Eye Care and Education Programs

EyeCare America offers multiple eye care programs for which individuals may qualify for services. The programs include Seniors, Glaucoma, Diabetes, Age-Related Macular Degeneration, and Children's EyeCare. Callers will automatically be screened to determine the program that provides the most appropriate eye care services to meet their needs.

Pledges of US\$5,000+ may be fulfilled over five years.
Pledges of US\$4,999 and below may be fulfilled over three years.

MACULAR DEGENERATION occurs with degeneration of the macula, the part of the retina responsible for sharp, central vision needed to read or operate an automobile. About 1.8 million Americans 40 years and older have advanced macular degeneration, and another 7.3 million people with macular degeneration are at risk of vision loss.

DIABETIC RETINOPATHY is caused by changes in the blood vessels of the retina that lead to changes in vision and vision loss. Individuals with diabetes are at high risk of the disease.

GLAUCOMA occurs when the pressure in the eye increases to dangerous levels and damages the optic nerve, resulting in decreased peripheral vision and, eventually, blindness. Glaucoma is the second leading cause of blindness in the world, according to the World Health Organization.

A **US\$2** million **SightFirst** grant was awarded in the U.S. for further development of a pilot program to address uncorrected refractive error by providing new, customized eyeglasses to underprivileged men, women and children.

LEADERSHIP

Leadership is defined as guidance and management with the ability to influence others to see a vision of what should and could be accomplished. A leaders has a responsibility to those he or she leads—the responsibility to do the best he or she can for those people.

Each elected officer of a Lions Club is a leader. The problem is that many elected officers are not trained to be leaders and cannot communicate, cannot guide, and therefore, cannot influence others to see what should be accomplished. The training or education of leaders must start with the basics. Each and every officer of a Lions Club must know the basics of Lionism and of the position to which he or she was elected.

This training starts with the officer participating in the leadership training offered by the district. Every year, District 18-B and the other districts in Georgia offer New Officer Training. Any officer that accepts a position in a club has the responsibility to attend this training. It does not matter if you are elected as the president, vice president, secretary, treasurer, director, or membership committee member. There is a training session for each and it is the responsibility of the Lion and the responsibility of the club to see that that Lion attends training as a prerequisite to being installed in that position.

The educational process does not stop there. Each officer has the responsibility to attend all cabinet meetings and all zone meetings. These should be the most important item on the calendar other than family. From the cabinet and zone meetings, the officers receive information on events in the district, the multiple district, and Lions Clubs International. Officers receive updates on reports, organizations they support such as the Georgia Lions Camp for the Blind and the Georgia Lions Lighthouse Foundation, and changes that affect their clubs and members.

The district and the multiple district offer each officer and any interested Lion other opportunities to grow as a leader. In Georgia, all Lions have been offered the

opportunity to attend the Dynamic Club workshops. These are in their second year of aiding officers and clubs to become dynamic and thriving. In Georgia, we have had the Transfusion-Transition-Transformation program offered to Lions. Seminars have been and will continue to be offered at the MD Conventions as well as district conventions. All club officers have an responsibility to attend their district convention as well as the MD Convention.

Don't forget leadership training opportunities such as the USA/Canada Leadership Forum and Lions Southeast Leadership Seminar, both held every year.

No Lions club can afford to have an officer that has not and will not accept ALL responsibilities. By all I mean attend training, attend cabinet meetings, attend zone meetings, and attend leadership training offered by the district, the multiple district, and LCI. This responsibility should be made clear to any Lion who wishes to become a leader in his or her club because a club that has untrained leadership to include leadership that never attends cabinet meetings, zone meetings, or conventions is doomed to mediocrity and soon becomes a statistic of a dropped Lions club.

This time of year, clubs are preparing their slate of officers for 2008-2009. Give each Lion in your club the job descriptions of the elected positions to include the responsibility of becoming a trained leader. All clubs should adopt a simple rule that if the Lion will not fulfill the responsibility of the position, than that Lion should not be elected an officer. The members of a club also have a responsibility, of insisting that their club be lead by trained Lion leaders.

Dear Club Officers:

Lions don't just change – Lions change for the better! When it comes to increasing our ability to serve the people of our communities and the world, nothing should be beyond the scope of our imagination.

Fortunately, it doesn't usually take outlandish ideas to yield great improvements. Lions Clubs around the world have found that one of the biggest boosts in their ability to serve comes from the energizing effect of women members. All around the world, women have rallied around the "We Serve" motto and helped their clubs live up to the ideal it represents.

On a recent visit to India it was my pleasure to meet members of the newly chartered Chenai Aristocrats Lions Club. The 20 forward-thinking Lions who formed this club recognize that the seven women in their ranks have brought a "new dimension" to their service initiatives. They report that their efforts are now focused on some of the most pressing needs of their community – children's issues and improved health for all.

In just three months the club has undertaken major projects including building a water-treatment facility to provide clean water to schools, the creation of a yoga center for the entire community and the "adoption" of a neighborhood in need of better sanitation, hygiene and education. Women are in the forefront of these projects says Club Secretary C.G Balaji. He notes that as a side benefit, the club's meetings have become more interesting and the menu has even improved – because the women insisted upon it!

He says that the women's "participation is a welcome sign and will change the perception of Lionism, among both Lions and the general public. I am happy to report that Lions' excellent response to the Challenge to Change is reaping rewards throughout the entire International Association of Lions Clubs. As you may know, the December worldwide membership report has historically shown a decrease from the July 1 total. Thanks especially to clubs' efforts to diversify their membership; this year the totals will be almost equal. That means 5,000 fewer Lions lost to the association! Congratulations to all clubs that have embraced the Challenge to Change and received the benefit of renewed energy and commitment.

In response to the changing needs of Lions, there will be changes made at International Headquarters as well. The Public Relations Division has embarked on a major redesign of the Lions Clubs International Web site and improvements to The LION magazine. In fact, you may be one of the Lions randomly selected to receive a survey questionnaire about the Web site. If you or a member of your club receives one, please help the hardworking staff at International Headquarters by returning it as soon as possible. They need your input! Redesigning the Web site is such a large and complex job that it may take the better part of a year to complete, but changes in The LION magazine will be phased-in over the coming year.

To keep up with clubs' fast-paced recruiting of new members, the club records staff is also making changes. This too, will require the cooperation of Lions, especially club secretaries. WMMR filings will now be due by the last day of each month from clubs that file electronically and by the 20th of each month from clubs that file by mail. This will allow the staff to eliminate the current one month lag between filing and the production of reports and provide current data to all parts of the association. "Membership Retention – Routine Maintenance, Not Rocket Science"

Be consistent and sincere in your expectations. Volunteers (as well as anyone) will perform better when they know what to expect, what deadlines they have to meet, who their supervisor is, etc.

Be receptive to new ideas and ways of doing things. You don't have to implement them, but you should at least be willing to listen to them.

Take every opportunity to applaud competence, punctuality, and all the other things you value. Saying "Thank you", "Good job", or "I really appreciate you coming out here/doing X on such short notice" costs nothing, but it goes a long way. At least once a year, go out of your way to recognize volunteers by holding a Volunteer Appreciation Luncheon or a similar activity.

As volunteers prove their capabilities, give them added responsibility. Make, however, sure not to overwhelm them, or task them with more than can be reasonably expected to fulfill in the amount of time they have.

As much as possible, make work fun. Vary tasks, have background music, let volunteers work together, serve cookies during break. Remember that volunteers are doing this on *their own time*, and be considerate to that.

Use discretion. Do not criticize a volunteer in front of his or her peers. However, don't shy away from constructive criticism. Volunteers deserve as much courtesy and considerations as regular employees do.

It sounds easy – and it is easy. It is everyone's responsibility to contribute to the companionship and the involvement.





Time to Prepare for the New Year

Happy New Year! For some Lions who may have been taking it slow, it is already 2008! Actually January 2008—only 3 months from club election of officers for the 2008-2009 Lions year!

Your club's PU-101 reporting the 2008-2009 Officers is due not later than April 15 to the District Governor and to Lions Clubs International. Club should plan to have their elections in late March or early April so that the secretary has sufficient time to submit the report. Backing up, this means that the president should be appointing the nomination committee in January, and the nominating committee then prepares the slate of active Lions in good standing for each elected office. The secretary then notifies each club member of the slate of nominees and the election date at least fourteen days before the election meeting. That means that the nominating committee must have the slate ready by the middle of March. Whew! All this comes from the LCI Guidelines to Club Elections. Who should be elected? Of course, the President. Usually this nominee is the current 1st Vice President.

Clubs should be electing a 1st Vice President and a 2nd Vice President. If your Constitution and Bylaws calls for a 3rd Vice President, add that position to the slate. The positions of vice presidents are working positions, training the future president of the club as each vice president moves up each year. The Secretary and the Treasurer are elected officers. Consider the duties of each position in selecting the Lions. The Lion Tamer is an elected position. A club may, in its Constitution and Bylaws, also add the position of Tail Twister to the slate. Other elected officers are the Directors. Each club should have two to three. Each year, the club elects one Director. The 1st year Director moves off the Board and the other(s) move up a year.

A very important committee in each and every Lions Club is that of Membership. The committee is composed of three Lions—each agreeing to serve 3 years. Each year, the club should elect one Lion to the committee. This Lion moves into the 3 year position as the freshman member. The remaining two Lions move up to the Junior/Vice Chair position and the Senior/Chair position. Each Lion on the committee has separate responsibilities. These are spelled out in the LCI "Three Person Membership Committee" brochure. So, Happy New Year! Time to start the procedure to elect nine dynamic Lions to lead your club in 2008-2009!

Disaster Preparedness

Plan for yourself and your dog

How can I prepare to care for my dog during a disaster?

We've learned many lessons in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina one of the most important is the need to be prepared for both ourselves and our pets. The best source of information on this subject is the Homeland Security website at www.ready.gov. Following their guidelines assures that your plans coordinate with federal government emergency plans.

To increase the likelihood that you will be reunited with your dog in case of mass evacuation, you should microchip your dog and register the microchip. All Leader Dogs are microchipped during training.

You may want to invest in a dog back pack to allow your dog (if physically capable) to carry his own emergency kit. Among other items, the kit should include: a photo of you and your dog together to establish ownership, a familiar toy or blanket to help reduce your dog's stress, current rabies and vaccine records, a first aid kit, 3-day water supply (1 oz/pound/ day) and a minimum 3-day food supply.

If you are a Leader Dog user, make sure you have your Leader Dog i.d. card and harness with you at all times. By law, service animals must be allowed in shelters; make sure you are equipped to show shelter staff that your dog is a Leader Dog. Also, it is important that your evacuation plan include a sighted individual due to the lack of verbal information that may be provided during an emergency situation. Planning and preparing for yourself and your pet now can be life-saving in the future.



Microchips, which must be registered, are injected under your dog's skin with a specially designed syringe.

Pre-Diabetes

Before people develop type 2 diabetes, they almost always have "pre-diabetes" -- blood glucose levels that are higher than normal but not yet high enough to be diagnosed as diabetes. There are 54 million people in the United States who have pre-diabetes. Recent research has shown that some long-term damage to the body, especially the heart and circulatory system, may already be occurring during pre-diabetes.

Research has also shown that if you take action to manage your blood glucose when you have prediabetes, you can delay or prevent type 2 diabetes from ever developing. Together with the National Institute of Diabetes and Digestive and Kidney Diseases, the American Diabetes Association published a Position Statement on "The Prevention or Delay of Type 2 Diabetes" to help guide health care professionals in treating their patients with pre-diabetes.

There is a lot you can do yourself to know your risks for pre-diabetes and to take action to prevent diabetes if you have, or are at risk for, pre-diabetes. The American Diabetes Association has a wealth of resources for people with diabetes. People with pre-diabetes can expect to benefit from much of the same advice for good nutrition and physical activity. The links on this page are cornerstones of successful management of pre-diabetes.

How to Tell if You Have Pre-Diabetes

Pre-diabetes is a serious medical condition that can be treated. any people with disabilities live independent,

fulfilling lives. Then there are those whose lives are, in a word, "incredible." Meet Muffy Davis. A 2006 CCI Southwest Regional Training Center Graduate. Muffy inspires even the most cynical with: "A disability doesn't have to be a negative. It's just different."

Muffy Davis began ski-racing at age three. She soon realized she had special talents and wanted some day to ski race in the Olympics. Then, at age 16, Muffy's life changed. While skiing she veered off-course and slammed into two trees at 55 mph, crushing her back and almost killing her. In the ensuing months she faced and overcame numerous physical and psychological challenges.



But that little voice inside kept repeating her goals and before long Muffy was involved in disabled ski-racing winning many awards, including four gold medals. This tenacious lady also participates in water-skiing, wheelchair road racing, weight training, fly fishing — even horseback riding, scuba diving, kayaking and adaptive mountain biking!

In August 2006, Muffy graduated from CCI with Service Dog Leibe, a two year- old black Labrador. Muffy feels she has more adventures and explores more because of Leibe. One of her favorite pastimes is to picnic on the warm but slightly damp grass in the sprinkler park. But she couldn't get back into her wheelchair alone. Now, that has changed as the two play together, with Leibe bracing Muffy so she can get back into her seat.

"With Leibe I'm able to do more and go farther," she says. "Before Leibe, the social stigma of being disabled always made me feel that people thought, 'Oh, poor girl in that wheelchair." Now, those alienating barriers are dissolved as instead she hears, "Wow! What a great dog!"

In her own inimitable way, Muffy exemplifies the meaning of life for people everywhere, not only those living with disabilities. "Everyone has struggles," says Muffy. "No one gets through life without something. You've got to pick yourself up and get on with it. Live for today, hope for tomorrow."

- * Never pass up the opportunity for a hug, a handshake, or pat on the back.
- * Take time to listen and understand the little things. Time is often more important than substance.
- * Always greet someone with enthusiasm.
- * Always be loyal, even to a child, if you expect them to be loyal to you.
- * Take a nap if you feel tired in the afternoon.
- * Love one another.
