















Council received reports or comments as follows:

PAST INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT – LION JAMES E. "JIM" ERVIN:

PIP Ervin discussed the International Board Meeting in Savannah the last week of February and the first week of March. He stated that he has assumed the responsibility for the Board Meeting. He will be going to Savannah and now that the Board has approved the Agenda for the meeting, and he has talked with some of the staff and Dr. Yamada, there was not an evening lined up for them to have a free night in Savannah, so it was agreed that rather than the Lions of Georgia putting on a full dinner, that the Lions would put on a cocktail reception at the Westin with light hors d'oeuvres. Because there will be some training sessions which are required for the spouses, there will be a program on the Lighthouse, and then the Camp will put on a session on the Camp which will be two different sessions for the spouses of the Board and that meets the IRS requirements. Other than the host night, the MD will need to have staff at the Airport when the Officers and Directors come in, to help get their luggage off the carousels, put them on carts, etc. There is a company in Savannah that will do the transportation. Lions will be needed in the hotel and the Convention Center to give information about Savannah or to help with whatever they might need. PIP Ervin stated that a letter will be sent out to the Clubs to see if they can donate and support the Board Meeting. The cost has been cut to about \$10,000.00. The Reception will be on Wednesday, March 2nd.

Lions will be expected to pay for their drinks and food. PIP Ervin stated that he is asking the committee to wear their parade shirt so that they will be identifiable to the group. There will be no hat. He stated that he will get back with the Council should funds from the International Expense Fund be needed to host the International Family.

PIP Ervin stated that he is on the Centennial Action Committee; PID Haynes Townsend is over the area east of the Mississippi; PID John Walker is west of the Mississippi, and PIP Jim works with both and trying to coordinate the funding and getting coordinators to share with their communities and the world what Lions have been doing for 100 years.

Through meetings with Roberta and Grace and the Peach Bowl, the Lions of Georgia and Lions International will sponsor the Peach Bowl Parade. We will be in the magazine and program and well publicized. He discussed this opportunity to publicize the Lions, the Lighthouse and the Peach Bowl.

PIP Ervin stated that he has lined up Bob Corlew for the 2017 State Convention. ID Kembra Smith is working on obtaining a speaker for the 2016 Convention.

PAST INTERNATIONAL DIRECTOR –LION HAYNES TOWNSEND:

PID Townsend commended PIP Jim Ervin for all the work he does on the International level. He commended PCC Mark Miller for his work on the USA/Canada Forum.

PAST INTERNTIONAL DIRECTOR - DR. JOHN PEARCE:

PID Pearce stated that he did not have any comments at this time, but would make his comments when his report came up on the agenda.

REPORT OF COUNCIL SECRETARY and STATE CONVENTION – LION HANNAH FLYNN, DG 18-0:

A. Lion David McDonald, Convention Treasurer, discussed the Callaway Gardens Convention in 2016. He distributed two reports to the Council. He pointed out that currently the balance on hand in South Crest Bank, Thomaston, GA, is \$21,010.00. There are currently 196 people registered for the Convention. The second handout was a listing of all those persons registered from each District. CC May stated that during the months of November and December he would work with the Council and State Office to finalize the agenda for the Convention, and have it ready by the first of the year. Lion McDonald stated that he and General Chair Forrest ask that there be no ads in the convention program this year. He suggested that if Council wanted ads placed by the clubs, that a separate program be made up just for ads.

B. CC May stated that the 2015 Tifton State Convention General Chair, PDG Georgia Taylor, had turned in a check in the amount of \$800.00, representing additional ad sales income. Check was turned over to the State Office Secretary for deposit.

C. 2017 State Convention: PCC Mark Miller stated that he had asked Council at the last meeting to consider an A la carte method of registering for the convention. There would be a base Registration fee of \$25 to \$28 per person. To that amount, each person could pick and choose which other events (MJF Luncheon, Breakfasts, Banquet, etc.) would be added. There would be a discounted rate for purchase of the entire package. Committee cannot begin work on a budget until Council decides on whether the a la carte method of registering is approved. DG Varnadoe, 18-N, made a motion that Council allow PCC Miller to set up the a la carte program. Motion seconded by DG Flynn, 18-O, and motion carried.

D. DG Flynn reported that PCC Grace Clower is working on a bid for the 2018 State Convention to be in District 18-I. CC May stated that Committee needs to be looking at the following year to line up a convention site, hopefully in 18-N. DG Flynn stated that she had been contacted by someone at the Convention Center in Macon and that site would be available also.

REPORT OF INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION CHAIR – LION FRED CARLSON, DG 18-L:

Southeastern Breakfast. The Tennessee MD chose not to host the Southeastern Breakfast for next year. So Georgia will be the host for the Breakfast. PIP Ervin stated that he has discussed the Southeastern Breakfast with staff at LCI. During their inspection site of Japan at the Headquarters Hotel, they will get some menus so that Council can select a menu. After that, the State Office will put out a letter to all of the Southeastern Multiple Districts. State Office will print tickets for the event. Once the information is available a letter will be sent.

DG Carlson stated that the Council will partner with the Lighthouse to put on the Georgia Jamboree this year. This event will be a little more formal. Roberta Green, Executive Director of the Lighthouse, stated that she felt this would be a great opportunity to highlight some of the unique things done in Georgia, and this could be expanded into the Centennial year celebration in Chicago.

DG Carlson stated that Georgia will participate in the parade. He suggested that anyone needing a shirt should contact Rick Mizell to make sure the size needed is available. There is some discussion about changing the parade uniform for the centennial year rather than this year.

REPORT OF MD 18 LONG RANGE PLANNING COMMITTEE CHAIR – LION PDG MARK RICE:

The Long Range Planning Committee meet on 12 October 2015 at the Georgia Lions Lighthouse. Those in attendance were: PCC Olin Newby, Roberta Green, PCC Bill Craig and Ruthie Stevens. A discussion of the following topic was conducted with respect to the new MD 18 Lions Museum: Ownership, Management, Insurance, Maintenance and Operation, Ownership of Donations/Gifts to the Museum, Promotion, Tax Reporting, Development of Policy Manuel, and Placement of Donation Box in the Museum.

A more complete report of the recommendation will be forth coming after additional discussion with committee members who were not available to attend.

REPORT OF MD 18 CHAIR, CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS COMMITTEE – LION C. MARK MILLER, PCC:

PCC Miller stated that next Wednesday there will be a meeting of the MD Constitution and By-Laws Committee. Per directions received from Council, the Committee recommends adopting a consolidated document where the Constitution and By-Laws will be the standard LCI recommended Multiple District Constitution. The By-Laws will be a standard District Constitution and By-Laws with a few minor tweaks.

PCC Miller stated that there are three positions currently in the Constitution that are not part of the Standard MD Constitution. These are elected either by the Council or Lions. He stated it was his recommendation to let the Lions of Georgia decide whether they want to continue to have and fund a Lion Tamer, a State Historian, and also the Council Advisor position is not a standard position. He anticipates a resolution being presented at the Convention this year with four items on the ballot. One to approve the overall rewrite and separate ones on whether to continue the Historian position, the Lion Tamer position, and the Council Advisor position.

DG Flynn, 18-O, made a motion to allow the Constitution and By-Laws Committee to move forward with these recommendations. Motion seconded by DG Varnadoe, 18-N. Motion carried.

PIP Ervin stated a lot of work has gone into the proposal. He encouraged Council to be sure that this information is placed in the hands of the Lions Clubs so that everyone has a chance to study it and be prepared to vote on the issue. If there are problems, he asked that these be handled within the state of Georgia. He stated that recently he has received two calls from LCI where someone in the state has called LCI complaining about something in the State, and he knew nothing about it. He felt that issues should be handled here in the state without involving LCI.

PCC Miller stated that the committee plans to have this ready to present at the District Conventions. He asked that Governors include their Constitution and By-Laws Committee member on the business agenda at the district convention so that there will be the opportunity for the district to see what changes are being made, understand them and ask questions so that they are fully informed about this document.

The current Constitution says that only the Constitution and By-Laws Committee can present amendments without a petition type situation, to be presented at a State Convention. The committee will be preparing changes and recommendations. They will bring these changes back to the Council for their endorsement. A resolution would be presented at the State Convention.

REPORT OF STATE MAGAZINE EDITOR AND MD 18 LCIF CHAIR – LION ED HASHBARGER, PDG:

Lion Hashbarger discussed committees, and perhaps having a training for the committees on what they are supposed to do.

State Magazine was discussed. DG Carlson, 18-L, stated that as discussed last night, each Governor will have something put in the District Newsletter regarding how many people receive a hard copy of the State Magazine, and do they want to continue to do that, and try to move toward going strictly electronic.

PDG Hashbarger called attention to a printed LCIF report: "What we've got here is Failure to communicate ". Again, I found that not all clubs know about many of the other Lions projects we have and never received any programs on these projects. I highly recommend to the District Governor's and Vice District Governor's that they make sure that they take 2 minutes to say something about LCIF and ask each club to give a donation - \$20.00 minimum surely this is not too much to ask for and set yourself a goal at being a 100% District. At present, if your District meets its goal — you and the District Coordinator will get the LCIF Chairperson's Medal. You can also get a Certificate if your District is 100%.

Congratulations to PDG Vicki Hubbard and District Coordinators PDG Richard Henderson and Lion Gay Bradley (District 18-I) on being the first recipient's to receive the 2014-15 LCTF Chairperson's Medal who has demonstrated exceptional dedication to the foundation and as recognition of exemplary giving within a district or multiple district.

Also, I will be presenting a Certificate to a Lions Club within District 18-N for being a 201415 TOP FIVE CLUBS as recognition of exemplary giving to LCIF from a given club. I will ask if the District Governor or one of the Vice District Governor's and District Coordinators could be present for this presentation.

You all should know by now that the Macon Lions Club is working on a major project within their community. I contacted the President and encouraged him to get with another club or two and submit for a Standard Grant from LCIF on this project. This project is something that many Clubs should be looking at within their communities. The main attraction is providing a handicap playground.

I know some of the clubs have been worried only about what is going on within their own communities — this is fine — but they have to realize that sometime in the future —monies might be needed to help restore their community. Much has been given and we have received a good amount in return. Please find attached your District Recap as of 30 September and past yearly history.

Each District will still have to push Melvin Jones Fellowships (along with Progressive) and Contributing Member Pins. I gave out Contributing Member Pins to your District Coordinators. We still have many clubs that have money on account —all they have to do is fill out an application and submit it for a member of their club. I will contact each of those clubs as I usually do each year. Please find attached an LCIF Melvin Jones Application that can be filled out — each DG should do one for themselves and CHALLENGE other members of your team to do the same.

I have been working for a couple of years on trying to get Certificates from LCIF in helping clubs provided eye care within their 3

communities. LCIF has partnered with VSP (Vision Service Plan) in providing these certificates and has picked District 1 and 0. This could mean that Clubs could save hundreds of dollars and readjust their budgets. I will be working with the District Coordinators on this major project.

REPORT OF STATE LION TAMER AND INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY CHAIR – LION RICK MIZELL, PDG:

CC May called attention to a report in each file from the Lion Tamer, who was unable to attend the meeting: Attached is the latest Inventory report for the store. I understand there is a discussion about closing the store. Since most Districts do not want to expend the time to provide a location for the store, there are fewer opportunities to sell the Lion's merchandise. Adding to the issues is the fact we have a large left over supply of last year's towels. This has caused an increase of retail value of the store and probably a net loss on the books for last fiscal year. To get rid of this item, I will probably have to deeply discount these towels. I have cut back on the quantity of towels for this year.

I have also held back on ordering additional Parade Shirts. I am out of Ladies Large and X-Large Sizes. We can sub Men's sizes if needed and the purchaser is willing to accept. It would be helpful to know in advance, how many will need shirts. I had quite a few Lions request shirts after the State Convention. This is a cost out of pocket and not everyone has paid for the shirts. In the future, I am not willing to mail shirts out after State Convention.

Over the past several years, the inventory of the store has decreased. This has been noticeable to some Lions. I have always been able to move the product at all District Conventions and State Convention.

Before you decide to close the store, please consider bring the idea before the Lions of Georgia at State Convention.

For my Information Technologies Report. Tonight, I have published a total rework of the state website. This has been a project in the works for over 4 months and a ton of hours. The only item left to update is the State Directory. This should be complete by this weekend. The reason for the rework is the old site was developed and maintained by Microsoft Web Expressions which is manufacturer discontinued. The new software is Adobe Dreamweaver. This will allow more devices such as smart phones to access the website.

The 8th point in the Lions Code of Ethics says "To be careful with our criticism, be liberal with our praise, and to build up and not destroy." Council has appointed co-chairs for the Ethics Committee in the Multiple District. The Co-Chairs are PID Dr. Beverly Roberts and PID Dr. John Pearce.

Dr. Pearce stated that he thought for many years there was no need for an Ethics Committee, certainly not in Georgia, and as he traveled and spoke in other Multiple Districts, he found out that there were ways of looking at that Code of Ethics that he had never thought of, and that Lions do not realize how applicable it is to each one of us as a Lion. He stated that he wanted the Lions in Georgia to start thinking about how we conduct ourselves, and on that 8th point in the Code of Ethics, where are we in Georgia?

Dr. Pearce stated that he and Dr. Roberts have the four names who will serve on the Ethics Committee. They tried to get everyone together for a meeting this weekend, but it did not work out. They plan to have an orientation and training session for the Ethics Committee before the next Council Meeting.

Old Business:

Georgia Lions Pins 2016. Lion Don Wagner stated that this year has been the smoothest ever in getting the Lions Pin approved and ordered. He delivered the pins for delivery to Rick Mizell. CC May stated that if anyone wanted pins now, they could get them and have Lion Mizell bill them.

Members of our club are also active in the two Lions State Projects of Georgia. They are the Georgia Lions Lighthouse and the Georgia Lions Camp for the Blind. Members of the club have held positions on their committees.

We presently partner with the local American Legion Post and the Boy Scouts. We are anticipating future projects. As more opportunities present themselves we look forward to getting involved with them.

Meetings of our club go beyond discussions of service. Lionism is also about fellowship. We meet at the Capt. Joes restaurant in Midway at 7 PM on the fourth Thursday of each month, enjoy a nice dinner (dinner is optional) and, besides business, enjoy each other's company. REPORT OF SOUTHEAST AREA GLT COORDINATOR – LION MARK MILLER, PCC:

PCC Miller stated that three Zone Chair Training Courses were completed since the last Council Meeting. Also was the first weekend of First and Second Vice District Governor Training. Tomorrow, he will be conducting a workshop with the GMTs, GLTs, and First Vice District Governors. First Vice District Governors have to prepare goals to be turned in by December 15th to LCI relating to both Leadership Development and Membership Development for their year. They are supposed to work with their GMT and GLT. They will work on setting those goals tomorrow, along with the District GMT and GLT, to make sure they are coordinated.

He reported that last night we talked about and submitted a "Second Century Leadership Model" that we are recommending to Council to be developed and implemented next year with training on that program to occur at each District Convention this year. That program will streamline the way Cabinets work; it will focus two key teams that are hybrids of GLT and GMT. One team will be specifically focused on existing clubs, called the Quality Club Team that the Zone Chairs will morph more into "Coaches" and be accountable for what is happening with existing clubs. Are clubs growing or staying where they are. The second team would be focused on new club development, and developing and putting in place Certified Guiding Lions. A much more streamlined structure in order to get the state on board with that, he is requesting Council approval so that 1st VDGs can start recruiting and training at the District Convention this year on this new program. A Motion to accept this "Second Century Leadership Model" (copy attached) made by DG Mundy, 18-I. Motion seconded by DG Varnadoe, 18-N. Motion carried.

PIP Ervin stated that the new 2.0 GMT program that was just approved by the Board will also have some specific training different than what we have been doing. Mark has not received everything yet, but it will be coming. There will be specific training for the GMT Coordinators, Zone Chairs more specifically as it relates to the position and there will be funding available to help the Multiple District do this. This should be beneficial.

Dear Georgia Lions! (Excerpt before the Council)

Many exciting things have been happening at our GA Lions Lighthouse. Our annual Taste of Chamblee fundraiser was a great success. It was a good opportunity to strengthen our partnership with the City of Chamblee and the local businesses.

The Lighthouse Board hosted a joint Board training event with the GA Lions Camp Board and the Council of Governors at Callaway Gardens. We hope the training was beneficial to all who attended. The world of nonprofits is totally different from our Lions world. It is quite an accomplishment that we have been able to blend the two together over the years. The Lighthouse also hosted a reception for the Georgia Optometric Association. The Exam Rooms were dedicated to the Georgia Optometric Association for their support of the Lighthouse. These are the doctors who partner with us to provide vision services. We had several doctors to say that they wanted to get involved with the Lighthouse and offer their services.

We took the GA Lions Lighthouse on the road to Michigan to the USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum in September. In addition to having an exhibit at the Forum, Lion Roberta Green and I presented a 1 hour seminar on Partnerships. There were 85 Lions from the U.S. and Canada attending. At the closing banquet, Lion Roberta Green, PIP Jim Ervin, and I made a short presentation on the Lighthouse before an audience of 2,000 Lions and guests. We would like to thank PCC Mark Miller, Chair of the 2015 Forum, for giving us the opportunity to showcase the Lighthouse nationally and internationally. Part of the presentation at the Forum was about Lions' new involvement with the Peach Bowl. Hopefully, we can involve Lions associated with the two college teams who will be playing in the Peach Bowl game on December 31st. We are planning eye screenings in conjunction with the game also. Our challenge is to sell 2,500 tickets to the game. Even if Lions don't purchase the tickets, we need Lions to encourage individuals, businesses, and corporations to purchase the tickets. The Peach Bowl Committee is excited about our involvement. They gave us the opportunity to have a display at Fan Fest at the Chic-Fil-A Kickoff football game. We are working hard to continue the legacy of PID George Crumbley, who founded the Peach Bowl in 1968 to benefit the GA Lions Lighthouse.

With all of this going on, we are still serving Georgians in need. Since July 1, there have been 526 eye exams performed and 1,191 eyeglasses provided. We have served 405 patients through our Framekit Program and 187 surgical procedures have been done. We have also provided 687 hearing aids. All of this has been accomplished with several vacancies in staff positions. A new position has been created at the Lighthouse, and that is Lions Liaison. That position has been filled by Ruthie Stephens - PCC Clower introduced the group to Ruthy Stephens, who is the Lions liaison at the Georgia Lions Lighthouse. If you call the Lighthouse for anything, you should choose Ruthie's extension; and she will be glad to help you. She also introduced Lion Morgan Alexander, and Lion Peri Finch.

The Lighthouse Development Department is busy submitting grant applications and seeking funds from other donors. Our Lions giving totals \$36,285, which is just 14% of last year's total giving. We hope the Lions will step up and continue to support the Lighthouse. As I have said before, we are very fortunate to have Lion Roberta as Executive Director and all the other Lions on staff at the Lighthouse. To be able to operate a nonprofit, founded by Lions, and serve so many Georgians is a monumental task. "We Serve" on!

Last week we were honored to present our dedicated partner, Dr. Bret Wagenhorst, O.D. of <u>Tifton Ophthalmology</u>, with the Beacon of Hope Award, an award presented each year to an Ophthalmologist who provides an outstanding commitment to vision healthcare for the uninsured in their community. Since 2007, Dr. Wagenhorst has provided 1,227 vision services and 50 sight surgeries to Lighthouse clients in his community.

REPORT OF GEORGIA LIONS CAMP FOR THE BLIND – LION SCOTT EISENHART: Georgia Lions Camp End of Year Report 2014-2015

On 01 October 2015 at approximately 10:25 PM, our Executive Director, Brian Blackburn was arrested in Moultrie, Georgia for driving under the influence of alcohol. This is a matter of public record. I was notified at approximately 4:25 PM on 11 October of the incident. The reason for the delay in notification was based on a recommendation of Brian's legal counsel. The Camp Attorney and the Personnel Chairman were each notified of the situation. The Board was notified of the situation via email dated 19 October. The Personnel Committee was also informed via email and telephone; they were asked to provide a recommendation to the board regarding the employment status of the Executive Director in light of negative publicity. The Personnel Committee came back with the recommendation to place the Executive Director on administrative leave for a period of 30 days with pay pending adjudication of the court. It was deemed prudent to take immediate action and as such, I placed Brian Blackburn on Administrative leave effective 18 October. The Executive Board met via teleconference to discuss the motion and to solicit support for said motion.

I also spoke with PIP Jim Ervin concerning the situation. PIP Jim stated that he felt the situation was being addressed appropriately but warned me not to rush to a decision. PIP Jim stated that it was vital to get all of the information prior to a decision being made. I assured him that I would attempt to do such. PIP Jim was also made aware of the motion by the board to terminate. When PIP Jim specifically and directly asked who made that motion, he was told the motion was made by PCC Olin Newby and seconded by Carey Van Landingham. PIP Jim thanked me for calling him and stated that if there was anything that he could do to assist, to please let him know.

On Thursday, 22 October, the board met to discuss the recommendation of the Personnel Committee. After a question and answer session with the Personnel Chairman and with consent of legal counsel, the board voted to place Brian Blackburn on 30 day paid leave pending adjudication.

This brings up the subject of Christmas Camp which will be held on December 4 through 6 at the camp. Let there be no mistake, Christmas camp will continue! We cannot and will not cancel camp this year. If we do so, we will have done irreparable harm to the camp and the program. I simply will not allow that to happen! What does that mean for us? That means that the Lions of Georgia will be doing camp that weekend! I will be at the camp conducting camp and I am asking for your assistance. There are several counselors that will be coming back to assist, along with the older Leo's from the Moultrie club. The invitations have already gone out and there have several applications already received at the camp. The show must go on!

Now for a difficult question that needs asked: Are the Lions of Georgia willing to keep the camp as a state mandated initiative? Donations are down and it is getting more difficult to keep the bills paid. Donations statewide are at 19% according to the numbers I received by my Treasurer for last month. This trend simply cannot continue. What must we do in order to light the fire under our collective backsides and support the camp?

The apathy of the Lions of Georgia is quite disheartening. Everyone is willing to complain about the program, however no one is willing to step up and put words into action. Example: A 31 consultant offered to do a fundraiser for the camp. She made a very popular item available at 25% off retail, tax and handling included in the discounted price. Retail price was \$50.00; she sold at the discounted price of \$38.00. For each bag purchased, she donated her commission, which was \$9 per bag. This sale was publicized on multiple Facebook pages including the camp's Facebook page, the Savannah Port City page, Georgia Blind Lions page and multiple personal pages as well as the consultant's personal group page. Invitations were sent out to over 300 Lions concerning this fundraiser. A considerable number of those Lions "liked" the sale, a total of THREE Lions participated, and myself being one of them, the other two were Mike/Gail Williams and Brian Blackburn, both from the camp. What is wrong with this picture? I would love to see the camp receive the same support statewide that the Lighthouse receives.

The Camp is continuing to sell the Memorial Garden bricks as a fund raiser for the Camp. If we can sell at least 100 bricks per year, we can generate about \$7,000 for the General Fund at no cost to the Camp. The Memorial Garden is completely paid for by grants that we received. The Camp continues to be in need of (and depends upon) your individual and club donations. Please consider this as we continue this Lions year. Please contact us if you know of any corporations, foundations, or programs which could help with support and funding.

FINANCIAL STATUS

Due to very low available cash, \$22,000 was transferred from the Investment fund to the Operating Fund. Total Operating Income for Dec. was \$17,207 and the Total Operating Expenses were \$15,871 for a positive gain of \$1,336 for the month. The Year-to-Date Net Operating Losses are \$59,686 excluding the \$47,000 that has been transferred from the Investment Fund. The total of all bank accounts is \$39,436 of which \$10,605 are restricted leaving \$28,831 for Operational Funds.



- > Maybe at least one life may be saved by simply reading and heeding the message below...
- > 1 Let's say it's 7.25pm and you're going home (alone of course) after an unusually hard day on the job.
- > 2 You're really tired, upset and frustrated.
- > 3 Suddenly you start experiencing severe pain in your chest that starts to drag out into your arm and up in to your jaw. You are only about five miles from the hospital nearest your home.
- > 4 Unfortunately you don't know if you'll be able to make it that far.
- > 5 You have been trained in CPR, but the guy that taught the course did not tell you how to perform it on yourself.
- > 6 HOW TO SURVIVE A HEART ATTACK WHEN ALONE?
- > Since many people are alone when they suffer a heart attack without help, the person whose heart is beating improperly and who begins to feel faint, has only about 10 seconds left before losing consciousness.
- > 7 However, these victims can help themselves by coughing repeatedly and very vigorously. A deep breath should be taken before each cough, and the cough must be deep and prolonged, as when producing sputum from deep inside the chest.
- > A breath and a cough must be repeated about every two seconds without let-up until help arrives, or until the heart is felt to be beating normally again.
- > 8 Deep breaths get oxygen into the lungs and coughing movements squeeze the heart and keep the blood circulating. The squeezing pressure on the heart also helps it regain normal rhythm. In this way, heart attack victims can get to a hospital.
- > 9 Tell as many other people as possible about this. It could save their lives!
- > 10 A cardiologist says If everyone who gets this mail, kindly sends it to 10 people, you can bet that we'll save at least one life.

People do not decline mentally with age, it just takes them longer to recall facts because they have more information in their brains, scientists believe. Much like a computer struggles as the hard drive gets full up, so to do humans take longer to access information, it has been suggested.

He likes to call that moment "winning his blindness," because it was the beginning of his incredible journey.

As an accomplished athlete, he has won four gold medals at the Paralympic Games and set world records. Wanting to push himself in other arenas, he climbed Mt. Kilimanjaro and was the first blind Spanish athlete to complete Ironman Lanzarote, widely recognized as one of the toughest Ironman courses. Recently, he competed in the NYC Marathon after relocating to the U.S.

A Champion and George

We first met retired LTC Kathy Champion when she received her first guide dog, Angel. Kathy lost her vision from a virus contracted in Iraq, and also suffered from Post Traumatic Stress Disorder. When Angel retired, Kathy spent four months alone before getting her new black Lab, George.

"I found out how lonely and isolated I became without a dog," she shares. "I didn't go anywhere or do anything. George is more than a guide. He's emotional support in crowds. When I have issues with anxiety and claustrophobia, I can reach down and touch George."

Since meeting George, Kathy has hiked in Peru, cycled in Colorado, and raced sailboats, all the while helping connect other veterans to the freedom she found through our dogs.

Kathy also pays it forward through our Heritage Society. "I cannot financially sponsor a dog; I can't write a check for \$60,000," she explains. "But I can make Southeastern Guide Dogs the beneficiary of my life insurance policy. When I move on, there will be a way to sponsor and provide dogs for someone else."



Lions Quest Continues to Expand





LCIF and the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC) have worked together since 2012 to bring Lions Quest to the Balkans region. In 2014, a pilot program was launched in

Serbia. This year, the program expanded into Macedonia (FYROM) and Montenegro. This expansion will allow for the training of 150 teachers and will positively impact more than 2,000 students in 50 schools. An evaluation of the Serbian program shows that Lions Quest improved drug and alcohol refusal skills and increased risk perception among students. Melvin Jones and Fort Thomas

Located at Fort Thomas, Arizona, the Melvin Jones Lions International Memorial was erected and dedicated in 1965. This came years after a movement by the Arizona Lions to find a way to honor Melvin Jones, founder of one of the largest humanitarian service organizations in the world, "LIONS CLUBS INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION."

Melvin was born on January 13, 1879, at Fort Thomas Arizona at a time when the west remained unsettled because the Apache Indians were making their last stand against the White man's encroachment on their land.

While visiting his birthplace he related a memory of a spanking received at age three for running away from home with his dog to the nearby Gila River. In an interview for an article in the Lions Magazine, Melvin recalled that he was either seven or eight years old when his family moved from Arizona Territory, and his boyhood memories were of horses, blue clad troopers, bugles and war cries, wagon trains, gaunt settlers and dust."

Part of Melvin's schooling was at the Union Business and Chaddock Colleges of Quincy Illinois.

At age 33 he was the sole owner of his own insurance agency in Chicago, Illinois and became a member of the local business circle. After two years, he felt that as influential businessmen, their talents could be better utilized in other areas of community life.

In 1917 after pursuing this thought for four years they formed what is now known as LIONS CLUBS INTERNATIONAL, with 20 delegates representing 27 clubs from around the United States.

The Association became international in 1920, when the Lions of Detroit chartered the Windsor Ontario Lions Club, in Canada, In 1950, Melvin Jones, who was born on a cavalry outpost in Camp Thomas Arizona was conferred the title of SECRETARY GENERAL of LIONS INTERNATIONAL for life.

Since that time Lions organizations have grown to over 1.4 million members in over 45,000 clubs.

Lionism's dedication to aiding the blind grew out of a speech by Helen Keller in 1925, when she challenged the Lions to become "Knights of the Blind in the crusade against darkness." In today's Lion world Lions not only dedicate themselves to the visually impaired but to programs for preventable and corrective eye diseases, and have moved to dedication of the hearing impaired, youth programs, Diabetes and aid in disaster programs all over the world.

Melvin Jones the founder of this great service organization, died in 1961. His philosophy of life, "you can't get very far until you start doing something for somebody else," lives in our motto "WE SERVE."

In 1961 the International Board of Directors proclaimed January 13 (the birthday of our founder, Melvin Jones) as a day of memory each year though out the world of Lionism. Founders and Rededication month traditionally observed in January, shall thereafter be designated as Melvin Jones Memorial month.

Thereafter every year on the Saturday closest to the 13th of January, Lions though out the world gather to pay tribute to Melvin Jones who said, "Dreams are the fool ideas of day before yesterday that become the commonplace miracles of today."

In June 1999 the Lions International Board gave this prestigious fifty foot spire recognition as an International Shrine. On several occasions before his passing, Melvin visited the site of his birth and participated with the Arizona Lions groups that laid the foundation for the memorial now honoring his name.

All donations of \$250, \$500 and \$1000 are suitably recognized on the Wall of Fame, which is mounted in the Melvin Jones Lions International Memorial Building for all to view.

Trachoma partners celebrate exceptional progress

ICTC, The International Trachoma Initiative (ITI) and Pfizer Inc. are today marking exceptional progress in global efforts to eliminate trachoma, the world's leading cause of preventable blindness, with the announcement of Pfizer's 500 millionth dose of Zithromax® (azithromycin) Tablets, an antibiotic used to treat trachoma. The milestone marks significant achievement in global efforts to help eliminate this infectious and preventable eye disease that can lead to permanent blindness, as a public health threat by the year 2020.

Today, delegations from the UK and US governments, non-governmental organizations (NGOs) and Pfizer are gathering in the Woliso region of Ethiopia to celebrate the donation of the 500 millionth Zithromax dose and a significant expansion of the national trachoma elimination program in the country.

"This milestone highlights what is possible when partners work together toward a common goal and signifies remarkable achievement in our fight to eliminate trachoma globally," said ICTC's Chair Virginia Sarah, "Collective efforts are helping to reduce the impacts of this ancient, preventable disease on affected individuals, families and communities."

The burden of trachoma remains highest in Ethiopia, with 75 million people at risk, and the Federal Ministry of Health is working with Alliance partners to significantly expand the number of people in Ethiopia who are treated.

"The expansion of the SAFE strategy across Ethiopia is vital in alleviating the sufferings of millions of our people and ultimately eradicating trachoma from our soil," said His Excellency Dr. Kesetebirhan Admasu, Minister of Health of the Federal Democratic Republic of Ethiopia. "The burden of trachoma is too high, but with the implementation of SAFE strategies, including Pfizer's donation of Zithromax, and efficient partnership with international partners, we are determined to achieve this goal."

Trachoma is an infectious disease, which can develop into a condition in which eyelids turn inwards and eyelashes scrape the eyeball, causing great pain, corneal ulcers and irreversible blindness. There are 232 million people in 58 countries at risk, with more than 80 percent of the global burden of the disease concentrated in 14 countries, mostly in Africa. Trachoma is responsible for the visual impairment of approximately 2.2 million people, 1.2 million of whom are irreversibly blind. It threatens entire socio-economic infrastructures and as a result, is estimated to cause USD \$3-6 billion in lost productivity per year across affected countries.

"I am extremely grateful to Pfizer for having donated 500 million doses of Zithromax in the fight against blinding trachoma to date," said former US President Jimmy Carter, founder of The Carter Center, a pioneer and partner in disease elimination activities. "The Carter Center is proud to have distributed more than 25 percent of those doses in the Amhara region of Ethiopia, the most trachomaendemic area of the world, along with our partners Lions Clubs International Foundation and the Federal Ministry of Health.

Together, we remain committed to eliminating blinding trachoma and reducing unnecessary suffering."

Partners celebrating today are working as part of The World Health Organization (WHO) Alliance for the Global Elimination of Trachoma by 2020 (GET 2020). The Alliance is a unique collaboration of more than 100 governments, NGOs and private sector partners implementing a WHO-recommended strategy called 'SAFE' that combines:

- Surgery to treat the blinding stage of the disease,
- Antibiotics to treat infection, particularly administration of Zithromax,
- Facial cleanliness to help reduce transmission, and
- Environmental improvement, particularly improving access to water and sanitation.

This integrated strategy ensures that the positive impacts of antibiotic treatments are sustained through improved hygiene, while surgery ensures that those who cannot be cured are still treated to alleviate their discomfort and improve their quality of life.



"At Pfizer we believe that access to quality healthcare and the opportunity to lead healthy lives is an extremely important social goal," said Ian Read, chief executive officer, Pfizer. "The power and value of collaboration between public and private organizations in achieving that goal cannot be overstated. We are proud to work with our international partners on this mission to help end trachoma by 2020."

Since the Alliance was formed in 1998, partners have treated more than one hundred million people in 33 countries. In 2012, Oman became the first country to achieve WHO validation of trachoma elimination. In addition, China, Gambia, Ghana, Iran, Morocco, Myanmar and Vietnam have all reported the achievement of elimination goals to WHO, and are awaiting the outcome of the validation process.

"As we celebrate our great progress, it is critical that we remain steadfast in our efforts to eliminate trachoma from the lives of everyone it affects," said Dr Paul Emerson, Director of ITI, the ICTC member organization that manages Pfizer's Zithromax donation. "We have the partners, tools and momentum to beat this debilitating disease, and we are driving toward 2020 with a sense of urgency and determination. Together we can help ensure that all people of all nations will never have to endure the horror caused by trachoma."

Walking by faith, not by sight

Timothy Jones is a 22-year-old organ major at Mercer University. He one day dreams of being a church organist and hosting concerts where he'll share his testimony. Marin Guta Center for Collaborative Journalism

At 8 a.m. each Wednesday, a time when many Mercer University students already have pressed their snooze alarms several times, freshman Timothy Jones is in McCorkle Music Hall perfecting his rendition of Claude Debussy's "Clair de Lune." For four hours, Jones' hands glide over the piano keys in a practice room there until his class at noon.

From outside the room, he sounds like any gifted musician. Jones, however, doesn't have sheet music, and he never glances down at his keyboard. He has memorized the entire performance. He is legally blind. The 22-year-old is an organ performance major at the Mercer's Townsend School of Music. His road hasn't been easy.

When Jones was 3 years old, his mother, Nancy, learned that he had Leber's congenital amaurosis, a rare, hereditary eye disease. But Jones, who began trying to play Twila Paris' "Lamb of God" on the piano at age 2, has always had a passion for music. When Jones was growing up, he would attend traditional church services with his parents and two brothers. There, the precocious talent heard a choir singing accompanied by a thunderous organ.

"I thought, 'Wouldn't it be cool to play an instrument like that and play for a choir and congregation?" Jones recalled. "I knew from then on that I would want to study to become a church organist."

Though Jones was excited to study the organ at Mercer, he decided to defer his acceptance for a year because he would have to learn some new technology and software before beginning. During Jones' deferment year, the Townsend School of Music offered him organ and piano lessons free of charge, which astonished Jones and his family.

The summer before Jones began his freshman year, he memorized the basic layout of the campus. At first, the task was daunting because of the campus' size. He also tried to convince Mercer's disabilities service coordinator, Carole Burrowbridge, that he would need Braille books for his music classes. Burrowbridge thought Jones would get most of his books through an electronic database, but Jones said it wasn't possible.

Jones started his first week of freshman year without any textbooks, but he still had assignments to complete under deadline. At the time, the anxiety of having to complete certain assignments but not having textbooks took a toll on Jones. He considered packing his bags and going home. "I was thinking 'this isn't going to work. I sense disaster coming, and I'm going to flunk," he said.

Once the music faculty became aware of his situation, they called a meeting and tried to find a way to help Jones. The professors agreed to give Jones an extension on his homework until his books arrived. The dean of the music department even read some of his music textbooks aloud to him so he could turn in his assignments.

In many of Jones' classes, he's learning the theoretical side of music, and his textbooks use musical symbols. Burrowbridge had to find a way to present this visual information in a way Jones could use, so her office ended up ordering all of Jones' textbooks in Braille. Learning music theory is only half the battle for a music major, though. Jones also has to find a way to learn the music he is expected to

When Jones is learning a new piece, his professors will record themselves playing sections of the piece with the left and right hand played separately. The professors will then upload the file onto Dropbox -- a file sharing and storage site -- and Jones will download and listen to the file.

Since Jones has perfect pitch -- the ability to identify a musical note without hearing any other tone -- he is able to teach himself to play what he hears without the benefit of sheet music. He repeatedly listens to specific sections and practices them until it's memorized. Playing classical music is a challenge in itself, but the fact that Jones can play blind makes it a "physical phenomenon," said Ian Altman, a piano professor at Mercer.

Although being blind makes life more difficult, Jones said his disability serves a spiritual purpose.

"As far as faith goes, I have learned that we don't know what's ahead of us, and in a way each one of us is blind," Jones said. "We don't know what's on the road ahead, and that's where it takes trusting in an eternal creator." Disabilities won't stop the aspiring musician from pursuing his dream of one day hosting his own concert and sharing his testimony at the end of it.

"I did get some challenges when I came here, and I'm still getting challenged. But who knows what's on the road ahead?" Jones said, "I'll just be trusting the Lord that he will direct my path."

The Ball That Beeps

IT LOOKS LIKE BASEBALL

There's a ball and a bat. There are fielders, a pitcher, a catcher and a batter at the plate.

But it sure doesn't sound like baseball. The ball beeps and the bases buzz. Spectators don't cheer until the end of the play. This is beep baseball, an entirely original competitive sport that lets visually impaired athlete's suit up for a special version of America's favorite pastime.

Beep baseball also builds the players' mental and physical confidence and creates a bond between sighted and the visually impaired.

In 1964, Charlie Fairbanks, an Engineer with Mountain Bell and a Telephone Pioneer developed the first beep baseball. There in Colorado he implanted a beeping device in a softball as a recreational and educational tool. By the spring of 1975, the Minneapolis Telephone Pioneers had presented this "beeping" baseball to a blind athlete in Minneapolis. There in Minneapolis he put together the 1st Beep Baseball team. Then, across the Mississippi River in St. Paul another team was formed. Finally, these 2 teams played each. By 1976 Beep Baseball rules were created and the game began to spread across the country. In that same year, The National Beep Baseball Association (N.B.B.A.) was created in Chicago. Dedicated volunteers form the backbone of the NBBA's program, including the annual World Series.

Today, there are many visually impaired athletes enjoying the benefits of playing a sport that used to belong exclusively to the sighted. With the help of sighted volunteers, blind athletes dive onto the ground to stop a beeping baseball or run full speed toward the sound of a buzzing base to score a run!!

Perhaps beep baseball's greatest contribution is the important bridge it is creating between the sighted and visually impaired. Sighted people go away from a beep baseball game with a new appreciation of what blindness is all about. They know they just witnessed a prime example of overcoming a physical handicap. A blind person goes home with the deep satisfaction of knowing with the assistance of a sighted person, that they too can play the great "American Pastime".

Atlanta Eclipse Beep Baseball Team

In March of 2010, the first practice of the Atlanta Eclipse Beep Baseball Team took place with about 15 players and 8 volunteers, most of whom knew little to nothing about beep baseball. We all joke about it today, recalling that it was definitely the blind leading the blind!
