LION SID L. SCRUGGS, III, PRESIDENT, LIONS CLUBS INTERNATIONAL:

President Scruggs stated that it has been a wonderful year, and that everyone agrees it makes a lot of difference when you emphasize service. Chickamauga Lions Club

The Club started out as a normal selling light bulbs, mop and brooms. Also, fruit cakes were a big seller. As we all know, new and fresh ideas with new members joining the club we were able to expand with Down Home Days — a three day event that starts on Thursday and ends on Saturday. These events continues today with a Golf tournament, Chili Supper and Bingo as well as a street fest with crafts, games, food and music.

We also started out with a Star Student/Star Teacher and thru the years improved this also by having a Banquet and award a \$1,000 scholarship and 2 \$500 scholarship to the top students from Gordon Lee High School. As the years went by we added more Lions and came up with another fund-raiser with a Truck Give A Way and Steak Dinner. Today, we decided to give away cash and still have the steak dinner. Tickets are sold at \$100 each for a Steak Dinner and we give a \$10,000 first prize and two \$1,000 second and third prize.

New projects were added – the Coke Oven Festival an Christmas in the Streets. These have been well attended and appreciated by the community. The newest project we have is the Supermarket Sweep. The first year we raised \$483 – we saw the results and made improvements and the following year we made \$1,062. This really has been a fun event and should continue for many more years.

With all the money raised the Club has been able to donate (besides our projects to the Lighthouse, Camp and Leader Dog) we are able to provide to the High School Band, Faith Children's Home, the Older American Center, Secret Santa, Babies Can't Wait, Stocking Full of Love (toys), Chattanooga Forgotten Children's Fund, Family Crisis Center, glasses and much more within the community. Service projects have been numerous by providing fan's to the elderly, building wheel chair ramps, build furniture of the Library and Family Crisis Center, helping and providing need items to victims of tornados. We have been able to provide 370 youth coasts as a project. Donated 21 books to the public library in memory of our deceased members. Provided miscellaneous school supplies to Chickamauga Elementary School, Cherokee Ridge Elementary School and Harvest Christian Academy. We help support our LEO Club and they in turn have provided us with much needed help.

We also purchase a \$1,700 video magnifier for a 7 year old to help with her school work. She improved 3 reading levels in less than 2 weeks time.

This year The Hinesville Lions Club has been active in many projects to improve our community. The club "adopted" Taylor's Creek Elementary School. With the many cutbacks and teacher furloughs the club wanted to insure that every teacher had hand sanitizer, paper towels, and cleaning products for their rooms. We collected over 400 pounds of supplies and delivered them to the School when the first semester started.

For Thanksgiving, with the help of DFACS we identified 12 needy families and delivered 12 Turkeys along with a large box of food to them for Thanksgiving. Few things are more rewarding than seeing the smiles and gratitude as we delivered the food with our Lions vests on.

We also "adopted" residents of a nursing home. These residents do not have family members who regularly visit. The club made sure that their birthdays and holidays are remembered with cards, flowers, and gifts. A special trip was made this past year to insure that they all had presents under the Christmas tree.

Many of our members volunteered at the Georgia Lions Lighthouse Foundation Screenings. Screenings are held in Savannah, Brunswick, and Waycross through a partnership with free health clinics and the Georgia Lions Lighthouse. Throughout the year, the Hinesville Lions also collect eyeglasses, lenses, hearing aids, and cell phones for the Georgia Lions Lighthouse Foundation. The Lighthouse washes sorts and recycles the eyeglasses, lenses and hearing aids all over the world.

The club sponsored a "Send a Kid to Camp Dice Run" This is the third year we have put on this event. Proceeds help with defraying the cost to local Vision Impaired Georgians to go to the Camp for the Blind in Waycross during the summer. Another Dice Run is under planning for this fall.

Other community service projects include supporting youth recreation sports. Our junior softball team was champions in 2007 and in the region play-offs the past 3 years. Our club also supports the Boy Scouts of America through donations and purchase of turkeys from their fundraiser.

Villa Rica Golden City and Villa Rica Lions Club

The Villa Rica & Villa Rica Golden City Lions Club held its first, very successful Vision Clinic at Rapha Clinic of West Georgia in Temple for twelve patients, on Saturday, June 18, from 9:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. Ten people received eye exams & two more had prescriptions filled for glasses. One patient was referred to a cataract specialist and another with hearing loss was told that the clinic staff would refer her to an audiologist, then she could have the prescription filled at the GA Lions Lighthouse for a hearing aid. All the vision screening equipment was transported from the Lighthouse to the clinic in the Lighthouse mobile unit.

The new Vision Clinic was well staffed by six volunteers who were trained by Tiffany Ellerbee, Vision Clinic Coordinator at the GA Lions Lighthouse. Lions Kinney Taylor, David Mecklin, Tom Proctor and Dev Ormiston volunteered from Villa Rica Lions, and Lions Ann Olson and Jacki Dixon from Villa Rica Golden City Lions. Dr Jennifer Wilcox, an optometrist with LensCrafters in Arbor Place Mall in Douglasville and a Villa Rica resident, donated her time to perform the eye exams. Sue Brockman, executive director of Rapha Clinic, was on hand to assist with patients and provide refreshments. She had arranged all the appointments in advance and completed paperwork for the Lighthouse. And of course, the patients who received eye exams that they otherwise could not afford, were extremely grateful and appreciative that this service done locally. One patient exclaimed, when fitted with lenses that would correct her vision, "The letters aren't dancing anymore!"



Ms.Ellerbee was pleased that the clinic ran so smoothly, especially for the first time. Dr Wilcox remarked that all the work was done for her by the volunteers, making her job so easy. Ms. Brockman was excited that a vision clinic was added to the Rapha medical clinic which has been established for one year.

Holding a vision clinic requires several steps and each volunteer was trained to do a job. Ms. Olson greeted and signed in the patients and chatted with them and their families while they waited to be seen. Mr. Ormiston input the patients' information into the computer, while Mr. Proctor tested their vision with an eye chart. Ms. Ellerbee administered eye drops to dilate the eyes and measured the intraocular pressure, testing for glaucoma. Dr Wilcox performed a refractive eye exam and examined the retina for eye diseases. Mr. Meclin measured the distance between the pupils and assisted w selecting frames, which were donated to the Lighthouse by an optical shop. Mrs. Dixon ran interference and served as fashion consultant in selecting frames that were suitable for face shape and size as well as hair color. Lastly, Mr. Taylor entered the patients' data and prescription into the computer and distributed goody bags and refreshments.

The patients' glasses will be made at the GA Lions Lighthouse, which began its in-house optical operation this week. The glasses will be mailed to the patients, who will receive them in two to four weeks.

Centerville Lions Club

The Centerville Lions Club was chartered February 15, 1967. The Macon Southside Lions Club and the Warner Robins Lions Club co-sponsored the new club. Lions Walter Wilson, Macon Southside and Jay Jones, Warner Robins, were the guiding Lions. The District 18E Governor at this time was Lion C.V. Glisson from the Fort Valley Lions Club. Our club has sponsored the Centerville Lioness Club and the Macon Evening Lions Club. Charter members Leroy Carter and Robert "Bob" Smith are still active in our club.

The club went to work immediately by starting a city recreation program. Members operated a recreation center complete with games and refreshments. The club also offered refreshments at the local ballpark, operating the refreshment stand from the trunks of their cars. The club bought the lettering for the local elementary school with profits from the refreshment stand.

Many fund raisers were attempted, some successful, some not. The most meaningful project this club has been involved with to date occurred in 1975. A baby girl was born to a Centerville couple. Shortly after birth, it was discovered that the baby had tumors behind both eyes. The Centerville Lions club along with several area civic groups held a fund raiser and collected over \$25,000 to help with medical expenses. Centerville Lions were appointed caretakers of the account. The monies paid for trips to New York for radium implants in the tumors. This was an ongoing process. After many trips to this doctor, one eye had to be removed but some sight was saved in the other eye. The little girl grew up and attended college. Again the Centerville Lions Club furnished a magnifying reader to aid the girl's college progress. Soon after graduating, sight in both eyes was gone. The Centerville Lions processed the paperwork and sent the girl to Rochester, Michigan to get a Leader Dog. She began working and being a productive citizen. Years later now, Charlene Leverett's health has failed to the point that she is bedridden most of the time. Her brother is her only living immediate family member. He works and tries to care for her. The Centerville Lions Club pays her utility bills quarterly.

This club works projects such as semi-annual Bar-B-Ques, Sweetheart runs (5 and 10K), Bake Sale, Golf Tournament, Broom Sales, working National Fair gate, and others so that contributions can be made to all projects sanctioned by the International Association, Georgia Multiple District and District 18F. We also still celebrate World Lions Service Day by cooking a fried chicken dinner for 60-100 of the community's senior citizens, at no cost to them.

In 1994, we built our club house. We, then, became Centerville Lions Club Incorporated. Since the building was completed, we have hosted Zone Meetings, Cabinet Meetings, Georgia Lions Lighthouse Meetings, Georgia Lions Camp for the Blind Meetings, joint Lions Club Meetings as well as furnishing a meeting place for some of the community's non-profit organizations.

We have had two District Governors and the top secretary for two years and second place for top secretary for one year, many Lions holding district/state offices, including the treasurer for the Camp for the Blind. To date, we have 23 Melvin Jones Fellows and three Tom Bingham Fellows. We also have 11 members named to the District 18F Hall of Fame and two of our Lionesses.



Our club is looking forward to serving our community far and wide in the future.

The story of Jesus Sanchez Cabral: how his loss of sight altered the course of the life of one of his sons, and wrote a new chapter in the history of America's flag.

Jesus Sanchez "Chuy" Cabral was born in Valparaiso in Zacatecas, Mexico in 1916, during the Mexican Revolution/Civil War (1910-1920), one of the last of the long series of Mexican/Indian Wars.

As the war waged on Jesus' father instructed his wife to leave for the United States and to take the children with her, while he remained behind to fight to keep the family land.

Unfortunately, he was killed and was never to see his small family or they him again. Jesus, along with his mother and siblings made their way to Chicago, Illinois which was to become their new home. At the time Jesus was only two years of age. For the next several years the family lived in Chicago.

Working for the Rock Island and Union Pacific railroads led the family to Kansas, and eventually Hutchinson, Kansas where their new home became a permanent one.



In 1941 World War II broke out and Jesus, barely 25 years of age, enlisted in the Army Air Corps. From 1941 to 1946 he was deployed to Eastern Africa, the South Pacific, and Northern Europe. During his time in service he was awarded several medals. Following the war, Jesus married and fathered 11 children. Ten years previous to his death in March of 1998, he became blind due to glaucoma. Blindness robbed Jesus of many things, but, perhaps nothing saddened him more than no longer being able to post the American flag on his front porch. Something he regarded as a duty of all Americans.

In 1994, among the many children, his middle son Randolph Cabral took up an interest in Braille and services to the blind. In 1998, the same year Jesus died Randolph founded an institute in Wichita, Kansas in his father's memory, directed toward helping those who are blind or have low vision. In 2000, the Institute was officially chartered and took the name Kansas Braille Transcription Institute.



One evening while working late in his office, Randolph created a tactile American flag to honor his father. In February 2008, the with the help of Kansas Congressman Todd Tiahrt, the U.S. Congress unanimously authorized placement of the Braille flag at Arlington National Cemetery as a tribute to blind veterans and other blind Americans. In April of 2008 the Braille flag was officially installed at the cemetery. Today the American Braille flag is mass produced in Wichita, Kansas, and literally thousands have found their way into blind veteran's homes and hospitals, offices of elected officials, schools for the blind, and many different businesses.

Proceeds generated from the American Braille flag benefit blind and low vision veterans and other blind and low vision Americans.

Global Membership Team Overview

The Global Membership Team (GMT) provides a global structure for membership development which is continuous, focused, and integrated. Effective July 1, 2011, a Global Leadership Team counterpart was established. Additionally, newly expanded GMT-MD/District/Single District teams and GLT MD/District and Single District teams were established to replace the MERL program. This new structure was created to work in a highly interdependent manner from the international level, to the constitutional area level, the multiple district level, and to the district level for the benefit and success of the club.



Members of the <u>GMT</u> and <u>GLT</u> work together to identify, develop and encourage opportunities for present and future Lions leaders, and to develop membership through service and engagement.

The Global Membership Team and Global Leadership Team operate as parallel structures to enhance membership growth and leadership development. The two structures are connected and coordinated at the international level by an executive council. The GMT/GLT Executive Council is led by the LCI international president, with the international first and second vice presidents overseeing and providing guidance to the GMT and GLT respectively. Both the GMT and GLT are further supported by an international coordinator and a joint operations committee composed of the chairpersons of the Membership Development Committee, the Leadership Committee and the District and Club Service Committee, as well as a team of appointed constitutional area leaders.

Leadership is critical to the overall success of any organization, including Lions Clubs International. An effective leadership team provides the vision, guidance and motivation necessary for our association to continue to fulfill its mission of providing quality, relevant service to communities around the world.



The Global Leadership Team (GLT) provides for an enhanced focus on leadership development, which is critical to the future vitality of our association. The GLT directs its efforts toward identifying and cultivating effective leaders through active training and leadership development initiatives, while providing necessary information, guidance and motivation.

GLT Structure

<u>The GLT structure</u> encompasses representation at the **international**, **multiple district**, **single district** and **district** levels and includes district governor teams, provides a comprehensive global platform for developing more qualified leaders from the club level up, while encouraging regional training and development approaches to address local needs.

Operating as an action-oriented, parallel, mutually supportive team with the <u>GMT</u>, the GLT was developed to augment the local efforts of our DG Teams. The Georgia Lions Lighthouse remains focused on our mission of bringing sight and sound to Georgians who have no other recourse. Because of the commitment and determination of Lions Clubs throughout the State, the Lighthouse has empowered the lives of many more Georgians than ever before. In the past four years, we have increased our points of service by 600%. The first quarter of 2010, we provided glasses to 698 clients in seventeen eyeglass clinics across Georgia. 259 people received 482 hearing aids and 69 received sight-saving surgery. Because of your support, many clients returned to work, school, and lives of competence and independence. We all have much to be grateful for, this Thanksgiving. Operations funding is somewhat less than it was this time last year. The Lions of GA contributed \$33,000 of the \$332,000 total contributions. White Cane and Luminary (individual) giving will be in the spotlight the first quarter of 2011.

Excitement continues to build as we put finishing touches on our new home, and prepare for a December move. In our current offices, the Lighthouse is at the absolute limit of service we are able to provide. We have listed the property with Ackerman & Co for \$565,000.00. The Lighthouse is in the process of going paperless, with applications and other documents scanned into the computer. Files and boxes, that are no longer needed, are being recycled and removed.

Declaration of Independent Travel

In the famous words of the United States Declaration of Independence:

"We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness."

The ability to travel independently is an unalienable right and essential to the "pursuit of happiness;"

That location technology dramatically increases an individual's ability to travel independently;

That it is time for every individual who is blind and visually impaired to have affordable access to location technology to increase his or her ability to travel independently.



Leader Dogs for the Blind believes that everyone has the right to travel independently—to go here, there, everywhere they desire. But without the benefit of street signs or printed maps [admit it; you still use them] to help get them where they want to go, people who are blind often rely on others to help with directions.

The game changed when GPS became accessible to people without sight. Leader Dog jumped on the location technology bandwagon by providing pedestrian GPS devices and training to our clients. But with big price tags of \$2,040 for 1st generation technology and \$925 for 2nd, these devices were out of reach for many people and the cost limited how many we could give to our clients for free. Smart phone GPS applications weren't an option for us due to limited accessibility and service fees that could easily run \$1,000 a year.

In our relentless pursuit of putting GPS in the hands of people who are blind, we're changing the game again with the Kapten PLUS. This device is 74% smaller than previous devices, is more user friendly, has voice recognition and comes with a smaller price tag of only \$295. It's the next step in the evolution of location technology.



All in a Day's Work



Walking together in stride, Child Life Specialist Jennifer and Canine Companions Facility Dog Nilani, confidently move through the busy halls congested with rolling gurneys, diligent doctors, compassionate nurses, beeping pagers, worried parents and sick children. They're headed to meet the next patient.

A 13-year-old girl, whose life is ending, has a request. Nilani knows what her job is and gently places her loveable Labrador head on the little girl's lap.

Soon the patient sits up and, speaking for the first time that day, says, "She's pretty." In that moment, her mother, her father, her sister — the loved ones she's leaving behind — fill with gratitude and appreciation knowing that these last moments are filled with love — theirs and Nilani's.

Without knocking over an IV stand, stepping on an extension cord, or wagging her tail, Nilani follows Jennifer's commands and they leave the room together. Standing outside the doorway, Jennifer breathes deeply. Nilani looks up at her with her knowing eyes. Jennifer slowly strokes Nilani's ears, "Good girl Nilani. Let's go."

The team resumes their stride through the hallway. It's 2 p.m., time to visit the playroom. Jennifer and Nilani work at the University of California San Francisco Benioff Children's Hospital and are one of hundreds of Canine Companions Facility Dog Teams around the country providing comfort, inspiration and motivation — changing lives by shaping moments for countless numbers of people effected by disabilities.

Facility Dogs are expertly trained dogs partnered with a facilitator working in a health care, visitation or education setting. Trustworthy in professional environments, the dogs perform over 40 commands designed to motivate and inspire clients.

Dreary. That's the word Patricia All en used to describe her life during the first years of her vision loss.

Diagnosed with diabetic retinopathy in the 1970s, her vision worsened until she was forced to resign from work. Her world began to narrow. Trips out of the house ceased. She took up piano lessons to keep busy, but life in the country offered no easy access to society, and she relied wholly on family. Unhappiness drifted in as the littlest freedoms drifted away.

After moving to St. Petersburg, Patricia joined a dog training club where she heard about an upcoming open house at Southeastern Guide Dogs. She showed up on campus on a Friday and found out from a friendly staff member that the event was on Saturday! The next day she was back, and the welcoming visit encouraged her to apply.

"Joining the program was scary at first," she admitted. "I wasn't sure what to expect. But the instructors are so outgoing and helpful; they made me feel comfortable right away." Patricia immediately fell in love with her new guide dog Dave, an intelligent Goldador named after a generous sponsor. Since meeting Dave, her confidence has grown tremendously.

A Diabetic Alert Dog Fund

The Mission of Mission: D.A.D.:

To raise awareness of diabetes and funding for families in need of diabetic alert service dogs - highly trained to recognize oncoming changes in blood glucose levels of Type 1 diabetics; to pay our blessings forward; to share our struggle transparently.



Our home is like many others. We have a Mom and a Dad, three kids (a teen and 2 pre-teens), a cat and a guinea pig.

We live in the suburbs. We go to church, we go to school, we go to the grocery store. Just like you, our days are measured by moments of joy, yawns of tedious boredom and photographic events like vacations or soccer games. Added to the mix are endless loads of laundry and sometimes hours of homework. We have jobs, we have friends, we have relatives, we have bills.

Sound familiar?

Where we differ - as a family - is that nearly every day we face our own mortality. My husband, our Dad, has Type I Diabetes. And more than once, he has almost died. Every day, whether we talk about it, whether we ignore it, we are living - as a family - with a disease that could change all of our lives in the blink of an eye.

In January of 2010, we stepped out of our "home" with this disease. We never imagined the blessings this journey would bring. Trust me. NEVER.

Although this started as a desire to be transparent about living with diabetes and to secure a Diabetic Alert Dog for Trevor, we have come to believe that there is a larger purpose for Mission: D.A.D. In fact, we believe Trevor's situation, the tremendous response of those around us and continuing affirmation have resulted in a journey that is far bigger than "the Jordan's."

Mission: D.A.D., A Diabetic Alert Dog Fund has grown into a full fledge non-profit. Our purpose? To raise awareness of diabetes, diabetic alert dogs and transparent living.

How do we plan to do that? If it would be pleasing, we'd like to secure educational and testimonial opportunities that would allow us to share our experiences and raise funds so that we can provide financial assistance to families experiencing the hardship of diabetes and for whom a D.A.D. would be life-changing. We also hope to (someday) become involved in legislative measures that will protect families from unscrupulous breeders and/or trainers. How About That?

There are over 20-million diabetics in the United States today. Of those, there are approximately 4-5 million Type 1 diabetics. To date, there are a handful of reputable D.A.D. trainers. Over the long run, creating opportunities to help both families who need a Diabetic Alert Dog AND trainers who can train them just makes sense.



We are excited to see where God will direct us next on this journey. And we want to be transparent with you every step of the way. We don't exactly know what the future will hold. It is our focus, right now, to just keep "walking through open doors." We desire to be available for His purpose and for the first time in our lives, believe that Trevor's 27 years of struggle with diabetes could have been all about This Moment.

To help with developing and implementing these goals, one of the priorities was the creation of a Steering Committee. The committee is comprised of Lions leaders from around the world, and Constitutional Area is represented.

Our first goal was improving our communications flow. Just last month we launched our new Web site in English, and it will launch in languages at our International Convention.

I am convinced you will agree this is a huge advance toward meeting this goal. This new site gives you more tools and resources to promote the good work we Lions are doing. It also offers you many opportunities to contact us at anytime. Your thoughts are important and help us to move forward. Please visit www.lcif.org, if you haven't already.

Lions Quest is a program that is particularly near and dear to my heart. More than 12 million children have benefited from this life skills program. And that's why reaching even more children was another priority. We held trainings and created a How-to-Kit to help Lions' expansion efforts. Just last month Indonesia began this program. I'm happy to say it's now in six new countries, for a total of 66 countries.



At this time, there are more than 20 countries ready to start this program—the only world program focused on social and emotional education.

Another priority was activating our volunteer coordinator structure. To strengthen Lions' engagement with LCIF, new fundraising goals were set, with district and multiple district coordinators helping lead these efforts. We created several new resources for our coordinators. I enjoyed hosting several Webinars to provide updates to our coordinators and to encourage them to work closely and effectively with our DG Teams.

Most exciting is the fact that our efforts are paying off. Donations for this year are up by US\$10.5 million, or 33 percent! Thank you for your continued support and dedication to helping LCIF continue to be the #1 NGO worldwide.

We have set a solid platform with international structures to build upon next year! I can assure you I will remain committed to our Foundation for years to come, and I hope I can count on you to do the same.

Rebuilding Lives Following Disasters

We Lions have a special dedication to providing relief and rebuilding lives in our communities for as long as it takes. In Haiti, we are rebuilding schools and a nurses training program, as well as houses. Most recently, we committed US\$410,000 to help the Southern United States. And we continue to receive donations for Japan, with more than US\$16 million being mobilized. Relief efforts elsewhere also remain ongoing. A 2010 study just released by the World Health Organization, shows that blindness and visual impairment has been reduced globally by nine percent, or 26 million people, since 2004. Through SightFirst, Lions have had a significant role in this achievement, helping to end preventable blindness and restoring sight to tens of millions of people.
