Dear Lions of 18-D,

We managed to not be seriously hit by last weekend's tornado, but it is obvious that the Georgia tornado season has arrived. Therefore, if your club has not taken time to do a bit of preparation, it is time to do it. Your starting point should be to open up our district web site, which is maintained by PDG Ed Hashbarger: <a href="http://www.edmclion.com/">http://www.edmclion.com/</a> and then select "GA LIONS ALERT." You will find some very useful information posted, including mention of the fact that should there be tornado damage or some other type of community wide damage, the president of your club or your club's ALERT chair needs to communicate the estimated damage to me. If the damage meets what LCI refers to as level two damage, DG Ruth Payton will be able to request up to \$10,000 in funds from LCI. The latter funds will end up being distributed in your community and your club will be involved in the distribution decisions. I hope that we do not have any reason to be directly involved in the ALERT program in District 18-D, but the Americus, Georgia, Lions did not want what they experienced last year. You may recall that we sent emergency items to Americus and, yes, they did qualify for a \$10,000 LCI grant.



## **Dear Club Officers:**

Unless you are an accountant or a mathematician, you may think that numbers are boring. Most people think they have better things to do than listen to someone quote a string of statistics – and if you are a Lion, you do!

But I have some numbers to share with you that I think are very exciting and I think you will, too. For the first time in many years, all measures of recruitment and retention show a positive trend. Through January 2008, LCI shows a net membership increase of 4,283, which is the best first six-month period we have experienced in many years. Most importantly, all constitutional areas and most districts are showing great improvements over historic trend.

Due to the many community service projects that are conducted in the first half of the calendar each year, membership traditionally grows by the thousands between January and June, it will be truly exciting to watch the membership total as it is documented by our new, timely reporting system. With your help, I believe that we will be able to have an increase in overall membership. What an outstanding legacy that would be for our leadership year!

But achieving this goal will not be easy and it requires that you take action immediately. The next two months have traditionally been a time for club recruitment drives. I urge you to take the next two months as an opportunity to intensify your efforts to bring high quality new members into your club. By now I am sure that you realize that the projects you have identified and planned will benefit greatly from additional hands to share the work. A successful effort this month will enable your club to take part in <a href="Worldwide Induction Day in April">Worldwide Induction Day in April</a>,

which in turn will be an excellent way to create even more interest within your community.

As you work to strengthen your membership, please remember that we have successes on which to build.

- The number of <u>women</u> and <u>family members</u> has reached an all-time high of 240,000, due largely to the innovative family membership program. These groups should remain a primary focus of your recruitment efforts.
- I am proud to say that more districts will be receiving awards for establishing new clubs than any time in recent memory. Through January, the number of new clubs worldwide stood at 570. Keeping in mind that the majority of new clubs are reported in between January and June, I am confident that we can establish more than 1,250 by the end of our leadership year. Nurturing the potential for new Lions Clubs, Club Branches, Campus Club, and even Leo Clubs is an important part of contributing to our worldwide extension. The excitement surrounding the formation of new clubs can also help to energize and expand your own club.

These are wonderful numbers and clear evidence that our membership initiatives are achieving results. But even more important is what the numbers represent. They show that Lions and Lions Clubs are brimming with new confidence, eager to accomplish our mission and proud to show the world that, "We Serve."

I am grateful for the part your leadership has played in establishing this new confidence.

"Membership Retention – Routine Maintenance, Not Rocket Science"

Cut the Red Tape. A certain amount of policy and process are necessary to making a club run smoothly. However, their effect is precisely the opposite when they are treated not as means but as ends in themselves. The result is the waste of time and energy that comes to the minds of Boomers when they hear the word "bureaucracy." Here are some ways to avoid a preoccupation with process:

Keep your eyes on the prize. Be driven by the club's goals, using these as the touchstone by which every activity is measured. Devote your energies to activities that have a direct and visible impact on your club's mission. Focus your priorities on what you do and why – not how.

Run a "flat" organization. Minimize hierarchy. Give individuals and committees a large measure of independence. Insist that their work be designed to serve the community, not the club itself.

Run "tight" meetings. Devote minimal time to the past (rituals, old business) and maximum time to the future (new business, volunteer activities, measurable results).

Talk less and do more. Keep the emphasis on action. To that end, reduce meeting time by publishing important information in your newsletter or on your website.


**White Cane Day** April 12 is the tentative date. The Martin club usually does it with us but they have a conflict with that date. We may have to change the date.

# Time to Prepare for the New Year

Happy New Year! For some Lions who may have been taking it slow, it is already 2008! Actually January 2008—only 3 months from club election of officers for the 2008-2009 Lions year!

Your club's PU-101 reporting the 2008-2009 Officers is due not later than April 15 to the District Governor and to Lions Clubs International. Club should plan to have their elections in late March or early April so that the secretary has sufficient time to submit the report. Backing up, this means that the president should be appointing the nomination committee in January, and the nominating committee then prepares the slate of active Lions in good standing for each elected office. The secretary then notifies each club member of the slate of nominees and the election date at least fourteen days before the election meeting. That means that the nominating committee must have the slate ready by the middle of March. Whew! All this comes from the LCI Guidelines to Club Elections. Who should be elected? Of course, the President. Usually this nominee is the current 1st Vice President.

### That time of year – WHITE CANE is APRIL

### Here are some ideas:

- \* Place plastic jars on check-out counters of convenience and fast food stores. This could be done 4-6 weeks in April and can be handled by 1 or 2 Lions. Special jar lids and decals are available through White Cane Days, Inc.
- \* Write letters to businesses of your community soliciting donations. Then follow up with a personal visit.
- \* Hold a pancake breakfast, chili supper, chicken BBQ, or other project designated for White Cane.
- \* Get publicity through having a community leader (mayor, administrator, or commissioner) sign a proclamation declaring your club's White Cane Drive and publishing it in your local newspaper.
- \* If you have a Wal-Mart, K-Mart, Kroger's, or some other large retail outlet, approach management about a matching grant for White Cane.
- \* Utilize your White Cane efforts to educate your community about the Georgia Lions Lighthouse in general, and your club in particular. You may be able to recruit a few new members.

# Future Leader Dog Visits Toccoa Lions

Ann and Ron Bowman traveled to Toccoa from Sharpsburg, GA to share their experiences with The Leader Dogs for the Blind School. The Bowman's traveled to Rochester, Michigan four months ago to pick up Maggie when she was seven weeks old.

Maggie was breed at the school and weaned from her mother at six weeks old. She then spent a week in evaluations at the school with the veterinarians and staff to see if she would be a good candidate to be a leader dog.

Maggie will live with the Bowman's for a year at their home before they take her back to the school in Michigan. The Bowman's main objective is to teach Maggie how to socialize with people. Maggie will not be given table scraps, or soft plush toys, or balls, or Frisbees to play with. She will not be allowed to jump on people. She will be coached by the Bowman's with the same command language used at the leader dog school. Maggie wears a special vest to let people know she is in leader dog in training.

When Maggie returns to The Leader Dog for the Blind School she will spend up to three months training with the staff. She will be tested on the streets of Rochester in heavy vehicular traffic. Then if she passes all her tests she will be matched with a blind person or student.

Maggie and her person will train at the school together for twenty-six days. Then they will have a graduation ceremony at the school. The new graduates will go about a live together. The Bowman's have attended all the graduations of their puppies and meet the new person in their dog's life. The Bowman's have kept in touch with everybody who has one of their babies.

The Bowman's have raised eight dogs prior to Maggie for the school. Six of their dogs have become leader dogs. Two dogs had career changes, one is working in drug enforcement and one is a pet to a family. The Bowman's have dogs in Europe, Mexico and Michigan.

The school has over 300 dogs in training at all times. Most are Labradors, and then Golden Retrievers and German Shepherds. A blind person can obtain a leader dog from the school nearly free. The only expense is international travel and incidents while in the dormitory. The school was started by three Lions and is largely supported today by Lions Clubs throughout the nation. ### Oats and Other Foods to Boost Your Health

Knowing what to eat can be confusing. Everywhere you turn, there is news about what is or isn't good for you. Some basic principles have weathered the fad diets, and have stood the test of time. Here are a few tips on making healthful food choices for you and your entire family.

- Eat lots of vegetables and fruits. Try picking from the rainbow of colors available to maximize variety. Eat non-starchy vegetables such as spinach, carrots, broccoli or green beans with meals.
- Choose whole grain foods over processed grain products. Try brown rice with your stir fry or whole wheat spaghetti with your favorite pasta sauce.
- Include dried beans (like kidney or pinto beans) and lentils into your meals.
- Include fish in your meals 2-3 times a week.
- Choose lean meats like cuts of beef and pork that end in "loin" such as pork loin and sirloin. Remove the skin from chicken and turkey.
- Choose non-fat dairy such as skim milk, non-fat yogurt and non-fat cheese.
- Choose water and calorie-free "diet" drinks instead of regular soda, fruit punch, sweet tea and other sugar-sweetened drinks.
- Choose liquid oils for cooking instead of solid fats that can be high in saturated and *trans* fats.

  Remember that fats are high in calories. If you're trying to lose weight, watch your portion sizes of added fats.
- Cut back on high calorie snack foods and desserts like chips, cookies, cakes, and full-fat ice cream.
- Eating too much of even healthful foods can lead to weight gain. Watch your portion sizes.

Now the Most Important Nutritional Discovery in 25 Years = This seasoning, which you probably have in your spice cabinet right now, has a hidden power to cut blood sugar that has only been revealed in recent research.

**CINNAMON** – As little as a half-teaspoon a day – to get the cinnamon working for you try "sticking" a stick of cinnamon in the water you boil for tea. That is all you need. To get more details about what else is so amazing about cinnamon – do some research.

Other foods of interest for better health are **OATS**, **GARLIC**, **FLAXSEED** and **FISH** OILS. Do more research about these items also. It is your health you and others should worry about.

# Q. What is Canine Companions for Independence?

Canine Companions for Independence is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations that enhances the lives of people with disabilities by providing highly trained assistance dogs and ongoing support to ensure quality partnerships.

# Q. What types of assistance dogs does Canine Companions for Independence train?

<u>Service Teams</u> - People with physical and/or developmental disabilities who work with a Canine Companion to enhance their ability to perform practical tasks such as retrieving dropped items, opening doors, and turning on and off light switches.

<u>Hearing Teams</u> - Adults who are hard of hearing or deaf who use a Canine Companion to alert them to everyday sounds such as telephones, alarm clocks, and smoke alarms.

Skilled Companion Teams - Adults and children with disabilities who benefit from the social, interactive, and functional commands of a Canine Companion. This type of placement increases the communication, range of motion, and interactive skills of some recipients.

<u>Facility Teams</u> - Adults who work as professional care givers, educators, or in other settings that can utilize a Canine Companion to improve the mental, physical, or emotional health of individuals, young and old, in those settings.

# Q. What does it cost to receive a Canine Companion?

Canine Companions for Independence graduates pay only a \$100 Team Training registration fee that is reimbursed in supplies; there is no charge for the dog. Individual participants in our program are not responsible for any of the substantial costs involved in the lengthy process of breeding, raising, and training each Canine Companion.

# Q. How is Canine Companions for Independence funded?

Canine Companions for Independence is funded by private <u>contributions</u>; gifts from businesses, civic groups, and service clubs; grants from corporations and foundations; and ongoing fundraising activities such as special events and mailings. Canine Companions for Independence receives no government funding.

### Q. Where does the money go?

Canine Companions for Independence is proud that 83.5 cents of every dollar spent goes directly to program services. These services include breeding and puppy raising, canine and participant training, graduate follow up, public information and veterinary care. There is no charge to individuals or families for these services.

# Q. Who is eligible to apply for a Canine Companion?

People with physical or developmental disabilities who can demonstrate that a Canine Companion will enhance their independence or their quality of life are qualified to apply. Also eligible are professionals working for organizations that provide physical or mental health care to clients who will benefit from interaction with a facility dog.

### Q. What is the application procedure?

Contact the <u>regional center</u> nearest you and ask for an application information packet. This packet includes an overview of Canine Companions for Independence's team programs and an Application Request Form that you need to complete to be considered for an assistance dog. The applicant coordinator in your region will review your completed request and assist you throughout the application process.

Through Lions Quest, Lions can teach youth how to avoid drugs and make responsible decisions. A letter announcing the partnership was sent to the 500 other organizations in the coalition encouraging these organizations and communities to work with their local Lions club on drugfree programs. LCIF also had a booth at CADCA's annual convention this month, the largest training conference in the U.S. for community coalition activists and substance abuse professionals.

## **Milestone in Trachoma Treatments**

LCIF reached a major milestone in trachoma treatments January 23 when LCIF Chairperson Jimmy Ross distributed the 10 millionth dose of azithromycin (Zithromax®) to 16-year-old Messeleche Tilahun. The antibiotic, donated by Pfizer Inc, is a main strategy in the fight against the blinding disease in poor, rural areas. Messeleche lives in the Awi Zone in Ethiopia, the most trachoma-endemic part of the country, where an estimated 18 million are at risk. Representatives from The Carter Center, Lions clubs of Ethiopia, Pfizer, the national trachoma program, government of Ethiopia, and other partner organizations joined the celebration and are a part of the coalition working toward elimination of trachoma in the region by 2012. Lions in Ethiopia have been integral to achieving remarkable results in the country. The 10 millionth dose comes after just 18 months of full scale intervention and points toward meeting the elimination target date. Through SightFirst, LCIF has awarded numerous grants for trachoma control, outreach and training projects in Ethiopia and elsewhere in Africa.

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
