Fellow Lions:

Though the weather doesn't indicate it, summer is coming to a close, children are returning to school, the days are getting shorter, and family vacations are history for this year. Being prepared for the changes we know will come is second nature to us. We can't ignore it because we know it is going to happen regardless of what we do or think.

How does this apply to us as Lions? Should we not be prepared for changes that are coming? Our loss of older members is not being replaced

by younger ones. We see this coming as a matter of common sense, yet some of us are surprised when it happens. Clubs are losing vital hard working 50+ year members and it is taking two or three members to fill the gap of what all they did. This shouldn't be happening, yet it is a trend not just in District D, but in most of the US and Lionism. What can we do to be on top of the situation?

First, we must recruit new members. Invite them to come to your meetings and make sure your meetings are attractive to guests who are "checking us out". Invite them back and ask them to join. No one can join a Lions Club unless they are invited.

Second, find out what their interests are and put them to work. Make them a part of the club. Our members are often leaders in their own right, motivated to make an impact on their community.

Include a good orientation program as part of your club objectives. Invite them to Zone, Region and District functions. Introduce them to our websites both local, districts and international. Encourage questions and be prepared to answer them. I know from visiting your clubs, that you are doing this already. But why aren't we growing? Are we meeting the needs of our community? These change as everything else does. Are we meeting the needs of our younger members? What do they see as commitment and involvement?

Please put November 9th and 10th on your calendar now. Friday evening will feature a meal, entertainment and induction into the Hall of Fame. (Clubs need to make their recommendations to the Past District Governors Assoc for their candidates)

Saturday, the 10th will start out with a Dynamic Club Workshop in the morning. This is free and very valuable for leadership and club growth. The afternoon will be our 2nd cabinet meeting which will include reports from zone and region chairs. The banquet Sat evening will feature as our guest speaker, International Director, Joseph Gaffigan from Maryland. Details in making your reservations will be forthcoming. I look forward to meeting more of you as I make my official visit. Please check your directories for my schedule. My intention is to serve you the best way I can in club growth and community outreach.

SECOND: Lions Affordable Hearing Aid Project

I am happy to announce a new program of Lions Clubs International Foundation.

LCIF has affordable, high-quality hearing aids available to Lions clubs in the United States for low-income members of the their communities. The two types of digital hearing aids from Rexton, Inc. can be purchased for \$200 per aid from the Lions Affordable Hearing Aid Project (Lions AHAP).

Ninety-five percent of individuals with hearing loss can be successfully treated with hearing aids yet 30 percent are unable to afford hearing aids. Seven million people in the U.S. cannot afford to purchase hearing aids. In 2005, the average cost of a hearing aid was \$1,900, and most people need two hearing aids. Hearing is critical to communication, so when there is even a minimal loss, it affects all aspects of a person's life. For example, people with untreated hearing loss make an estimated 50% to 70% less in wages than their hearing peers.

The two types of aids offer Lions clubs the opportunity to help with almost any type of hearing loss. Reducing communication breakdown for one person creates a ripple effect that touches everyone in the community. And, based on feedback from the program so far, many clubs are revitalized and often recruit new members committed to the new service.

The club has kept busy – for the last two months they have approved eye glasses & exams for 8 people, dispensed 619 rolls of Lion Mints, sold 81 brooms & mops, inducted two new Lions in August, collected 276 eye glasses, 42 pair of lenses, 40 BTE hearing aids, 23 unused hearing aid batteries and 6 cell phone. They worked the Ga. Mtn. Fair at Hiawassee, delivered Meals on Wheels. spent time at the Ga. Mtn. Health Center, helped at the American Legion Auxiliary, performed eye screening, was able to submitted articles in the local newspapers and fulfilled other needy accomplishments that earned them way over 1,000 volunteer hours enjoying what they do for Lionism and gaining much respect from within the community. Not only were Lions involved, they also had the support of family members – young adults – they might not be LEO's, but they gave much needed support. With an increase of membership over the years, Union County has been able to increase their activities and thus increase needed funds to support Lions projects and the community as a whole.

Dear Lions,

Lions of 18-D contributions to the Lighthouse topped all Districts this past Lions year. Your contributions totaled \$108,420.21 which was thirty percent of the total Lions Contributions for Lion year 2006-2007. Your contributions over the past three years have totaled over \$323.000.00. I applaud you for your generosity and on behalf of those who received vision or hearing services I THANK YOU.

I assure you that your contributions were used wisely. Remember only 10% goes for overhead cost and 90% for vision and hearing service. Over 1300 needy Georgians received assistance with either vision or hearing restoration. Services provided statewide included 225 surgeries, 586 received glasses and hearing aids were provided to 498 individuals. Over 1300 humans can again enjoy the sights and sounds of the world.

121 of those receiving vision or hearing restoration were from our District. Total value of services provided to those with need was in excess of \$245,000.00 while the actual cost to our Lions Lighthouse was less than \$56,000.00. I ask what would those with needs have done if it were not for our Lighthouse and the contributions of they receive.

Let me encourage you to continue your financial support of our Lions Lighthouse. The need is too great and failure is not an option. With the approval of a new constitution for the Lighthouse this past June the Board of Directors has been involved with developing Committee Structure and composition and soon will start on the formulation of a strategic plan. The transition team has attempted to move with deliberate speed but not with haste. The attitude has been let's do it right the first time.

A number of items will be presented at the fall membership and board meeting in October. This meeting will be held in Macon on the 20th and 21st of October. Let me encourage you to attend. It is planned to roll out a new meeting format for the weekend.

Let me also encourage you to continue to collect used glasses, cell phones and hearing aids and send them to the Lighthouse. Have you ever wondered how the glasses that you collect and send to the Lighthouse are used? Read on. From the Lighthouse web site comes this story on the use of recycled glasses.

"In the spring of 2006, Rev. Ross led a group from Dahlonega on a mission trip to El Salvador. He, along with 17 members of the Dahlonega United Methodist Church, went to El Magdelena to help with a medical mission, lead a bible school for the village children and help build a church.

As part of the mission trip, Ross took glasses provided by the Georgia Lions Lighthouse Foundation. Ross and his group put glasses out on tables for the villagers to try on. After waiting in line for their turn, villagers would hold a book open, try on a pair of glasses, and then try to read. If they could not read with that pair of glasses, they would keep trying on glasses until they found a pair that worked. Smiles and tears were on the faces of villagers and missionaries alike. Ross commented that to see the joy that a simple pair of glasses gave to these people was deeply moving.

The people of El Magdelena have no regular health and vision care. Some of the villagers have been unable to see and therefore unable to work. Glasses have given many of them their sight back. Several of the village women sew for a living. They do delicate, intricate—stitching which had become difficult and even painful to do because of failing vision. Glasses from the Lighthouse will help these women work and earn a living for their families. The Lighthouse receives donations of used prescription eyeglasses, over the counter readers and sunglasses. Lighthouse volunteers wash, read, label and pack the donated glasses to get them ready to go overseas" 11

How, Which, Why = Questions Instructors are asked everyday

How do Leader Dogs know when to cross the street?

A common misconception is that Leader Dogs can read traffic signals; but dogs are color blind, so they can't recognize red, green and yellow. Our dogs know when to cross the street by receiving the command "forward" from their owner. A person who is visually impaired decides when to cross the street by listening. Auditory signals, such as hearing when cars are driving in front of you versus on the side of you, are used by people who are blind on a daily basis.

However, sometimes a car makes a turn directly in the path of the Leader Dog team. In this instance, the dog's ability to "traffic check" comes into play. When "traffic checking," a dog stops walking when a vehicle is moving in their direction. The dog will not begin walking again until the car has safely passed and their owner commands them "forward."

Which breed/gender makes the best Leader Dog?

Though we train specific breeds to be Leader Dogs, such as Labradors, golden retrievers, German shepherds, collies, and standard poodles; the best breed is the one that fits the student's needs. If someone lives in a very cold environment, a dog with a heavier coat is preferable. If someone has allergies, a poodle may be preferred because they have less dander and may be less likely to cause an allergic reaction.

In terms of gender, both make and female dogs make great Leader Dogs. We are more concerned about the right fit in terms of body size and personality, than about the dog's gender.

CAMP KUDZU

It was a hot day in July when I traveled to the North Georgia Mountains to visit Camp Kudzu. As 18-D District Diabetes Awareness Chairperson, I wanted to know all about Camp Kudzu. My Lions Club has been supporting the camp for years, but I really never knew much about the camp.

The new Director of Development for Camp Kudzu, Amber Medley, contacted me to invite someone from Lions to visit during camp week. My club President, his wife and their granddaughter visited with me on Tuesday of camp week. Amber was so glad to see us. She wanted me to let all the Lions Clubs know how grateful Camp Kudzu is for the support we give them. She, like all the children at camp that week, are Type diabetics. Amber explained to us that she has an insulin pump and how it works. She took us on a tour of the camp. It was an amazing sight. There were 255 children, ages 8-18, along with 190 adult volunteers, having the time of their lives. The volunteers, 100 of the 190, all had medical backgrounds. We had lunch with one of the doctors who helped establish Camp Kudzu. He is an endocrinologist at Scottish Rite Children's Hospital in Atlanta. We also spoke with a young man who was a counselor. He had volunteered with a friend last year and had such a great experience that he came back this year. You don't have to have a medical background to volunteer. They need volunteers for all kinds of jobs.

Then there were the children. Some of them were playing on the water slide at the lake; others were making tie-dyed t-shirts or woodworking projects. They were having fun. You couldn't tell by looking at them that they were diabetic. The miracle of Camp Kudzu is that these volunteers teach the children that they can deal with diabetes and learn how to manage the disease. They enjoyed a lunch of hamburgers, hot dogs, baked beans, cole slaw, and fruit. I was expecting food that was sugar-free and restricted in nature. Amber told us that there are no special diets. The children check their blood sugar before they eat and again after they eat.

What they learn at Camp Kudzu is that, in real life, if they are invited to a friend's birthday party, they can have birthday cake even though they are diabetic.

It warmed our hearts to see the children cheering for each other when they received the "Golden Syringe" Award at lunch. These awards were given to children who had given themselves an insulin shot for the first time or who had changed their insulin pump site for the first time. Amber told us that the cost for one child for that one week is \$1200-\$1500. This year, they used \$108,000 in scholarships, for children whose families could not afford to pay the full amount. A large part of that was Lions dollars. I now know that every dollar our Lions Clubs have donated to Camp Kudzu has been used to do a lot of good. To see the smiles on the children's faces was so gratifying. I would encourage all Lions to volunteer or make donations to Camp Kudzu. It is just another example of our Lions motto, "We Serve".
