



District Governor Ruth Payton

Dear Lions of 18-D:

I think that all of you know by now that DG Ruth was in a serious car accident on Wednesday, 16 January, as she drove back to Toccoa from Suwanee. Ruth broke both of her legs, collar bone, and suffered several cuts. No one else was involved in the accident. Since then Ruth has had surgery and is in the Oak Heritage Rehab Center in Baldwin. If you are in the area, please visit her or send her a card. She'll appreciate both.

What I'd like to talk to you about is why DG Ruth was in Suwanee. I think that you will find Lion Ruth's dedication to the Lions of 18-D inspirational. Currently, District 18-D is over 100 members below Lion Club International's (LCI) required 1250 Lions for a district. To change this DG Ruth decided to take advantage of an LCI program to start new clubs. This is what DG Ruth had been seeking volunteers for in the past couple of months: her goal is to increase the membership in 18-D by chartering new Lions' clubs.

On Monday, 14 January, in the Norcross Lions' Club House, PID John Pearce, PDGs Joe Hirsch, Beverly Shirley, Ed Hashbarger, and John Rudert, Region III Chair,

Grace Clower, DG Ruth Payton, and I spent the morning being taught how to "cold call recruit" individuals to become Lions by two New Club Development Consultants, PDG Carl Harrell and District 43-E Governor Joie Mills. After lunch we watched Lions Carl and Joie walk into businesses, ask to speak to the owner or manager, and then attempt to convince this person to pay \$30 and become a charter member of the Suwanee Lions Club. As businesses began to close up, we returned to the Norcross Lions' Club House for another training session on holding a new club's 1st, 2nd, charter night meeting, etc. We finally got back to our hotel rooms around 9:00 p.m.

The next morning we headed out again, but this time we began to do some of the "cold calling." Personally, this was the hardest job I have ever done in my nineteen years of Lionism. I did not ask DG Ruth whether she felt the same way. However, as many of you know, DG Ruth has diabetes, and we know that she had difficulty getting her sugar under control on Monday night. We also know that she did not have a "good day" on Tuesday, but she was with us all day long going from business to business, knocking on doors, and "cold calling." It was an extremely tiring day! We did not see DG Ruth the next morning as we departed the hotel for a morning of "cold calling" before Lions Carl and Joie returned to their homes. The next time we heard about DG Ruth, she had been in an automobile accident and was in Grady Hospital.

So what is the status of the Suwanee Lions Club? (I can assure you that this is a question DG Ruth asked when I visited her in Grady Hospital!) When DG Ruth left the hotel she knew that we had recruited eight (8) charter members. As she was driving back to Toccoa, we recruited six (6) more members. Since then two teams have gone back to Suwanee to "cold call." We have added two (2) more members and we have several prospects. We only need four (4) more members to charter the club. I think that DG Ruth's vision of chartering a new Lions club in District 18-D is definitely going to happen.

RE: Changes to due dates for Monthly Membership Reporting by Clubs

Beginning in April 2008, there will be change in the due dates for clubs to submit their monthly membership reports to LCI. As explained in the linked Frequently Asked Question (FAQ) document, the changes will (1) enable LCI to produce more timely monthly membership reports, and (2) provide more accuracy and consistency between data on club roster reports and LCI billing statements and financial recap reports.

Don't Lose Your Tax Exempt Status

If you are a small tax-exempt organization that normally has annual gross receipts of \$25,000 or less and does not have to file Form 990 or 990-EZ, you must file the e-Postcard (also known as 990-N). It's due by the 15th day of the fifth month after the close of your tax year. Lions clubs operate on a fiscal year, July 1 – June 30, and the e-Postcard will be due by November 15, 2008. Any Lions club that fails to meet its annual reporting requirement for three consecutive years automatically loses its taxexempt status under the new law. MACULAR DEGENERATION occurs with degeneration of the macula, the part of the retina responsible for sharp, central vision needed to read or operate an automobile. About 1.8 million Americans 40 years and older have advanced macular degeneration, and another 7.3 million people with macular degeneration are at risk of vision loss.

DIABETIC RETINOPATHY is caused by changes in the blood vessels of the retina that lead to changes in vision and vision loss. Individuals with diabetes are at high risk of the disease.

GLAUCOMA occurs when the pressure in the eye increases to dangerous levels and damages the optic nerve, resulting in decreased peripheral vision and, eventually, blindness. Glaucoma is the second leading cause of blindness in the world, according to the World Health Organization.

A **US\$2** million **SightFirst** grant was awarded in the U.S. for further development of a pilot program to address uncorrected refractive error by providing new, customized eyeglasses to underprivileged men, women and children.



"Membership Retention – Routine Maintenance, Not Rocket Science"

Be consistent and sincere in your expectations. Volunteers (as well as anyone) will perform better when they know what to expect, what deadlines they have to meet, who their supervisor is, etc.

Be receptive to new ideas and ways of doing things. You don't have to implement them, but you should at least be willing to listen to them.

Take every opportunity to applaud competence, punctuality, and all the other things you value. Saying "Thank you", "Good job", or "I really appreciate you coming out here/doing X on such short notice" costs nothing, but it goes a long way. At least once a year, go out of your way to recognize volunteers by holding a Volunteer Appreciation Luncheon or a similar activity.

As volunteers prove their capabilities, give them added responsibility. Make, however, sure not to overwhelm them, or task them with more than can be reasonably expected to fulfill in the amount of time they have.

As much as possible, make work fun. Vary tasks, have background music, let volunteers work together, serve cookies during break. Remember that volunteers are doing this on *their own time*, and be considerate to that.

Use discretion. Do not criticize a volunteer in front of his or her peers. However, don't shy away from constructive criticism. Volunteers deserve as much courtesy and considerations as regular employees do.

It sounds easy – and it is easy. It is everyone's responsibility to contribute to the companionship and the involvement.

Clermont/North Hall Lions Club January 2008 Activities






WINS LIONS CLUB POSTER CONTEST




