# INTENT TO LEVY AND COLLECT ADDITIONAL PER CAPITA TAX OF \$3.00

MD 18 CONSTITUTION—Article VI - SECTION 2—DISTRICT ADMINISTRATIVE FUND— (b) In addition to the Multiple District Annual per capita tax levied upon each Member of the Lions Clubs in the State by Article VI, Section 1, the individual Districts of this State are authorized and empowered to levy and to collect an additional per capita tax, up to, but not to exceed, Three Dollars (\$3.00) upon each member of the Lions Clubs in their respective Districts, subject to the following terms and conditions: (1) Notice of intention to levy and collect said additional per capita tax and notice of the maximum amount to be levied and collected must be forwarded to the Secretary and President of each Club in said District at least ten days prior to the date of the first Cabinet Meeting is to be held for said year. (2) Levy and collection of said tax, the exact amount thereof and the date on which the same shall be levied and collected shall be approved by a two-thirds affirmative vote of the members of the District Governor's Cabinet present at the first meeting of said Cabinet for the year.

Each year Lanier Speedway in Gainesville partners with several charities (such as Sunshine Camp for children with cancer,) etc., to assist with fundraising endeavors. The Seniors EyeCare Program ensures that every senior has access to medical eye care and promotes annual, dilated eye exams. It raises awareness about age-related eye disease, including cataracts, provides free eye care educational materials and facilitates access to eye care—at no out-of-pocket cost.

By age 65, one in three Americans has some form of vision impairing eye disease. Most do not know it because there are often no warning symptoms or they assume that poor sight is a natural part of growing older. By detecting and treating eye disease early through annual, dilated eye exams, seniors can preserve their sight.

# **Qualifications**

The Seniors EyeCare Program is designed for people who:

- Are US citizens or legal residents
- Are age 65 and older
- Have not seen an ophthalmologist in three or more years
- Do not belong to an HMO or the VA

To determine if you, a family member or friend qualify for a referral through this program, call 800-222-EYES (3937) toll-free, 24 hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days a year.

# **Benefits**

People eligible for a referral through the program receive a comprehensive, medical eye exam and up to one year of care— at no out-of-pocket cost —for any disease diagnosed during the initial exam.

Volunteer ophthalmologists accept Medicare and/or other insurance reimbursement as payment in full; patients without insurance receive care at no charge.

EyeCare America offers multiple eye care programs for which individuals may qualify. Callers will automatically be screened to determine the program that provides the most appropriate eye care services. Callers who have not had an eye exam in the past 12 months and are at increased risk for glaucoma may be eligible for a glaucoma eye exam through our Glaucoma EyeCare Program.

Eyeglasses, prescription drugs, hospital services, and fees of other medical professionals are not included in this program.

We are pleased to announce that electronic payment options are now available to the treasurers of United States clubs, via WMMR on the Lion's Website.

You can make an e-Check payment using your club's checking account. You can also make a club payment using a valid Visa, MasterCard, Discover or American Express credit card.

This is a simple process. You log into WMMR, with your WMMR password. Once in WMMR, choose the Payments option. By clicking on the "Help" button, you will see a document explaining the payment process. Also, you can view FAQ's (Frequently Asked Questions), by clicking on the "FAQ" button. NOTE: You can access "Help" or "FAQ" without making a payment. At the bottom of this page is the "Make Payment" button that initiates the electronic payment process.

You still have the option to mail your payments directly to the association's lockbox, per the instructions included on your club statement. Please do not mail your payment to Oak Brook. The electronic payment options will be included in the payments instructions sent with your June club statement.

Dear Lion,

This is the last of my series of messages to you on membership. I hope you understand by now that I believe that "membership" isn't just a matter of marketing and recruiting. It is about "being" and "doing" -- the very heart of what it means to be a Lion.

It has been my privilege this year to meet many of you and to see firsthand all that Lions can be and all they are capable of doing. While I have worked hard to fulfill my responsibilities as international president, I know that it is not leaders, but rather Lions at the club level who make miracles happen. Because of this, after I serve as chairperson of Lions Clubs International Foundation in 2009-10, Maureen and I will be enthusiastic about increasing our participation and returning as regular members of the Melville and West Hempstead (New York, USA) Lions Clubs.

I thank all of you, my fellow Lions, for being an example to a world in urgent need of effective, cooperative action and for doing miracles of service that are beyond the reach of any of us acting alone. I have always been proud to be a Lion but never as proud as I am right now.

One of the most gratifying things about my presidential year has been the opportunity hear about your miracles of service and see them in action during my extensive travels.

When China was devastated by an earthquake and thousands were left without shelter, 5,000 tents appeared as if by magic because Lions made it happen. LCIF also authorized US\$3 million to help meet immediate needs. I visited a school where 13 students had died just weeks before, but there was joy and relief on the faces of the surviving children because of the hope inspired by the compassion of Lions. Now that's a miracle.

In Australia bushfires destroyed communities and disrupted lives, reducing entire towns to ashes. Victoria state officials asked Lions to consult on rebuilding plans. Why? Because of Lions' highly visible presence on the ground providing relief where it was most needed.

These examples show that Lions can step up in a big way when needed. But miracles also happen on a smaller scale. Maureen and I vividly recall the joy of a young mother in Africa after a corneal transplant provided by Lions allowed her to see her children for the first time. And when we assisted in a vision screening for the Navajo people in the southwestern United States, we knew we were offering hope to people who otherwise might have none.

Hold a family outing. Be sure to include the kids – including grandchildren. Make it fun with maybe just hot dogs and burgers. Have fun games for both kids and adults.

Set aside one meeting to brainstorm new ideas for community service and/or fund raising projects. Have a newer member act as a facilitator and an experienced Lion as scribe.

Student Ricky Enger Finds Her Tempo

Ricky Enger was born blind. But it hasn't stood in her way y. Married for 10 years and the mother of 6-year-old Kyle, Ricky works for the Serotek Corporation in sales and marketing. It's a job with a lot of responsibility and she travels all over the country giving presentations.

For many years, she wasn't interested in a guide dog – because "you can't fold it up and put it in your purse" and a dog seemed, in some ways, a bother. She'd think, in fact that people with visual

impairments used their dogs more as pals than as bona fide guides.

She slowly became aware, however, that people using a guide dog were somehow more independent than she was and determined togive it a try. The results have been lifealtering. "For the first time in my life," Ricky says "I can walk at the speed I want to walk. I wasn't fully aware of the extent to which I'd adjust my gait to situations — the speed of a crowd or the pace of my sighted guide or the built-in hazards of using a cane — but I never walked at my pace."

"All that has changed since I've been working with Eddy," she says. "I can walk at the pace I was meant to; I can rest when I want to rest and I can go when I want to go. This is a new level of independence that I've never had in my life and I love it!"

Together with her new found freedom and independence, Ricky also has a pal named Eddy who loves her; who will keep her safe; who will always be at her side.

# Jay Huston, Army Veteran and Service Dog Timo

Jay Huston could have his d dog get him a beer from the fridge, but he prefers to have Timo fetch shoes and keys. Timo is a service dog for Huston, a disabled veteran with limited mobility and

muscle spasms. He drops things a lot and can't bend.

Timo has made it possible for the 42-year-old married father of three to have a normal life. "I was in so much pain I didn't want to get out of bed," he said.

The 70-pound Labrador/ golden retriever mix pulls the 6-foot, 210-pound man to his feet and helps him dress. He goes to work with Huston at U.S. Northern Command and on frequent business trips.

At the airport, Timo puts Huston's shoes in the TSA conveyor bin, a line-saving grace at security that otherwise would require a worker's assistance. Timo sits by Huston's feet on the plane or, if available, gets his seat.

Huston has undergone 10 surgeries for spinal injuries after he hit the ground hard from a parachute malfunction eight years ago at Fort Benning, Ga. He retired from Fort Carson after 17 years of Army Reserve and active duty.

He was matched with Timo six months ago by Canine Companions for Independence, a national nonprofit that trains dogs for people with disabilities.

About a fourth of the 33 dogs placed in Colorado were with military veterans, said Paul O'Brien, director of the state office based in Colorado Springs.

"We're able to place dogs that would never go into service and to serve veterans," O'Brien said. "Military vets with disabilities can handle dogs that we wouldn't typically be able to place. They have good upper-body strength and are cognitively able to handle and give commands to a dog."

There is no fee to receive a dog, which gets about \$40,000 worth of training. The Retired Enlisted Association donated \$20,000 to help sponsor Timo and a dog for Divide resident Jim Young, an Army veteran injured in combat.

"We have a big push right now to place dogs with Iraqi and Afghanistan veterans," O'Brien said. "They want as much independence as they can." It takes some prodding, though.

"They typically say they aren't disabled enough," O'Brien said. "They don't want to take away a dog from someone with more significant disabilities."

That's why Huston put off getting a dog.

"It's a pride thing," Huston said. It's difficult for veterans to accept a disability and adjust to civilian life.

He credits Timo with saving his life. On a work trip in Washington, D.C., Huston, who has hearing loss, didn't hear a car coming.

"I was getting ready to step out in the crosswalk, and he curled his head around my leg and wouldn't let me step forward," he said, "and that's when a car went speeding into the crosswalk."

Timo wasn't trained to do that, he said.

At NorthCom, Timo opens doors, picks up dropped pens, closes file drawers and charms Huston's colleagues.

"They say hello to him," Huston said. "I say, 'What about me?""

At home, Timo gets playtime with Huston's children, who are glad to have their dad back.

"He never wanted to leave the house," said his oldest daughter Kim, 17. "Now it's easier for him to go out with us."

# **ADA Statement on Insulin Glargine and Cancer**

ALEXANDRIA, VA, Jun 26, 2009 (MARKETWIRE via COMTEX) -- Diabetelogia, the journal of the European Association for the Study of Diabetes (EASD), published a series of research papers today examining a possible link between insulin glargine (brand name, Lantus) and cancer. Findings from these research papers are conflicting and inconclusive, and the American Diabetes Association cautions against over-reaction until more information is available.

Four different population based studies were reported and published in Diabetelogia and the data within these studies and between these studies are conflicting and confusing. Until more information is available, the American Diabetes Association advises patients using insulin not to stop taking it.

For patients using glargine and considering switching to another form of insulin, the data in these studies make it unclear as to whether any one type of insulin increases the risk of cancer more than other types of insulin.

Patients concerned about these studies or their insulin regimen should talk to their doctor and should not stop taking their insulin on the basis of the findings reported here. Insulin is a hormone normally produced by the pancreas that helps the body use glucose for energy. All people with type 1 diabetes need to take insulin to survive; many patients with type 2 diabetes also need to take insulin to control their blood glucose.

Glargine insulin, which as been widely used since 2000, is an artificial form of insulin that is typically administered once a day. The American Diabetes Association is the nation's leading voluntary health organization supporting diabetes research, information and advocacy. 
# LIBERTY DAY—YOUR LIONS CLUB AND SCOUTING PROJECT

The National Council of the Boy Scouts of America has recognized Liberty Day as a citizenship project. Older Cub Scouts (Webelos 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> grade), Boy Scout troops, and Venturing crews are encouraged to undertake a project at least once a year under the BSA program, Good Turn for America. Liberty Day is now listed as one of the suggested projects.

Liberty Day Kids is the ideal method of a Webelos den, Boy Scout troop or Venturing Crew to complete a Good Turn for America project using Liberty Day. For Liberty Day Kids, the scouts learn a set of questions and answers directly out of the Constitution. They then take these questions and answers out to the public in a mall, post office, or other gathering place and ask adults the questions. Every adult questioned is given an "I Got Quizzed" sticker or an American flag lapel pin along with a pocket Liberty Day booklet.

This is a great way for a Lions Club to be involved in Scouting. The relationship between Lions and Scouting goes back to the beginning of both organizations in the United States. The cooperation between Scouts and Lions benefits both organizations. Young people need the guidance and mentoring of quality adult role models—Lions.
