Dear Lion,

Lions have long been committed to programs that serve our youth. They are truly tomorrow' leaders. But they need us! I would like to encourage all Lions to support o youth, particularly this next month, as we focus on service to youth.



I'd like to share with you one youth program that is near and dear to my heart - Lions Quest. I have seen its great impact worldwide, as well as in my home country. This is a program loved by youth, teachers and parents alike. Why is it so loved, you ask? Because it has real results, and it gives hope for the future.

Others know this, too. The Minister of Culture in Germany told me - after Lions Quest was implemented - that it is not enough to deliver facts only in schools. We must also deliver ways to live and values for life.

And, this message is spreading. The Minister from Bhutan who attended our Lions convention spoke to me about wanting Lions

Quest in their schools. Leaders are realizing the value of Lions Quest. Three additional countries added the program last year - Bulgaria, Mauritius and the Philippines - bringing the program to 60 countries now. Next month we



will be meeting in Colombia with Latin American leaders about expansion throughout the region. But there are so many other countries and communities where this program could make a difference.

Lions, now is our chance to make a name for ourselves as leaders in youth source Tabelland you to join main global extension of Lions Quest.

Like me, I'm sure that you have been following the news reports of the deadly flooding in Pakistan. My heart goes out to the 20 million affected by this disaster. As the flood waters and death toll continue to rise, Lions are committed to helping.

Lions have been providing assistance since the devastating flooding began July 22, and <u>LCIF is providing US\$120,000</u> to help Lions in providing relief to their communities.

You know well that Lions Clubs greatest asset is our volunteers - you and 1.35 million Lions around the world. Wherever there is a need, there is a Lions club nearby, ready to respond with

their hearts and hands. In the case of disasters, we are the first to offer help, and the last to leave.

I was moved by a <u>video</u> the Lions in Pakistan created. While it shows the effects of the disaster, it also shows hope - hope for brighter days ahead. This hope is because of Lions. They have put aside their own needs to help their neighbors, providing needed relief supplies and shelter.

We are truly committed to longterm relief, and <u>Haiti</u> is one example where our work remains ongoing. The Lions of Haiti have done a great job given the widespread devastation and the local constraints that exist.



Six hundred Haitian families will move into new homes thanks to an initiative between LCIF, the Lions of MD 111 Germany,



and HELP, an international non-governmental organization (NGO). This is the first of many reconstruction projects to receive support from LCIF thanks to the generous response from the international family of Lions

following the devastating earthquake in Haiti.

Through the project, homes will be erected directly on a family's plot of land, thus avoiding the hardship of further displacement and any potential property disputes. The building of these homes is an important first step toward reestablishing normal life for families who lost their homes and so much more after the earthquake.

From Haiti to Pakistan, China to Tennessee, Lions and our foundation are rebuilding homes and lives.

Service-Learning in America's Schools

Late last year, the Corporation for National & Community Service issued a brief summarizing the research report Community Service and Service-Learning in America's Schools (2008). Research studies show that when young people participate in service-learning, the benefits contribute to students' success and have a positive impact on their social behavior, habits, and attitude. A number of studies are available to support the need for policies that will build and sustain service-learning programs in schools. Tufts University's CIRCLE research center provides a working paper on the impact of participation in servicelearning on high school students' civic engagement, and a fact sheet that investigates the effect of school-required community service on academic performance. With youth volunteering on the decline since the September 11 attacks, now is the time to engage young people in service! Did you know - on average, course-required community service enhanced academic progress by 3.3% (in history) to 6.7% (in reading).

LIONS INTERNATIONAL ESSAY CONTEST

Contest Rules: Contest is open to students who are considered visually impaired according to their national guidelines and will be 11, 12 or 13 years of age on November 15. Only a Lions club can sponsor the contest. The contest may be sponsored in a local school(s) or organized, sponsored youth group(s), or individuals may be sponsored as well. A Lioness club can sponsor the contest through its sponsoring Lions club.

The contest theme is "Power of Peace."

Essays must be no longer than 500 words in length, submitted in English, type-written in black ink and double-spaced.

Each essay should be submitted with a completed entry form. Essays submitted without completed entry forms will be automatically disqualified. Only one entry per student per year, and each entry must be the work of only one student. Essay entries cannot have already been published. Any essays found to be plagiarized will be automatically disqualified and the student will be prohibited from entering any future Lions competitions.

One grand prize winner will receive an award and US\$5,000. They will be notified by June 1. The postmark deadline for a club to send one winning essay to the district governor is February 15. Note: A participating club should notify its district governor in advance of sending an entry.

Activity reports on Global Service Action Campaign activities submitted via WMMR will automatically be entered for the Beacon Awards in the following categories:

- · Most Creative Youth Program Activity (club or district)
- · Outstanding Service to the Blind or Visually Impaired (club or district)
- · Best Hunger Relief Program or Activity (club or district)
- Best Environmental Project (club or district)
- · Lion That Best Exemplifies the Spirit of Service - entries are nominated by executive officers or international directors.

CLUB NEW MEMBER INDUCTION AND ORIENTATION

Forty-eight (48) Lions in JULY, forty-seven (47) in JUNE, fifty-two (52) in MAY, etc., all new Lions in Georgia. What should we be doing to retain them? First of all, were they inducted as Lions? Some of these Lions were charter members of new clubs, so I think we can assume that most of these new Lions were inducted. However, based on my charter club ceremony attendance, I know that not every new Lion was inducted into their new club. What about the new Lions who joined existing clubs? In fact, it is very likely that not every new Lions was inducted. LCI's web site provides clubs with "Meaningful New Member Inductions" (ME-22), which covers the special club ceremony for new member inductions, but what I am going to suggest is that Lions who may have missed the ceremony should be inducted the very next night they attend a club meeting! Induction doesn't take much time; all new Lions should be inducted!

I vaguely recall being inducted as a new Lion by PDG Millard Havener. Although the ceremony was nice, I doubt that my induction alone has kept me a Lion for over twenty years. What else should new Lions experience shortly after they become members? High on the list of experiences is participating in Lions' orientation. Why is orientation important? Yes, new members are considered Lions, but let's be honest about becoming new Lions. What do new members know about being Lions? The fact is that new Lions hardly know anything about Lions and being Lions! We were successful in getting them to join clubs, but how are we going to keep them if they don't know what they joined and become convinced that they should continue to be Lions?

New members need to participate in **Lions' orientation!** The major way new members will be able to receive orientation is by having existing clubs provide it. Although existing club members know a lot about being Lions, it nevertheless requires a fair amount of work to provide orientation to new members. Fortunately, orientation is something else LCI's web site has available. Once you log on to the web site, do a search for "The Orientation Guide" (ME-13). What you are going to find is a Club Membership Chairperson's Guide, which identifies the person responsible in a club for organizing new member orientation. No, this does not mean that a Membership Chair has to be the Lion who provides the orientation training, but this club leader is responsible for organizing orientation. The LCI guide "... contains complete planning instructions, suggestions for localizing materials, suggested outlines, checklists and complete orientation content." (p. 15) Furthermore, you will also discover an LCI Lions Orientation Refresher Series designed to provide an orientation update for ALL Lions over a series of club meetings. Clubs don't just lose new Lions. A refresher orientation can potentially help us keep some of these members.

So how was our first month's Georgia Lions membership retention? Statistically, we started the year better than last year. We lost 80 members in July, but last year we lost 99 members. Although the loss difference was only 19 (.003%), had we been able to retain this lower loss retention rate all last year we would have finished the year with an overall membership gain vs. the minor loss of 4 members we experienced. Let's continue to work toward increasing our retention: **INDUCT** and provide **ORIENTATION** to new Lions! This is our starting point.







Another Camping Season has come and gone. Maybe that is so maybe it is not. The Campers are gone that is for sure. We just had one of the best Camping Seasons in a long time and challenged the Campers to do more than ever before. With the Wall and our new Low Ropes Course added to the programming, our Campers are learning what it is like to trust in others and even more so to trust in themselves.

Just as we did last year, again this year we had a 40% increase in Campers over the previous year's Camping Season. That is a great story to tell, and we are very excited about this accomplishment. But that is where the Camping Season is maybe not over. We are still picking up the tab for that great Season. Lions always ask me, "What does it cost to send a Camper to our Camp for a week?" To me the answer is very simple: Divide our Annual Budget by the Number of Campers and that is your answer. Everything we do at the Camp is affiliated with having a great camping season, so all costs are expensed to that end. So the Cost per Camper is easy to determine in my mind: Budget for Camp \$307,700 | 140 campers = \$2,192/ camper.

I shared that with you because once again we did not make budget from a revenue stance. I thank Kristen, her team, and the Executive Committee for being frugal and not spending to budget as well. We cut corners where we could and even with some unexpected costs (dorm fire alarm system, girls' dorm air conditioner, etc...), we still did a great job of managing the Camp and our funds. However, we have had to borrow \$50,000.00 from the Trust Fund in order to complete the Camping Season and pay the bills for July and August. So we are doing what is right in making our Camp better and better; the camper numbers reflect that. "On the Flip Side", we are "Ripe for Change" for getting our finances in order as well. We have some work to do...

We start the work now to have a great Camping Season next year. Please join the Staff of your Camp, the Board of Directors and I as we meet for the Joint Meeting of the Georgia Lions Camp for the Blind and the Georgia Lion Lighthouse in Duluth, GA the weekend of September 10-12, 2010. We are going to celebrate the successes of both organizations and start the work for another great year of service. I look forward to seeing you there!

As always – Thank you for all you do for our Camp and those "We Serve". I'll see you in Duluth for the Joint Meeting. Take Care and God Bless!



A Win-Win-Win Scenario

In the United States there is one trained Orientation & Mobility instructor for every 750 people that are legally blind. This extremely low number of instructors makes it hard to obtain Orientation & Mobility training in a timely manner, or sometimes at all.

Commonly referred to as O&M, Orientation & Mobility refers to a person's ability to determine where they are and how to get to where they need to go. Part of O&M training includes teaching the use of a white cane to assess immediate surroundings and increase travel safety. People using a Leader Dog need excellent O&M skills because they generally move faster than a person using a cane.

Similar to other teaching professions, O&M requires practical experience supervised by a seasoned professional. Due to the limited number of certified O&M instructors, experience can be hard to obtain. This is where Leader Dog enters the picture. At the beginning of each year, a short break from dog guide classes allows LDB the opportunity to add extra students to our accelerated O&M class. Leader Dog's class compacts months of O&M training in a one-week course taught by our three certified O&M specialists. Several years ago we began bringing in Master's level O&M students from Western Michigan University to help with the larger class. This created a win-win-win partnership – LDB provides more people with O&M training, WMU students obtain needed practical experience, and additional people who are visually impaired receive O&M training.

The hands-on training has become an important part of WMU's curriculum. James Leja, professor and chair of the Department of Blindness and Low Vision Studies at WMU calls the experience incredible. "They [WMU students] receive a concentrated experience with excellent supervision and get to work with a variety of students. They are generally exhausted by the time they complete the week, but each student is quick to tell me that [this experience] really drove home their decision to get into the field. They come back with a renewed excitement which really shows."

WMU Student Charles Denaway says, "The week that I spent at Leader Dog was exhausting, stressful, mentally challenging, and quite possibly one of the best learning experiences that I have ever had. The hands-on exposure to the teaching experience with the clients that Leader Dog provides and the immediate feedback that you get from their O&M instructors proved to be invaluable."

The future is important at LDB – whether planning for our own financial stability or making sure that there are trained professionals to support the visually impaired community – we believe in working together to be prepared.

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Graduate Sponsor Patches

One of the many great services Lions provide to Leader Dog is assistance with students from your home area. For years we have awarded graduate sponsor patches to celebrate this service. Patches are given to clubs that reimburse LDB for the cost of a graduated student's airline ticket, that provide the student's initial contact with LDB that assist with the application process (filling-out forms or shooting video), or provide transportation to/from the airport when the student attends LDB.



Serving Those Who Served



Blinded by the rarest of calamities while he was in the Marine Corps, *Daniel Standage* discovered that schooling and service to others who served were his tickets back to health and wholeness. He was recently honored with a National Achievement Award scholarship by RFB&D.

"I began looking for ways to improve my surroundings, in my home and community. Things like taking leadership roles within the blinded veteran community and advocating for student veterans who were too ashamed to ask for help. Helping others somehow helped me."

For 36-year old **Daniel Standage**, a steadfast resolve to be of service has blossomed into a rewarding career path and a journey toward healing and wholeness.



As a young serviceman in the Marine Corps, Dan spent a decade training and serving on the East Coast, West Coast, and overseas. Shortly after leaving Okinawa, he started experiencing severe headaches, losing and regaining his eyesight twice due to a buildup of cerebral-spinal fluid in his head. The third time he lost his eyesight, he never recovered, and it was discovered that the cause was a reaction to a vaccination he'd been given for Japanese Encephalitis while stationed in Okinawa.

"I was just one of the very rare guys that have a reaction to it," he says. "It seemed so incredibly ironic that this could happen to me in the military."

In poor health, Dan ended up separating from the Marine Corps on the same day that terrorists were crashing planes into the World Trade Center, and descended into what he calls "a dark place" in his life. "I lost my eyesight, went through a divorce, left the Marines, moved back to live with my parents. . . and subsided into doing what people call 'self-medication' – drinking, withdrawing and not talking to people. And at the end of that tunnel, it was education and school that turned everything around."

Dan entered Central Arizona College in early 2005; a Veteran's Affairs vocational rehabilitation counselor introduced him to RFB&D shortly before starting school. "RFB&D turned out to be a major part of *coming back* for me," he says. "When I first lost my vision, reading was the last thing on my mind. But later on, school became the

conduit for me to change my life, requiring me to learn completely new ways of doing things – and so reading books in audio format instead of text was a significant step forward. Having equal access to the same material meant that the focus remained on the course, not the disability.

"Reading books through RFB&D has helped me become a better listener. A lot of people are such visual learners that as soon as the book closes, they forget about it. In listening to books, I find that I retain the content better."

Today, Dan serves as a coordinator in the Veterans Reintegration & Education Project at the Disability Resource Center at University of Arizona in Tucson. He finds genuine fulfillment as an advocate for student veterans – many of whom are returning from two wars with a variety of trauma impairing their ability to read and learn. "As I continue to serve those who served, I consider my membership with RFB&D as an invaluable tool for accessing the printed word."

Our Wounded Veterans Initiative, providing more assistance dogs to injured veterans is going strong. We thought you would like to know what our most recent Wounded Veterans Initiative graduates and their clients have to say:

"Facility Dog Jonah is a vital part of treatment for recovery. He's very loved around the battalion." "We see between 3,500 to 4,000 veterans per month, so the power...the impact that Facility Dog Ascot has is just incredible." "For me and the other wounded vets, we're very thankful for the opportunity to be able to take an assistance dog home and have them be there for us for the next ten years of our lives, helping us out in the daily tasks that we wouldn't be able to do without them."

"Before when I needed stuff, I would have to ask someone for help, now, with my Canine Companions service dog... It's like having your life back because of being able to do stuff without having to rely on someone else to do it all of the time."

At Canine Companions we have always helped veterans and are even more committed now with the Wounded Veterans Initiative soundly in place. We recently worked with The University of Denver's Institute for Human-Animal Connection to evaluate our process as it relates to the unique issues facing veterans of the current conflicts. Phil Tedeschi, clinical director of the institute, concluded, "We found that Canine Companions for Independence has such a high

quality program and is already doing so many things right." The University of Denver held a workshop for some of our CCI instructors to learn more about PTSD and its effects on returning soldiers.

The Mission: Camp Kudzu educates, empowers, and inspires children living with diabetes.

Camp Kudzu is a non-profit 501(c)(3) organization providing education, recreation and peer-networking programs for Georgia's children and youth living with diabetes and their families.

Led by dedicated volunteers, medical professionals and a small professional staff, Camp Kudzu offers three weeklong overnight summer camps, family camps and other diabetes education and management programs throughout the year.

Camp Kudzu was founded in 1999, by parents, physicians, healthcare professionals and community leaders who joined forces to establish a program in Georgia that would support the special medical and emotional needs of children living with type 1 (insulin-dependent, juvenile) diabetes in a fun, safe environment. The first summer camp was hosted in June 2000 with 96 children in attendance. This summer, approximately 550 children will attend camp.

It is our hope that after a week at camp, campers will... Be able to establish proactive patterns for living with diabetes. Know how to build friendships to have a social support network.

Have at least one positive role model intersection with type 1diabetes that they engaged with during the Camp Kudzu experience.

Show improvement in a health skill area as identified by the checklist from a family member as a result of his/her experience at Camp Kudzu.

Who Is Eligible to Enter the Competition?

The competition is open to participants who are less than 25 years of age (born after Dec. 31, 1986).

- All participants will play <u>one required piece and two</u> <u>additional pieces they select from a list</u> on the classical guitar.
- Participants should have lived in the constitutional area they represent for at least five years.

How Will Participants Be Identified and Selected?

Seven international finalists will be selected, one from each Constitutional Area. All Constitutional Areas – except for the USA, Its Affiliates, Bermuda, the Bahamas, and Canada – will handle their own competition.

- Please note that all other Constitutional Areas will select their finalist for the 2010-2011 competition in the same manner as the previous year.

How Will the Winners Be Selected?

Individual Performances: Finalists will perform the required piece and their first selected piece.

Concert: Finalists will perform their second selected piece at a concert.

The first place prize is US\$ 10,000; second place is US\$ 7,000; and third place is US\$ 3,000.


