I saw our service shining through on my visit to the Georgia Lions Camp for the Blind on Lions Day at the Camp. Our District Governor Team played the campers in a game of goal ball. The campers won the game, but we won the satisfaction of seeing smiles on the faces of all the campers. These teenagers were having the time of their lives with their friends. They talked about boyfriends, girlfriends, and all the things teenagers talk about. The courage and spirit of these campers was amazing. I was most impressed by the compassion and caring of the staff and counselors. We are blessed with a wonderful staff. Every dollar that we give to OUR CAMP is being well spent.

Our first Cabinet Meeting was held in Gainesville with 115 Lions present from all over the district. We heard reports from the Camp for the Blind and the Lions Lighthouse and conducted the business of the district. The Cabinet officers were installed by Past International Director Buddy Ouzts. I am blessed to have such a wonderful group of Lions to work with this year. Thank you all for your service to the district.

Our service is making a difference in a hurting world. We face the challenge of helping more people in need than ever before. I have no doubt the Lions of 18-D will meet this challenge. We all need to recommit ourselves to be the best Lions we can be. I am proud to be a Lion and your District Governor.

New LCIF Volunteer Structure

Lions Clubs International Foundation is in a position of un-precedented opportunity to build upon the recent success of Campaign SightFirst. To do so an LCIF Development Plan was created, which was approved by the LCIF Board of Trustees at the May 2008 Board Meeting. This plan is designed to strengthen our Foundation, and a critical aspect of the plan is the creation of an en-hanced LCIF volunteer structure, similar to that of CSFII.

This enhanced volunteer structure will provide consistently trained and longer-serving LCIF Coordinators in every district and multiple district. These volunteer coordinators will serve as ambassadors of LCIF in all regards and will be supported in their efforts by geographically assigned LCIF Development staff. This change is being undertaken to better serve the needs of Lions and those we serve worldwide. The efforts of these LCIF Coordinators will help increase both awareness of LCIF's work and donations received, allowing Lions to provide greater humanitarian service when needed locally and globally.

PDG Steve Hart, has been appointed and received training in May with MD Chair PDG Hashbarger for a three-year term. Please note that the new LCIF MD and District Coordinators will fill the role formerly served by MD and District LCIF Chairpersons. This new structure will be effective following International Convention in Lions year 2009-2010.

HUMANITARIAN INITIATIVES

Working together, Lions have the opportunity to build a stronger Foundation and create a better world. LCIF supports many humanitarian efforts, in addition to sight initiatives. Many of LCIF's successful programs range from combating disability to aiding disaster relief efforts. Lions continue to develop projects that address the immediate and long-term needs of their local and global community.

Disaster Relief

To assist Lions in helping their communities following a natural disaster, LCIF Emergency grants are issued for a maximum of US\$10,000. The funds help meet immediate needs such as food, water, clothing and medical supplies. Lions often offer assistance for emergency or non-emergency humanitarian projects, through volunteering their help, donating supplies or requesting assistance from the Foundation. When disasters occur on a much larger scale, Major Catastrophe grants are awarded for long-term reconstruction projects. LCIF and Lions have helped countries around the globe following major catastrophes, including the Pakistan earthquake, Hurricane Katrina, the South Asia tsunami and September 11, 2001. Other major humanitarian initiatives include:

Diabetes Treatment/Prevention


In 1999, LCIF established diabetes prevention and control as a part of the Core 4 program, which includes initiatives to preserve sight, combat disability, promote health and serve youth. Since then, LCIF has approved 15 diabetes related grants for US\$1.3 million.

Low Vision

Low vision, an eye condition that cannot be improved medically, surgically or with conventional lenses, became part of the Core 4 grant program in 1999. Grants have supported the expansion of low vision services and education to those affected.

Special Olympics Opening Eyes

The Special Olympics-Lions Clubs International Opening Eyes program established a partnership between LCIF and Special Olympics in 2001. To date, more than 100,000 vision screenings have been provided to Special Olympic athletes and more than 40,000 Special Olympic athletes have received free prescription eyeglasses.

18-D Environmental Award

General Guidelines for Award:

The contest will be conducted on a Region basis. Each of the zones within the region will work together on identifying, completing and documenting an environmental project within their region. There will be a rotating trophy or plaque with annual name plates. The club within the region that has the most participants on a percentage basis will hold the award and be responsible for bringing to all zone and joint zone functions as well as the 4th cabinet meeting each year. One of the main purposes of this award is to bring attention to our environmental responsibility as Lions, but just as important is for the clubs that make up the three regions to work together on a project in their area for the good of the community at large. Criteria will be set for the contest by assigning points for various categories.

Areas from which to choose:

- * Community clean-up
- * Tree plantings and various plantings of shrubs and ground cover for conservation
 - * Recycling programs
- * Education including photography and environmental contest for youth
- * Other (Ideas from Lions Club International website under environmental projects).

Basic contest rules:

The contest must be documented from initiation through completion using text and pictures. Areas of evaluation for the project must include area assessment, community input, partners from other organizations, project selection, determine labor, materials and budget needs, get agreement and commitment for participation, involve all clubs in the region, get funding linedup, make public aware of your Lions project, and get media coverage. Each of these areas will have credits given in the contest. The contest will be judged by 3 outside impartial individuals using a standardized instrument. The contest package must be sent to Lion Wayne Turnbull, 18-D Environmental Chair by 15 April 2010.

Lions Green Teams are ready to help save the planet by:

<u>Cleaning the environment</u> - 32% of clubs organize a community clean-up project. Lions Green Team community clean-up is a great way to improve the environment and work alongside Lions, Leos, and non-Lions on

a "hands-on" high-visibility community service project.

Thirty-two percent of the world's 44,951 Lions clubs in participated in a community clean-up project in 2006-07

(Source: Lions Club Activity Report). A community clean-up project was the third most implemented Lions project worldwide.

Lions Green Team participants can wear Lions-logo apparel or hats to publicize that a Lions Green Team is at work! A Lions logo sign at the clean-up site can reinforce the message.

Planting trees - if every club planted a tree, there would be more than 44,000 new trees on the planet; if every Lion planted a tree, there would be more than 1.3 million new trees on the planet. Lions Green Teams can plant trees to help the Earth. Fourteen percent of the world's 44,951 Lions clubs (in 2006-07) participated in a tree planting project according to the Lions Club Activity Report.

Recycling - eyeglasses, paper, computers, and car batteries can be recycled. Lions Green Teams fulfill the *Reduce, Reuse, Recycle* environmental message by reducing landfill debris through reuse or recycling. Lions Green Team efforts occur at Lions club, district, and multiple district activities as well as in the homes of environmentally-conscious Lions.

View the **Lions Green Team** <u>Kit</u>. Items to be recycled can include:

- Eyeglasses (Lions recycle millions of pairs each year)
- Hearing aids
- Paper books, magazines, telephone books
- Aluminum
- Metal keys, dry cleaner hangars, patio furniture
- Plastics
- Motor oil
- Paint
- Computers
- Inkjet cartridges
- Cellular telephones
- Athletic shoes
- Clothing
- Medical equipment such as wheelchairs and crutches





- Sponsor school-based environment projects such as the collection of used athletic shoes, notebook paper, or books.
- Host a Lions Green Team seminar for the public. Submit press releases about the environment to the local media.
- Volunteer to help local groups or municipalities implement environment projects.
- Sponsor a hybrid car exhibit/demonstration.
- Raise funds for an environment project.

Lion William B. Owens, Sr., of Suches, GA. Or known as Grandpa Bill and Bloop is survived by Peggy, his wife of 63 years. He served as Commander of VFW post 7394 of Union County, was a member of the Allegheny Masonic Lodge #114 and a lifetime member of the Yaraab Shrine Club.

Lengthy/Boring Meetings

Poor meeting quality is always one of the chief reasons given for leaving a club. Interesting and productive meetings are very important to the efficient functioning of your club. They are also important to your members. You want these members to feel like they are spending their time on something worthwhile. Planning and running effective meetings that follow a well-prepared agenda will help accomplish this.

Club Politics/Cliques

Are politics getting in the way of club business? Do cliques within the club alienate new members, making it difficult for them to feel a part of the group? Limiting cliques and politics will make your club environment welcoming and productive. All members will feel more interested and involved.

Lack of Involvement

Once your club inducts new members, be sure to engage them in activities that interest them and encourage them to take on leadership roles. Members who see they play an active, important part in the club are far less likely to drop out.

Working Together

Too often, differences in personalities, gender or culture hinder a club from functioning smoothly. Dwelling on differences can lead to poor communication, misunderstandings and the club's inability to set common goals. By learning to bridge differences and communicate openly with all members, you will create a productive environment for your club. Retention is an ongoing team effort, led by you, the club president. Keeping your club efficient, productive and meaningful to your members will result in many benefits:

- A club that is a vital, respected part of your community.
- The ability to help people in need locally, and globally.
- A club that offers personal and professional growth opportunities for members.



But Kathy is a fighter, and she recently came to Southeastern Guide Dogs from her home in Gulfport, Florida, with the goal of reclaiming her freedom. Her new journey began the day she met her guide dog, Angel.

Kathy has always referred to her two children as "angels" so when we told her she was being matched with a dog named Angel, she knew it was fate. The bond began to grow before they even met and becomes stronger every day. Today, Kathy and Angel walk side by side with confidence and dignity. We are proud to play a role in their Forward Together journey.



The Leo brand rejuvenation project is almost complete! To best meet the changing needs of youth and young adults throughout the world, several programmatic components have been reviewed and modified to enhance the Leo Club Program. When the new brand rolls out in July, you will see a fresh new look, along with two separate and distinct tracks for Alpha and Omega Leos. Part of this fresh look includes a modification of the Leo age ranges to most effectively address the needs of each track and its members. Starting July 1, 2009:

- · Alpha club membership will be for youth between 12-18 years of age and will focus on individual and social development.
- · Omega club membership will be for young adults between 18-30 years of age and will focus on personal and professional development.

These new age ranges better match the current membership of Leo clubs across the globe. In a recent survey conducted by the Youth Programs Department, 88% of survey respondents said their Omega club membership consisted of Leos from 19-30 years of age, while 83% said their Alpha club membership consisted of Leos from 12-18 years of age. Furthermore, the new age ranges also better reflect the current practices of other service organizations like Rotary International and Kiwanis International.

Both tracks will continue to be connected through a larger Leo community, united by its common purpose of Leadership, Experience and Opportunity.

LIBERTY DAY—YOUR LIONS CLUB AND SCOUTING PROJECT

The National Council of the Boy Scouts of America has recognized Liberty Day as a citizenship project. Older Cub Scouts (Webelos 4th and 5th grade), Boy Scout troops, and Venturing crews are encouraged to undertake a project at least once a year under the BSA program, Good Turn for America. Liberty Day is now listed as one of the suggested projects.

Liberty Day Kids is the ideal method of a Webelos den, Boy Scout troop or Venturing Crew to complete a Good Turn for America project using Liberty Day. For Liberty Day Kids, the scouts learn a set of questions and answers directly out of the Constitution. They then take these questions and answers out to the public in a mall, post office, or other gathering place and ask adults the questions. Every adult questioned is given an "I Got Quizzed" sticker or an American flag lapel pin along with a pocket Liberty Day booklet.

This is a great way for a Lions Club to be involved in Scouting. The relationship between Lions and Scouting goes back to the beginning of both organizations in the United States. The cooperation between Scouts and Lions benefits both organizations. Young people need the guidance and mentoring of quality adult role models—Lions.
