
- **Gold Centennial Lion** – Earned once the new member/club remains in good standing for two consecutive years and a day
- **Diamond Centennial Lion** – Earned once the new member/club remains in good standing for three consecutive years and a day

Lions Club Recognition

Premier Centennial Club

1. Induct at least three (3) new members during a fiscal year during the Centennial Celebration, and the new members remain active for **two** years and a day

OR

2. Sponsor a new Lions club during the Centennial Celebration and the new club remains active for **two** years and a day

World Class Centennial Club

1. Induct at least three new members in **each** of the three fiscal years of the Centennial Celebration, and the new members remain in good standing throughout the Centennial Celebration.

AND

2. Sponsor a new Lions club during at least **one** of the fiscal years of the Centennial Celebration and the new club remains active for a year and a day.

- 4) How will Lions be recognized for their achievements?** Lions who sponsor a new member will receive a “limited edition” Centennial Sponsor Pin and Centennial Sponsor Certificate. Items will be distributed in Lions Clubs International’s New Member Kits. Lions who help organize a new club will receive a “limited edition” Centennial Club Organizer Pin and Centennial Club Organizer Certificate. Items will be mailed to the current district governor of each district with the new club’s official Lions Clubs International Charter. The progressive awards for Centennial Sponsors and Centennial Club Organizers will be based on the amount of time the new member or new club remains active.

Silver Centennial Lions will be recognized in the following ways for their achievements:

- Member will receive a “limited edition” silver pin
- Recognition on the LCI Centennial website

Gold Centennial Lions will be recognized in the following ways for their achievements:

- Member will receive a “limited edition” gold pin
- Recognition on the LCI Centennial website
- Recognition at area forums, MD and district conventions

Diamond Centennial Lions will be recognized in the following ways for their achievements:

- Member will receive a special “limited edition” pin and certificate
- Photo featured on LCI Centennial website
- Recognition at area forums, MD and district conventions
- Recognition at international convention
- Featured with fellow achievers in LION Magazine

- 5) How will clubs be recognized for their achievements?**

Premier Centennial Clubs will be recognized in the following ways for their achievements:

- Club will receive a “limited edition” banner patch
- Recognition on the LCI Centennial website
- Recognition on the LCI club locator with a virtual banner icon
- Recognition at area forums, MD and district conventions

World Class Centennial Clubs will be recognized in the following ways for their achievements:

- Club will receive a “limited edition” banner patch and special award presented by the district governor during the following fiscal year
- A special “limited edition” pin will be given to each active member of the club

- Recognition in LION Magazine and on the LCI Centennial website
- Recognition on the LCI club locator with a virtual banner icon
- Special recognition at area forums, multiple district conventions and international convention

6) When are the individual and club level qualification periods for earning Membership Awards?

Award Type	Qualification Period
Silver Centennial Lion	April 1, 2015 - June 30, 2018
Gold Centennial Lion	April 1, 2015 - June 30, 2018
Diamond Centennial Lion	April 1, 2015 - June 30, 2018
Premier Centennial Club	(2015-16, 2016-17, 2017-18)*
World Class Centennial Club	(2015-16, 2016-17, 2017-18)*

* Qualification periods are based on full fiscal years.

7) How many progressive level pins can a Lion earn during the Centennial Membership Awards Program? Centennial Sponsors and Centennial Club Organizers will receive one award of the same type. For example, a Lion who sponsors multiple new Lions will receive one Silver Centennial Lion Award when the first new Lion they sponsor stays for a year and a day. However, a Lion who sponsors a new member **and** helps charter a new club can earn a progressive level award for both. Once the new member and new club stays a year and a day, the Lion is eligible to receive the Silver Centennial Lion Award for both.

8) When must new members and new clubs be submitted to LCI in order to be counted towards the Centennial Membership Awards Program? The qualification period for the Centennial Celebration Membership Awards program begins April 1, 2015 and runs through June 30, 2018. Any new members sponsored or clubs chartered during this time will count towards Centennial Celebration Membership Awards recognition.

9) If a new member joins an existing club, drops after 6-months of membership and is reinstated, will I still receive credit towards the progressive Centennial Lion Award? No. New members must remain active for a consecutive year(s). Once a member drops for any reason, the sponsor cannot receive credit for that new member.

10) How will Lions and clubs know if they earned a Centennial Celebration Membership Award? Award notification will be mailed by LCI to club secretaries along with the award.

- Member will receive a *Limited Edition* Gold Centennial pin
- Name featured on the LCI Centennial website
- Recognition at area forums and district conventions

Diamond Centennial Lion

Earn the Diamond Centennial Lion award once the new member or new club remains in good standing for **3 years and a day**.

Diamond Centennial Lions will be recognized in the following ways for their special achievement:

- A special *Limited Edition* Diamond Centennial pin and certificate
- Featured with fellow achievers in LION Magazine
- Photo featured on the LCI Centennial website
- Recognition at LCI's International Convention
- Recognition at area forums and district conventions

REPORT OF MD 18 GMT CHAIR – LION JANE PRICE, PDG:

All MD18 districts continue to actively work on new club development and club-rebuilding. The Gwinnett College campus club was chartered in October and conducted their charter celebration in November. There are currently 9 clubs in formation: 4 regular clubs; 4 branch clubs; and 1 campus club. A few membership stats for the 1st half of this Lions year:

Retention remains an on-going issue. Old, small clubs are failing. Some are not accepting assistance to re-build, so they will most likely slowly go away. However, there are some challenged clubs that are asking for assistance, but the District Governors and the District GMTs are having trouble finding **qualified** Certified Guiding Lions to assign to help them. There also continues to be a lack of communication between the zone chairs and the district GMTs. This results in the GMTs not receiving current information on the status of the clubs' health and activity. I would like to request the districts make a plan to do the following:

1. Place a strong emphasis on chartering the new clubs currently in formation;
2. Make renewed efforts to improve communications between the zone chairs and the GMTs;
3. Form a task force to address club-rebuilding including identifying failing clubs and training and assigning qualified Certified Guiding Lions to help them;
4. Continue to identify under-served areas in each district and begin the groundwork to form clubs in those areas.

The districts in MD18 have been struggling with membership issues for years. There have been successes as well as failures. There is no one membership plan that seems to work well for all. It might be time for the DG teams, GMTs & GLTs (state & district), and other to-be identified leaders to get together in one room and share ideas for membership success going forward. It might be time to try a different approach to membership and club vitality to ensure the continuance of our Lions legacy in MD18 Georgia. Please let me know how I can help you.

DG Andrews, 18-L, stated that there was talk at the work session last night about having a task force in each district. He asked PDG Price to send each Governor a list of qualifications for people to serve on that task force. PDG Ed Hashbarger asked if the Lions of Georgia could attach something such as information on the state organization to the posters being used in connection with the Centennial Program at the Airport. DG Andrews, 18-L, made a motion that Council pursue the membership thrust; motion seconded by DG Hubbard, 18-I, and motion carried. PDG Price will begin to put together a plan for Council approval.



Recipes for Success

Let's get some ideas out there – seems we do the same old thing –now maybe we can do something different.

SERVICE PROJECTS and also COMBINE FUNDRAISING with SERVICE PROJECTS

(Don't forget your Lion vests)

- 1. Meals on Wheels:** Club delivers meals to shut-ins. Schedules are prepared in advance and meals are delivered by teams of two. Not a difficult project but members need to be able to walk and climb stairs.
- 2. Delta Ponds Restoration:** Club works four times per year helping to eliminate non-native plants, protect desirable plants from predation by nutria and beavers, plant native plants, pick up trash, and participate in habitat studies.
- 3. Pocket Park Maintenance:** Club helps maintain a small corner of a Park called the "Pocket Park", adjacent to a popular biking, running, walking trail. Jobs include weeding, mowing, planting, edging, periodic painting and in general keeping the park attractive and neat.
- 4. Community Flags:** Club puts up and takes down American flags on all major holidays. Solicit \$100 donation from businesses by letter each September following 9/11 or Veterans Day. **Manpower Needs** – Varies club members and/or LEO's, Scouts. **Costs:** Cost of flags and holders.
- 5. Tag Sale (Garage Sale):** Conduct a garage sale of donated items. Manpower includes storing, pricing, manning sale, and cleanup. Or rent 10 X 10 spaces for a garage sale.
- 6. Wine Raffle:** Club obtains wine from local wine buyer at a discounted price and sells raffle tickets.
- 7. Adopt-a-Christmas Family:** Club contacts School principal at a low income school in area to provide name of a deserving family. Club gets a reasonable wish list from the family and purchases items with budgeted funds and member donations. Budget \$300/family
- 8. Donate a meal for Homebound Seniors:** Lions volunteer to pass out cards at selected super markets that customers may take to the checkout register and donate one meal for a day, a week, or a month. The cost added to their grocery bill.
- 9. Pet pageants:** For a small entry fee, local pet owners can enter their pets in a pet pageant. Don't be afraid to make up your own categories; the "Furriest Pet" or the "Most Unusual Pet" or "Best Dressed Pet". This will certainly add to the entertainment value of this fundraising event.
- 10. Adopt a School:** Each month club takes something to school such as school supplies, coats, socks, etc. Do flags for first graders. Sponsor a read-a-thon with prizes. Do a "Bunny Backpack Program".

Georgia Lions Lighthouse Foundation

Providing vision and hearing services to Georgians in financial need



Dear Georgia Lions!

PCC Clower presented a printed report as follows:

Our Georgia Lions Lighthouse is continuing to grow our services. We have recently added two new clinics; one in Sumter County, and one in Douglas County. We now have 30 clinics all over Georgia. Our volunteers in the Recycling Center have done a great job renovating and organizing our recycling process. We still have not received approval to be a Certified Recycling Center from LCI, but we are continuing to recycle eyeglasses, hearing aids, and cell phones. We are in need of more volunteers to help us out in the Recycling Center.

The Pediatric Hearing Program launched January 1st. We are now accepting children birth – 19 years old with family income up to 400% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines. We are also growing the Frame Kit Program. A presentation will be made on this program at the Joint Meeting. Our Governance Committee will be presenting a revision to our Constitution for a vote of the Lions of Georgia at the Joint Meeting. The Lighthouse stands ready to partner with the Lions of Georgia to implement the KidSight USA Program as soon as the details are released by LCI.

Below is a short summary of other items:

Services and Costs: In this fiscal year, at our 30 clinics, the Lighthouse provided eye exams to 1203 clients and furnished 2300 eyeglasses. We provided 396 surgical procedures at a cost of \$137,328.77. The hearing aid program had a total of 1183 applications processed with 388 approved.

Finances: The Lighthouse received grants from LCIF, Kaiser, and Healthcare of Georgia totaling \$175,000. This will enable us to purchase updated clinic equipment, expand the Recycling Center, fund diabetic eye surgeries and fund new clinics. Our Lions giving totaled \$55,796.53 as of December 31, 2014. Thanks to those clubs and individuals who have supported the Lighthouse with their giving. Work is beginning on the Night of Spectacles. It will be held at the Atlanta Train Depot on April 25, 2015. We hope to see the entire Council there!

The Board of Directors and Staff:

The election of Lighthouse Officers will be held at the Joint Meeting. District Directors for Districts L and O will be elected at their respective District conventions. We have had some changes in our Board recently. PDG John Rudert stepped down as Treasurer, and that vacancy was filled by PDG Tim Chisholm. As a result of PDG Tim Chisholm moving up as Treasurer, that created a vacancy in his Member-at-Large position. That vacancy was filled by PDG Cathy Threatt. Lion Kristy Allison stepped down as a Member-at-Large, and that vacancy was filled by PDG Vanessa Stanley. Thanks to these Lions who have stepped up to serve our Lighthouse.

The Board of Directors and the Staff of our Georgia Lions Lighthouse Foundation appreciate the support of the Lions of Georgia as we continue to serve more people all over Georgia.

REPORT OF GEORGIA LIONS CAMP FOR THE BLIND – LION SCOTT EISENHART:

Lion Eisenhart presented the following printed report.

The first thing to say is that the Camp is currently in “recovery” mode. The crisis has passed, we have qualified candidates to fill the vacancy of Executive Director, a plan for being solvent at least through the next 2 camping seasons, and that is without the expected income that will be generate with the new ideas, plans, and grant writing that the new E.D. will bring. However, that brings me to the points needing addressed. The first is that while we do not have hard numbers, as I haven’t received them from PDG Paul May, I do know that in the last 2 weeks, the camp has received 2 checks, one from the Marietta Lions Club in the amount of \$1750 and one from the Garden City Lions Club in the amount of \$2000. That would indicated that the trend of withholding monies from the camp while waiting to see the outcome of the leadership changes has passed and the Clubs are more willing to send their funds. This is important because if WE the Lions of Georgia do not believe enough to contribute, then how can we expect other individuals and corporations to give us grant money?

That brings me to the second point. At the last Joint meeting, during what ended up being an open personnel committee meeting, Lion Charles Lauderdale posed a solution to the immediate funding problems facing the camp. His proposal was simple, and would have not only met, but gone over the needed funds for a full fiscal year. His proposal was that every Lion in Georgia write a check in the amount between \$80 and \$100 to the camp. At \$100 per Lion, and roughly 6,000 Lions in the state, not only would we have the \$400k needed to “balance the budget” but we would have had extra to repay, and even build up, the trust fund. I bring this up because while most of u cannot do that on a “regular” basis, just one check a year would keep the camp in a balanced budget condition and give us money to build the trust fund as well as meet growth and repair needs. At the last meeting, there were 5 checks written, and even after an appeal was sent to all the Lions of GA, I don’t believe that anyone else answered the call. So I am making the request again. If you did not write a check at the last joint meeting, I am asking you to do so today. \$100 per-year-is less than \$10/month, which is less than what most of us pay for a cheap lunch or dinner out. ONE time a month.

Finally, to bring us to the best news this Camp has had in a very long time. The personnel committee did their job. They identified an appropriate number of candidates, created an interview committee, and interviewed the candidates and have narrowed our choices to the best of the best. I won’t go too far into the process, but I will say that the top 3 candidates all presented similar ideas on the best way to not only gain solid footing, but to grow in our initial mission of giving recreational and educational opportunities to blind campers and to become more relevant in the Waycross area with regards to community service. Their plan would also bring in more revenue in the form of grants, in kind donations, and commercial rental fees. We are in recovery. Funds are coming in. Employees are being hired, publicity is being readied, and programming plans are being made. But it is up to the Lions of Georgia, and their leadership, YOU, to quell the rumors of the camp closing, to quell the divisiveness regarding camp leadership, and to honor the mission and vision of the fine gentlemen who started the camp to provide recreational and educational opportunities to the blind people of Georgia, and space permitting, the surrounding areas. I have one final thing to say. Being involved in the Camp brings satisfaction in a way that no other activity can. I’m not sure if it is the outdoor setting, seeing the campers discover their inner self confidence, or knowing that with the right leadership, this camp can be here when my grandchildren are old enough to be LIONS and do the work that we are currently doing. Notice I did not say my children, because my children are already Lions, as are the children of many of you here. Let’s keep this going so that our grandchildren can have the same satisfaction we get. Like you, I am a LION, and I believe in the mission of the camp.

DG Hubbard, 18-I, asked about the investment fund of the Camp and why it was not shown on the financial reports. She stated that Council also was concerned that the Trustees had not met in a few years; and that the trustees should be involved in the decision to move money from the investment fund to the general operating account. If they have not met, how does that function happen? Lion Eisenhart stated that the Trustees are meeting this afternoon, and all Trustees are actively involved in matters of the Camp. PDG Paul May, Treasurer of the Camp, stated that he is a member of the Trustees. He stated that he would be glad to add a line item to the financial report showing the investment fund. This year the investment fund was \$318,080.05. Interest rolls back over into the account. A month ago it was \$312,000.00. A year ago the amount

was \$285,000.00; three years ago \$259,000.00; Five years ago \$592,000.00. PDG May stated that in the last six years \$320,000.00 was taken from the fund; in the last two years, \$75,000.00. Lion Eisenhart stated that he felt next year they would need to pull out between \$25,000.00 and \$50,000.00. Maybe \$15,000.00 for this year.

Lion Eisenhart stated that the Camp has budgeted \$50,000.00 as an annual salary for the Executive Director of the Camp. In addition, housing and utilities are supplied. Health Insurance is provided up to \$300.00 a month. Lion Eisenhart stated that he felt all of the questions asked in the recent letter from the Task Force have been answered.

New expenditures concerns are:

1. Electricity looks like it might end up over budget.
2. Office supplies is already over budget for the year due to having to purchase stamps and new checks and envelopes.

As discussed before, the Maintenance HVAC and General accounts are already over budget for the year due to several major equipment failures and bulk purchase of gasoline (which should reduce the Vehicle - Gasoline account.)

The MAIN CONCERN is that Income is under budget by \$44,700 mainly due to Club Contributions. We are \$31,390 behind from last year's Clubs contributions.

Lions Quest Recognized by UN



Last week, the United Nations Commission on Narcotic Drugs (CND) held its 58th Session in Vienna, focused on the issue of drug use among youth worldwide.

The CND meeting is the largest anti-drug event on the UN's calendar. Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) staff was on hand to discuss how Lions Quest has been proven a successful tool in addressing this problem around the world. During the "Innovations in Youth Drug Prevention" seminar, Lions Quest was recognized alongside a number of other leading programs. Michael Botticelli, Director of the US Office National Drug Control Policy, listed Lions Quest among the programs known to reduce risk factors and increase protective factors that help

prevent drug use among young people. LCIF staff presented the results of different studies that show that Lions Quest has successfully reduced alcohol, tobacco and marijuana use in multiple countries, including the US, Colombia, Paraguay, Peru, Japan and Czech Republic.

A panel discussion about "The Role of School-Based Social Emotional Skill-Building in Youth Prevention" highlighted the effective [collaboration between LCIF and the UNODC in Serbia](#). Gilberto Gerra, Chief of the UN's Office of Drug Control (UNODC) Drug Prevention and Health Branch, congratulated LCIF for sponsoring an evidence-based program that has proven successful in so many countries.

At a separate panel discussion, leading experts presented results of a cost-benefit analysis of various drug use prevention programs. That [analysis](#) shows that every US\$1 invested in Lions Quest's *Skills for Adolescence* saves more than US\$5 in future costs. Lions Quest programs are active in more than 90 countries, impacting 13 million youth all over the world. As more and more governments and NGOs take notice of the program's accomplishments, LCIF continues to find new partners to help expand the program. A newly revised curriculum will be available soon.

Providing Treatment for River Blindness




[River blindness](#) is a parasitic infection that occurs through the bite of a black fly, and may lead to low vision or irreversible blindness, as well as disfiguring skin diseases. River blindness is endemic to Central, East and West Africa, parts of Latin America and the Middle Eastern country of Yemen.

A SightFirst grant of US\$384,298 was recently awarded to Cameroon's National Onchocerciasis Control Program. The grant will allow for continued river blindness treatment activities in the North, Far North and Adamaoua regions. More than 1.5 million Mectizan® treatments will be provided to impacted populations.

One of Merck's strongest allies has been Lions and Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF). To date, Merck has donated just over 153 million treatments of Mectizan® to LCIF, making the program the longest-running medicine donation commitment in history. Not only have so many people been spared from this debilitating disease, but river blindness is on its way to being an affliction of the past; two Latin American countries—Colombia and Ecuador—have announced its complete eradication, and more countries are to follow. Merck and LCIF remain committed to this goal until it is achieved.

"Colombia's successful effort in halting onchocerciasis transmission is a landmark achievement in public health," said Former U.S. President Jimmy Carter, Founder of The Carter Center. "This remarkable progress would not be possible without the dedicated health workers and volunteers working at the community level and the invaluable public-private partnership with Merck and the Mectizan® Donation Program."

Melvin Jones Fellowship

Established in 1973, the Melvin Jones Fellowship (MJF) recognizes donations of US\$1,000. With more than 329,896 Melvin Jones Fellows worldwide, the MJF program is the backbone of LCIF and provides 75 percent of the Foundation's revenue. Contributions can be made by individuals (including non-Lions), clubs or districts, in one sum, or in installments of a minimum of US\$100 over a five-year period.

MJF Recognition:

- MJFs receive an attractive lapel pin, plaque and congratulatory letter. •
 - All MJFs are invited to an annual luncheon at the Lions Clubs International Convention.
- MJF names are listed on a scrolling list at International Headquarters.
- Clubs receive an MJF banner patch and chevron the first time a member receives an MJF; each subsequent year the club receives a chevron for the first member to receive an MIF

Areas of Giving

Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) will now be able to help more people than ever before. Melvin Jones Fellowship (MJF) eligibility now includes donations to five special program areas. Donors will now be able to receive MJF and PMJF credit when directing their support to:

- **Area of Greatest Need:** Supports all program areas and allows LCIF the flexibility to supplement initiatives where additional funding is necessary or where the need is most urgent.
- **Disaster:** Enables LCIF to direct the funds to the area's most in need following disasters to provide for immediate, mid and long-term relief.
- **Sight:** Funds seek to support hundreds of sight-related activities ranging from equipping eye clinics to providing Braille computers for the visually impaired.
- **Youth:** Supports the Lions Quest program and other initiatives such as educational infrastructure improvements and programs to assist at-risk youth.
- **Humanitarian Needs:** Funds projects that meet diverse community needs beyond sight, disaster and youth, such as the measles program, water wells and vocational training programs for the disabled.

- 12. Christmas Dinner and Toys for Tots Drive:** Club sponsors dinner and collects toys for local children ages 0-18.
- 13. Senior Breakfast:** Club prepares and serves a free breakfast for area seniors on New Year's Day in cooperation with the Senior Center.
- 14. Run/Walk for Sight:** Club conducts a 5k run/walk each fall. Sell ads to local businesses and publish the ads in a booklet that is distributed 5-6 weeks prior to the event encouraging people to patronize the business. Charge an entrance fee and provide a t-shirt with entry fee. Ribbons and plaques are awarded. In-kind donations are solicited and a drawing is conducted for gifts with a grand prize. **Manpower** – varies. **Costs:** \$200. **Potential Revenue:** \$4000 or more.
- 15. Pancake Breakfast with Santa and Mrs. Claus:** Breakfast with eggs, sausage, pancakes, juice, hot chocolate. Event also includes selling baked goods, holiday wreaths, local arts and crafts, cookie decorating for children and a children's bike raffle. **Manpower** – varies. **Potential Revenue:** \$1,500 or more.
- 16. Golf Ball Drop:** Lions sell 2,500 numbered golf balls for \$25. The balls are released by airplane over a golf course. The **winner of the ball that comes closest to the hole receives \$10,000.** **Manpower** – varies.
- 17. Supermarket Sweep:** Club and supermarket sells tickets for \$5 – quantity 500-1,000 tickets. Winner has 5 minutes to fill grocery cart(s) of food. **Manpower** – varies.
- 18. 50/50 Raffle:** This is one of the best cheap fundraising ideas, because the only cost to the club is a roll of raffle tickets. Sell raffle tickets to donors and split the money evenly with the winner. Positive cash flow is immediate.
- 19. Chili cook-offs:** Many families have a favorite chili recipe. By organizing a friendly competition, you can help determine which chili really deserves bragging rights as the best overall. For the cost of a trophy, your club can raise a sizable amount of money.
- 20. Buckets for Donations:** EASY- This fundraiser is perfect to collect the change given at countless stores in your town. Gather old coffee cans and cover them with your cover sheet. Approach store manager and have a professional cover sheet that explains your charity and your goals of fundraising. Send a member to the store once a week to empty cans. Make sure to update the store manager on your club's progress.
