LCIF has already awarded four emergency grants, each for US\$10,000, to districts T-1, T-2, T-3 and T-4 in Chile. Three tent cities, housing 3,000 people total, have been established in the Port-au-Prince neighborhoods of Delmas, Blanchard and Carrefour-Feuille and an additional 240 tents are being sent to the region. increasingly important as the rainy season approaches. The need will be great for many more years to come, and LCIF's long-term efforts ensure that communities, lives and families will be rebuilt.

E-clubhouse enables your club to establish a sophisticated Web presence at no cost and with very little effort.

Technology

Even older people like me, or shall I say 'mature' people, can take advantage of new technologies to communicate. In January, I participated in several online webinars - seminars done over the internet - with more than 300 DG Team members in North America, Japan, and South Asia and Africa.

In the course of three hours, over three sessions, I was able to travel across many time zones, from California to Tokyo and back, to interact with our DG Teams without even leaving my office.

I'm now hearing about Lions clubs and districts all over the world that are using webinars, and even online video conferencing, to get more work done and to connect with more Lions. And even LCIF, our foundation, has made more use of technology by raising \$140,000 online for Haiti in a few days and in posting daily updates on our relief work in Haiti.

Family & Women Membership

First, our noteworthy membership results are being fueled by more clubs inviting more qualified women and family members. Women now account for 22% of our membership, surging to over 290,000. And it's happening in every part of the world. For example, I was in Japan last week - where historically women's membership lagged other areas - and was pleased to learn that four multiple districts there are up in membership substantially, and 90% of that is due to women and family members joining our ranks.

And with regard to family membership, we know that in many parts of the world more and more people want to volunteer and serve alongside their family members. It might not be a viable option for every club, but certainly every district should have room for family-based clubs — clubs that might need to meet at different times and pursue different types of service projects that can involve the whole family. It appears that many clubs are responding to this opportunity, since we now have more than 164,701 members, or 12.5% overall, as part of a family unit. <u>Read</u> more about how family membership works, and its benefits.

Leo Clubs

We've also worked to Move to Grow our Leo clubs, rebranding all the Leo club materials and creating the LeoZone section on our web site. The new materials are certainly more appealing, but more importantly, we are now speaking to young people in their language and in ways they prefer to communicate - especially through the internet. For example, our new Leo Facebook page boasts 1800 members. It's a special place where Leos can come together online, share ideas and connect with Leos in other countries. Leos now also have their own online membership database - the LeoMMR - so we can all communicate better with each other. E-mail Leommr@lionsclubs.org if your district or club has Leo clubs that are not online or for more information on Leo efforts.

"We need you"

We will need our children to become the members of the future but, in fact, we need your family members right now. "We need you" is the message that must be conveyed to current and prospective members. We need members to invite their partners and spouses to become Lions Club members and we need these new members to energize our clubs and open-up new avenues of service. The best place to look for qualified members may also be the closest -right in our own homes.

There are many strategies that can help existing clubs grow, such as:

- Inviting more spouses and women through the We Need You campaign.
- Organizing recruiting campaigns using Lions Clubs International's "Best Practices."
- Forming club branches
- Identifying clubs

We know there are Lions ready to respond. All we need do is ask.





RECOGNITION HELPS BRING MEMBER RETENTION

I recently received a copy of LCI's <u>Membership Initiatives</u> (7/2009). The first LCI Retention focus was on Club Retention Resources, all of which are available on the LCI web site. Among the materials listed was LCI's guidance for clubs to hold New <u>Member Induction Ceremonies</u> and <u>Orientation programs</u>, which I have stressed the retention importance of previously. In addition, the <u>Club Retention Chairperson Manual</u> (PRC 7) was listed. Given the fact that club elections are here for next year, this manual should be given to your new Retention Chair after s/he is elected to your club's three chair Membership Committee.

<u>How Are Your Ratings?</u> This section singles out one of my DG goals from last year: clubs should allow Lions to evaluate their clubs. Indeed, club evaluations also popped up in the <u>President's Retention Campaign Resource</u> section: "For the long-term vitality of a club, Lions must also focus on retaining members. Statistics show that 50% of new members drop out of Lions within the first three years." (Page 1 of 1, Emphasis added) The latter statistic came from an LCI survey of departing Lions. "Why do members leave clubs? Research indicates members leave for the following reasons: 1. Lengthy/boring meetings, 2. Club politics/cliques, 3. Lack of involvement, and 4. Lack of cooperation and not working together." (Page 1 of 1) How will you know what should be changed in your clubs if you don't ask your members to evaluate what you are doing? This information helps to retain Lions.

What I am going to do now is briefly expand the retention importance of two more of the club retention action items I have singled out after finding them discussed in volunteer organization research articles. With the end of our Lions' year approaching, I know that it is the time that clubs will begin recognizing some of their members. That is, Lions clubs typically give one of their members a "Lion of the Year" award, someone may receive a "Melvin Jones Fellow" award, etc. These awards are great! However, what recognition are you going to give the rest of your members? The significance of the latter recognition, especially for new members, is that members who do not get recognition for their volunteer actions are likely to quit being Lions. We should recognize everyone, regardless of how limited their actions may have been!

The second type of recognition may seem a bit strange initially, but <u>clubs should also recognize the spouses and close friends</u> of Lions. In my earlier discussion of club action items I pointed out the importance of <u>strengthening the relationships between new</u> <u>members and other Lions</u>. What clubs need to additionally acknowledge is that Lions hold important relationships with non-Lions and they need to recognize these individuals for their willingness to allow Lions to give up time with them to be volunteers. Negative assessments of Lion volunteerism by spouses and friends will lead to the disappearance of members.

Certain things can happen when your Lions Club gets involved. If we have to find something new – go for it – because the more we raise – the more we can give. Also, the more members who get involved also create a bundle of fun and more money raised. The information that appears may benefit another club – for here is where we get ideas and we might be able to use those ideas within your own club.

Athens Lions Club = Children's Movie Matinee - May 3, 2008. Lighthouse Sight Clinic - Athens Lions Club members help at the clinic on the first Tuesday of most months. EASTER EGG HUNT: The Club will hide eggs for the annual Jefferson Easter egg hunt on Saturday, April 3.WHITE CANE DAY: Is scheduled for Saturday April 17th. **MEETINGS**: March 8 was a regular meeting with 23 members present, plus 1 guest. Dr. Michael Helms, Pastor of Jefferson First Baptist Church, told about his trips to Liberia as well as a book he authored **Hoping Liberia**. Ricks Institute is a school in Liberia, where Dr. Helms' friend Olu Menjay is the Principal. All proceeds from book sales go to "Bricks for Ricks," and will be used to purchase a brick making machine. The bricks will withstand earth quakes up to 8.0. March 9, Zone meeting at Golden Corral in Winder. Zone Chair Dot Hunt took six Lions from Jefferson to attend the meeting. March 14. Cabinet meeting in Dawsonville. Four Lions from Jefferson attended. March 22 was a regular meeting with 25 members present, plus 1 guest. Doug Thurman, Jefferson High School Head Wrestling Coach, talked about the activities of JHS wrestling. The team has won 10 consecutive traditional championships and 9 consecutive State Dual Championships. Wrestling gives the boys strength, endurance, and tenacity. Georgia Lighthouse Report

Contributions: MD18 Club Contributions and other contributions to the Lighthouse total \$118,256.57 for the first seven months compared to \$108,306.01 for the same period last year.

District 18-D contributions to the Lighthouse for the first seven months are \$25,186.48 compared to \$26,159.42 for the same period last year. Thirteen (13) Clubs out of 26 Clubs in 18-D or 36% of the Clubs have made regular contributions to the Lighthouse.

For your information, twenty-two counties make up District 18-D and I am pleased to report that needy citizens from all 22 counties were served by our Lighthouse by providing them with eye exams and glasses, hearing aids, and surgeries. This was accomplished by the Clubs in 18-D. I am confident with 100% support of all Clubs and the support from individual Lions, 18-D will once again play a large part in the support of our Lighthouse.

Vision Clinic Report: The Lighthouse has served 1894 individuals in the first seven month of this year at the Vision Clinics compared to 1632 individuals served for the same period last year. One hundred sixty-five (165) needy individuals from 18-D have been served by our Vision Clinics in the first seven months of this year compared to 101 individuals for the same period last year. Funding to operate the Clinics come from Grants. The total cost to operate the Clinics for the first seven months of this Lion's Year is \$64,146.69.

Hearing Aid Program: In the first seven months of this year, the Hearing Aid Program through our Lighthouse has touched the lives of 552 individuals by providing 1015 hearing aids compared to the 500 individuals for the same period last year by providing 925 hearing aids. Fifty nine (59) needy citizens from District 18-D have received 109 hearing aids in the first seven months of this year compared to 67 people receiving 123 hearing aid for the same period last year.

Surgery Report: During the first seven months of this year, the Lighthouse has completed 160 surgeries compared to 227 surgeries for the same period last year. Thirty (30) of our neighbors in 18-D have had surgeries in the first seven months of this year compared to twenty three (23) for the same period last year.

Surgery numbers are well below last year's for several reasons. We have overspent on surgeries last year and knew we could not do as many this year. Surgeries are now more expensive because we are paying for initial evaluations.

A Young Man On The Move

• Being Deaf-blind Isn't a Disability for Jason, By Guest Writer Peggy O'Dell



Washington D.C., many times. In 2007, he even completed his college internship there with the Department of Homeland Security. Like many visitors to D.C., Jason and his Leader Dog "Spencer" toured the White House, visited the monuments and soaked up the history. But on a special trip last summer, Jason did something that most people can only dream about: he met with President Barack Obama in the White House.

Leader Dog graduate Jason Corning has visited his favorite city,

As the recipient of the Wisconsin Council for Exceptional Children "Yes I Can" award, Jason was one of six young adults invited to meet the president. The day began with a private tour of the White House, which included rooms that are not part of the public tour, and ended in the Oval Office.

The President was waiting in the doorway of the Oval Office to greet them, and Jason was the first to meet him and shake his hand. "He is taller than I thought he was, and he has a nice smile," Jason recalled.

President Obama congratulated the group on their accomplishments, and pledged the support of his administration to the Deaf-blind community. Jason thought that even Spencer sensed what a special occasion it was. "He just stared at the President like he honored him too," Jason said. Spencer was rewarded with a presidential pat on the head.

At 23, Jason is a young man on the move. As a student at the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater, he spent time studying in Ireland, and found the Irish to be very welcoming to people with disabilities and their service dogs.

"The Irish people treated Spencer like he was a person," Jason said. "They didn't come up to him and start to pet him or make comments, and they didn't mind him sitting on a seat in the bus, sleeping in a public hostel bed, or parking in a private garden." One tour bus driver even produced a blanket for Spencer to lie on to make him more comfortable.

At home, Jason travels the country working with teens and young adults at Deaf-blind camps, schools and conferences. From rainy Seattle to sunny Georgia, Jason enjoys his role as mentor. "I want to spread the word that Deaf-blind people have value," he said. "And help them to get into the real business world like 'normal' peers and become successful."

Jason received his Bachelor's of Business Administration degree in May 2009, and shortly after began interviewing for a position with the federal government. He is not allowed to disclose any details yet, but he has received a Conditional Job Offer. "A CJO means that they offer you the job but it's not official yet until the clearance is complete," Jason explained.

If all goes well, Jason will be packing up and moving to Washington D.C. permanently. One of the many things he likes about the city is how easy it is to get around. "There are so many options of public transportation, like the metro, city bus, and train," he said. Perfect for a young man on the move.

Calm in the Storm



"Caspin helps me help myself," shares Canine Companions Graduate Wallis. Caspin is Wallis' Canine Companions service dog.

"He can retrieve my phone and other dropped items, pull my wheelchair and open doors for me," she explains. Wallis has a condition known as

dystonia, a disease that causes her muscles to spasm spontaneously in what is known as a dystonic storm. During a dystonic storm Wallis' muscles will spasm and stiffen for anywhere from fifteen minutes to 4 hours, leaving her barely able to move and physically exhausted. Wallis and Caspin were running errands at the pharmacy one day when a dystonic storm came on suddenly.

"I was at the register when the storm came, and I couldn't move. Caspin helped me pay the cashier, get the bag from the cashier and pulled my wheelchair all the way out of the store, so I could leave the store gracefully," says Wallis.

Like many Canine Companions graduates Wallis supports Canine Companions by participating in demonstrations and presentations.

"While I love promoting Canine Companions in its entirety, I particularly enjoy presenting about the Hearing Dog program."

Wallis continues, "I think my passion for the Hearing Dog program comes from my desire to make this area of Canine Companions more well known, because I have many close friends who have benefited so much from having Canine Companions Hearing Dogs."

This past summer Wallis completed an unpaid internship with Canine Companions for Independence. "I wanted to learn more about the fantastic organization that provided me with Caspin, and I wanted to give back to Canine Companions as much as possible," explains Wallis. Wallis was hard at work every day. Always ready and eager to do

whatever she could. She worked on projects from legislation to caring for dogs in training.

"I helped out wherever I was needed. I left having learned more about Canine Companions than I ever imagined, and having established some wonderful relationships," says Wallis. Wallis and Caspin are one of over 3,200 graduate teams from Canine Companions for Independence. Diabetic Ketoacidosis

How to spot and treat DKA

It's one of the scariest complications of diabetes: diabetic ketoacidosis, often referred to as DKA. Left untreated, it can lead to coma and death. While it's more common in people with type 1 diabetes, a third of DKA cases occur in those with type 2.

Although most cases affect people over the age of 20 and the great majority of DKA cases in kids aren't fatal, this condition is still the No. 1 killer of children and adolescents with type 1 diabetes. And in some instances, people discover that they have diabetes after they land in the hospital with DKA. So it's important to know the signs of DKA—and how to avoid it.

The Chemistry Behind the Crisis

DKA starts with a lack of the hormone insulin. When things are working normally, insulin ushers glucose (a kind of sugar from food) into cells, where it can be converted into energy. But without enough insulin in the body, glucose accumulates in the blood, where it is of little use. Even though there is plenty of glucose around, it can't get into the cells to feed them. The body's response is to drive up blood glucose even more by spurring the liver to break down its glucose stores and to make additional glucose from scratch.

As the body tries to clear the surplus glucose out of its blood through urination, a person may become dangerously dehydrated. At the same time, the body starts to liquidate fat deposits for energy. Fat is indeed rich in energy, but breaking down these stockpiles produces acidic side products called ketones. In high enough concentrations, ketones become toxic by making the blood more acidic. This imbalance is the crux of DKA and gives this complication its name. This increase in blood acidity can severely disrupt the finely tuned chemical processes in your body that keep you living and healthy.

Signs and Signals

The most common triggers for DKA are illnesses or infections, which promote the production of certain hormones in the body that counteract insulin. This is why "sick-day rules" focus on taking more insulin when you're ill. The condition may also arise from other events that place stress on the body, such as heart attack and stroke. In addition, missing insulin doses, undetected insulin pump failure, and certain medications can lead to the development of DKA.

DKA can develop rapidly, typically in less than 24 hours. It brings on a range of symptoms. Frequent urination from hyperglycemia results in dehydration and tremendous thirst. Other symptoms include nausea, vomiting, abdominal pain, loss of appetite, and confusion.

Shortness of breath is another DKA symptom. As the body's natural buffering system is overwhelmed by the acidic ketones, this imbalance causes hyperventilation as the body attempts to regulate blood acid levels by getting rid of carbon dioxide in expired air. As the severity of ketoacidosis increases, the smell of a person's breath may take on the fruity tinge of nail polish remover.

High blood glucose levels that don't respond to medication are also a sign of DKA, particularly levels greater than 300 mg/dl. But elevated blood glucose isn't always present with DKA. Some people get what is called "euglycemic DKA," meaning that although their blood glucose is not elevated, they are still producing ketones.

The key to diagnosing DKA is checking ketone levels in the urine. Over-the-counter ketone test kits are available at pharmacies, or a test for ketones can be done at the doctor's office. If you have DKA symptoms, consistently high blood glucose, or persistently high urinary ketones, you should immediately seek emergency care. This is especially true if you have or recently had an illness or infection.

Dealing With DKA

DKA is typically treated in an intensive care unit using a three-pronged approach. Intravenous fluid replacement is necessary to combat dehydration. Electrolytes—which affect the heart, muscles, and nerve cells—are reduced in DKA, so treatment also focuses on bringing them back to healthy levels. Finally, since a lack of insulin brings on DKA, insulin treatment reverses the process. Insulin will bring down blood glucose and halt the acidification of blood by ketones. With prompt treatment, DKA is usually quickly reversed and may require only a day or two in the hospital.

Between 1996 and 2006, there was a 35 percent increase in DKA-related hospitalizations in the United States. Some studies suggest that skyrocketing medical costs may be to blame; people may be putting themselves at risk for DKA by cutting back on insulin to save money. This disturbing trend underscores how essential it is to take care of yourself, especially when you're sick, by monitoring blood glucose; keeping it under control with the right combination of diet, exercise, and medication; being aware of the symptoms of diabetes complications like DKA; and seeking treatment promptly if you need it.

- Have strengthened the relationship between local Lions Clubs and Scouting
- Assisted Lions Clubs in forming new units
- Exemplifies the BSA/Girl Scout Law and Lions Motto

Millions of children suffer from poverty, homelessness, hunger, abuse, neglect, disease and disabilities. Tragically, these children often must live without essential health and education services that would alleviate their distress – and give them hope for the future. That's why the **Lions Services for Children** **Program** continues Lions Clubs International's long tradition of helping the world's future generations.

Grant Funding Available for Leos

The Leo Leadership Grant Program provides financial assistance to a Lions multiple district, sub-district or single district (not part of a multiple district) to help finance a Leo leadership conference. The goal of the program is to further develop Leos' leadership skills, specifically in the areas of:

- Project management
- Communication
- Teamwork
- Creativity/innovation
- Planning community service projects

Lions Clubs International will award a maximum of two US\$2,000 grants per constitutional area each fiscal year and will approve eligible grants on a first-come, first-served basis. Grant applications will be accepted on a rolling basis until May 1 of each fiscal year.

Liberty Day is a program for our youth. It is a way to strength citizenship in our youth through a program based on the Constitution of the United States.

This is a program started by the Lions Clubs of Denver. Georgia adopted this program in the late 1990s. There are several ways a Lions Club can sponsor a Liberty Day program.

The first way is through a school program. Lions Clubs should arrange a speaker who would be interesting to the students. This speaker could be an elected official or someone who could speak on the rights and responsibilities of citizens as granted by the Constitution. Once you have your speaker, you can receive permission of the school system to sponsor a Liberty Day event to a class or a group of students. I have found that 8th grade and up is ideal. Then order the number of Liberty Day booklets you need from me. The cost is \$.60 each and includes shipping. Also work with the teacher(s) so that they reinforce what the speaker has said through an essay or other classroom work. The students could even write a letter of thanks to the speaker/Lions Club on the subject.
