A year has been a long time but such is life. I am sorry to say I will be doing the same as in the past. I will bring you long Bulletins and it is only you who


will be the judge on what to keep and what you throw away. Just do not forget, what might not be of interest to you - it surely will be of interest to someone else.

President's Retention Campaign



<u>A NEW TWIST</u> Retention/Participation Idea: "Ten Commandments of Retention" The club develops the "Ten Commandments of Retention" that they consistently follow: 1) Meeting punctuality and control; 2) Allocate tasks Lions will want to do; 3) Show all members you care about them; 4) Keep in touch with members and their families; 5) Don't have an overkill on fines/jokes; 6) Involve all members; 7) Bond the club together with social activities; 8) Be interested in people – acknowledge any achievements; 9) Give thanks and praise when due; 10) Deal promptly with conflicts or disagreements.

These guidelines have helped the club increase its membership by 16 people over the course of one year.

Each year a club decides on what projects and events it will focus. Generally, inviting and recruiting new members is an important aspect to a club achieving those goals. New club members can provide a club with fresh ideas, new projects and additional ways to make a difference. But before you invite a new member to your club, ask yourself the following questions:

What is your motivation in inviting new members? How many members does your club need to achieve its goals?

What projects or events would prospective members want to participate in?

Your answers to the above questions will help determine how you answer your prospective members questions and the attitude the prospective member will have regarding your club. 

The Lighthouse Foundation gave out 20+ pair of glasses to children with Retinoblastoma or RB on June 2, 2007. RB is a type of eye cancer only found in children. Many times this is treated by removal of the infected eye and replacement with a prosthetic. The prosthetic eye and the child's other functioning eye needs to be protected with safety glasses. These glasses are what the Lighthouse was able to provide, which will help protect their eyes while playing on the playground or doing other activities.

LEADER DOGS FOR THE BLIND ANNOUNCES NEW LOGO

Offering New Services Leads to Our New Logo



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Rochester, Mich., May 17, 2007 — Leader Dogs for the Blind has decided it's time to say good-bye to an old friend, the German Shepherd that has been the face of Leader Dog for so many years. This Shepherd has served Leader Dog well and has become an icon of independence, safety and companionship for over 16,000 visually impaired individuals.

Leader Dog realized that the logo was not fully representing the scope of services now offered, and wanted a design that would visually portray the mission to enhance the lives of people who are blind and visually impaired. So Leader Dog took the focus off the dog and placed it on the person/dog team. The circle encompassing the team represents that supplying highly trained dogs is still our main focus. The arrow represents the forward movement of the individual toward independence by attaining new skills through participation in our other programs.

Leader Dog has always striven to provide the most innovative tools and techniques for our students," said Bill Hansen, President of Leader Dogs for the Blind. "We wanted a logo that reflects our forward thinking attitude and highlights our core service of providing highly trained dog guides to enhance the independence of people who are blind and visually impaired."

Working to enhance a person's life is not a single event: it is an on-going process that encompasses the entirety of the person's life. Enhancing lives takes motivated people who wish to live a more fulfilling life, a dedicated organization to identify and supply the needed tools, and a supportive group of caring donors to help fund the work.

Leader Dogs for the Blind is a non-profit organization that has been providing independent travel to the blind community through the use of dog guides for over 68 years. Since its founding in 1939, Leader Dogs for the Blind has provided independent mobility to over 16,000 visually impaired individuals. The services of the school are provided free of charge to the blind persons, although the cost to the school is nearly \$37,000 for each student/dog team.

"I can actually comprehend what I've read when I listen to RFB&D's recorded textbooks," says Ashley Jo Strac, an RFB&D member who was diagnosed with dyslexia when she was nine years old. "It is the closest thing to reading a book like a sighted person," says Aerial Gilbert, who is visually impaired and also an RFB&D member.

Lions' participation in the program can begin by assessing the needs of children in the community. Possible Lions Services for Children projects include:

- collecting food, clothes, or books
- a vision or hearing screening
- a literacy program conducted in cooperation with a local school, library, Leo club or community center.
