Dear "Gold Standard" Lions of 18-D,

Let me begin by giving everyone who will be attending the Hall of Fame dinner on Friday, 14 November, the correct dinner time: 7:00 p.m. I may have confused you last month. If for some reason you have just decided to attend the Hall of Fame dinner or the Rally, then you need to call me for the Hall of Fame dinner and Lion Herman Jones for the Rally.

I will soon be sending an e-mail notice with more details concerning the Cabinet meeting and our Rally to all district Lions with e-mail addresses. However, what I would like to briefly do now is to talk about "Mining for Lions" in a Gold Standard District.

The membership numbers in the district were sharply down in September: we lost 14 Lions! Although October is generally considered a good growth month for new Lions, my estimate is that we are going to lose another 10 or more members. I know that several clubs held Membership Nights in October, so if you gained some new members they may not show up until November. Never

the less, it looks as though 14 (39%) of the clubs in the district have lost Lions so far this Lions' year.

We need to improve our "Mining for Lions" in the district! To assist you in your mining, immediately after our Rally is done, we are going to have a "Mining for Lions in District 18-D" training session. I have asked the District MERL Team to prepare a brief summary of what they can do to help your club's membership. After each of them gives this information to everyone, we will break up the team and make them available for you to talk to them about problems your clubs are experiencing.

As I pointed out in last month's Bulletin, the Norcross Lions Club is forming a Suwanee Branch Club. There are also at least two or three other clubs that are making efforts to form Branch Clubs; PDG Beverly Shirley will be available to discuss new club development. Our Rally speaker, ID Bill Watkins, has also agreed to participate in this training session and share with you his experience starting a new club. We also need to work on encouraging leadership development in clubs, so PDG Joe Hirsch will be available. Adding members to your club will be Lion Gene Little's area and retaining Lions in your club will be Lion Louise Little's responsibility. This will be your special opportunity to personally interact with all members of the MERL team.

Should you and your other club members attend this session on "Mining for Lions?" Here are my thoughts: If your club is <u>retaining your members</u>, <u>adding new members</u> and growing in size, have Lions <u>eagerly willing to</u> <u>help form new clubs</u> in the district and <u>accept new leadership responsibilities</u>, then I guess you can skip this training. However, if your club is doing all of these things, then you need to stay and tell the rest of us what you are doing to successfully "Mine for Lions!"

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What do nearly 100,000 Lions have in common each year? They become Contributing Members by donating at least US\$20 to LCIF.

The Contributing Membership program is an annual program that recognizes three levels of support: US\$20, US\$50 and US\$100. For US\$20, donors receive a Contributing Member lapel pin identifying the fiscal year in which the donation is made. For US\$50, donors receive a pin and a silver wreath. For US\$100, donors receive a pin and a gold wreath. The pin design changes every year. Contributing membership donations are used to support LCIF grant programs.

Contributing Memberships are a great vehicle for making a difference in the lives of others: US\$20 can provide cataract surgery in Africa and South Asia. US\$50 can support a diabetic retinopathy eye exam in developing countries. US\$100 can make possible a low vision eye exam and glasses in the industrialized world. Your club will be awarded a 100% Member Support banner patch and chevron for the first year of 100% Contributing Membership. For each subsequent year of 100% Contributing Membership, your club will receive a chevron.

Lions Clubs are researching ways to effectively recruit, involve and retain members. It has become increasingly evident when time and financial commitments are expected – volunteers are reluctant to become members of service clubs.

Research by several well know sociologists has suggested clubs can be successful in recruiting, involving and retaining members if new approaches that complement the needs and life style of current generations are met. A program recently developed by a group of Lion leaders has used this research to develop an interactive, multi-media presentation that has received very positive reviews.

Transfusion, Transition, Transformation (also referred to as Triple T or TTT) has been presented in 19 states and 4 Canadian provinces using qualified trainers. The interactive, multi-media approach allows involvement by the participants as well as visual (DVD) examples of the nine modules presented.

PDG Jim Jaggers of Oregon offers testimony as to the success of TTT which also reflects comments from many other evaluations received. "The work PDG Steve Thomson has done with the Triple T program in District 36-O has turned the corner....We just need to keep up the momentum. For the first time since 2002, District O has a positive net gain....and the establishment of two new clubs. More importantly, the Lions who have participated in TTT have helped move the District forward with a 'can do' attitude. DG Sharon Elder is committed to continue the work with TTT and it is incorporated in the Multiple District 5 year plan."

I hold tightly to the white cane, our only compass as we feel our way through the dark. They've taken away our sense of sight and we are blinded. A voice tells us that there's a box next to where each of us is sitting. A voice pierces the darkness telling us to examine the contents of the box.

"What do you smell?" "Potpourri," says one voice. "Coffee" says another. "What do you feel?" "Fabric." "Suede." "Leather." "Corduroy."

After the voice tells us that we've guessed right, she instructs us to use our canes to find the railing in the middle of the room. She says to move the cane from left to right. It's a scary feeling not knowing when you might run into something or someone. All of the sudden, a new voice emerges.

#### "Hi, I am

Daren and I'll be your guide today."

With his voice Daren leads us to through a door. Everything is still dark, but we can feel the grass beneath our feet and with our cane. He instructs us to squat down to feel the grass and smell it. We hear birds chirping. We know we are outside. We continue to feel our way with our canes. It's really funny how we keep bumping into each other.

#### We hear,

"Who's this?" "Sharifa." "Who's this?" "Christine."

We begin to direct each other. "Be careful, there's a step." With his voice Darren guides us to a bridge that goes over a waterfall. "Oh this is beautiful," says Alice Mallory, who is herself visually impaired. So many times we think of beauty as what we can see. Her comment made me reevaluate how I define beauty. We can hear the water trickling by and feel it on our fingers. On the other side of the bridge there are wood chips. He instructs us to bend at the knees and feel the woodchips. He then leads us through a door.

#### "Where do you think you are?"

I feel a shelf with many jars lining it. It feels like a peanut butter jar I open it and it smells like peanut butter. Across the room, I hear my co-workers, "We're in a supermarket ..Pineapple....oh yum...Cauliflower." Then we experience the scariest part. We have to walk across the street without the use of sight. We listen for the cars and make our break for it. Daren leads us through yet another door. We sit down and talk to Daren and learn that he is a Lion in the Kennesaw-Acworth Lions Club. Our guide through this whole journey is blind himself. After we talk we exit the exhibit. With renewed sight we all had a greater appreciation for the sense we had not yet lost.



Want to ensure your club's growth and success? According to the RetentionChairperson's Guide, if you have the followingsix components in your operating structure, your club can do just that. As a club, youshould have:

- 1) A major service activity that involves every member of the club and has asignificant, positive impact on its intended population.
- 2) A major fundraising project in which the community can participate and in which it can contribute.
- 3) A strong public relations program thatprovides a continuous, consistent line of communication among all the membersof your club and between the club andthe community.
- 4) Well-organized, interesting, informative and productive club meetings.
- 5) A feeling of teamwork, cooperation and cohesiveness between club members.
- 6) Strong membership growth, developmentand retention programs

**Lions Green Team** = are ready to help save the planet by:

- <u>cleaning the environment</u> 32% of clubs organize a community clean-up project.
- <u>planting trees</u> if every club planted a tree, there would be more than 44,000 new trees on the planet; if every Lion planted a tree, there would be more than 1.3 million new trees on the planet.



Tommy Atkinson, a member of Greenville Lions Club, recently received the gift of a life time. You see he was accepted as a candidate for a Seeing Eye dog through Leader Dog in Rochester Michigan. Lion Tommy began life sighted, but his vision has deteriorated in the last 10 years to the point that he can see only vague shapes. He went through mobility training and learned to use a cane, but he was not able to live a fully independent life. His counselor in Atlanta advised him to apply to the Leader Dog program. His lions club (Greenville), pastor and many others volunteered to recommend him. During the time that his application was being considered, Lion Dave Knight,18E's representative for Leader Dog, came to present a program. He reassured Lion Tommy that the wait was normally not very long and that he would be hearing soon. The next day he received a call from Leader Dog reassuring him that all of his paperwork had been received. Within the week Lion Tommy was informed that he had been accepted. He flew to Detroit and was transported to the dorm. The dorm was in the shape of a "U" with 10 private rooms on each side. The staff sought to match 20 teams each month. The first 5 days the staff worked with the human member of the team. Lion Tommy noted that the trainers were very selective about who was ready to partner with a dog. Several candidates at the school were sent home because the staff did not think they would be good partners for the dogs. Lion Tommy met with their approval, and he was introduced to Owen, an 18 month old yellow lab. The love and trust began to grow immediately. Lion Tommy had much to learn about how to communicate with Owen, groom Owen and feed him. They made many trips to Detroit under the watchful eye of the trainers. Although he and Owen bonded and began to work well together he was told that their working relationship would continue to grow for the next 6 to 8 months. At the end of this time, they would truly be a working team.

Lion Tommy learned that the Leader Dog program breeds the dogs at the kennels on site. The puppies are raised by puppy handlers who are volunteers and pay all expenses related to the puppy during the first year. Then they return the dogs to the trainers who work with the dogs for 5 to 7 months. At the time that Lion Tommy's group was being matched, there were 30 trained dogs from which to choose. After the pairs are matched, trained and returned to their home, the Leader Dog staff monitors the pair for 2 years before they allow the dog to be adopted. The dogs generally serve their masters for 8 to 9 years. Then the master has the choice of keeping the dog or returning him to Leader Dog. Lion Tommy was able to meet and talk to Owens puppy handler. She was a college student, and she took him everywhere with her. She was very attached to Owen, but she was happy to see that he performed well enough to be paired with Lion Tommy.



Lion Tommy explained that the kennel can hold up to 400 dogs. They match around 250 dogs a year. Those dogs that do not perform at the highest level are placed in

other programs. Lion Tommy was told that at least 70% of the cost of breeding, training and placing the dogs comes from Lions clubs all over the country. He noted that the facility, personnel and training were of a superior quality. Most trainers are college graduates majoring in animal science. His trainer, Jamie, majored in animal psychology and animal science.

Lion Tommy brushes Owens coat with 2 different brushes, washes his face and brushes his teeth at least 2 times a day. (He noted that Owen really appeared to like the toothpaste, so he tasted it and agreed with Owen that the tooth paste tasted good.) Owen also gets a massage every day. Because Seeing Eye dogs are under stress when they are in service, they need this interaction to relax them and help them live a long and health life. Owen is feed dry Purina rice and lamb dog food once a day. He constantly monitors Owen's water in order to make sure that he has fresh water. Owen is given a different set of commands when he is in his working harness than when he is not working. When he is working, he cannot be petted by strangers or friends. This distracts him and may cause problems. When he is not in his harness, he can play and socialize.

Lion Tommy noted that Owen had already saved him from injury. He was walking to the post office with Owen and came to a point that he needed to cross the street. He gave Owen the move forward command, and Owen blocked his path. He listened and did not hear anything. He gave Owen the command, and again Owen refused. He was just about to give Owen a correction, when he saw a gray shapeless mass pass in front of them. Owen had been waiting on an electric vehicle of some kind to pass. After the danger was gone, he led Lion Tommy across the road.

We in Lion Tommy's club are grateful to the people at Leader Dog, 18E's Leader Dog representative and all the puppy handlers and lions across the United States for their service to low vision individuals. It is a privilege to have Lion Tommy and Owen as members of our club.

"Turkey" Dog Cookie

- 1 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cups whole wheat flour
  1 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cups biscuit mix
  1 package dry turkey gravy mix
- 2 teaspoons chicken bouillon granules
- 1 teaspoon garlic powder
- 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
- 1 egg
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cup milk

Place all ingredients in bowl of electric mixer. Mix well until stiff dough forms. Roll out on floured surface to ¼ to ½ inch thick. Cut with turkey shaped cookie cutter. Place in ungreased cookie sheet & bake for 30 minutes. Allow to dry thoroughly. For mix Layer all dry ingredients in 1 quart jar. Add directions. Attach turkey shaped cookie cutter to jar with ribbon.

### Information Technology News

Rick Mizell, PDG, Information Technologies Chairperson. At the USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum in Saskatoon, LCI Information Systems Manager, Lion Wayne McPherson made the following announcements.

Over the past Lions year the following improvements was made at LCI Headquarters in Oak Brook. The old computer network and telephone cabling has been replaced. The new telephone equipment has the capacity for Voice over Internet or VoIP. This will allow voice and video teleconference capabilities world wide, reducing the need for long distance travel. A new, higher capacity UPS (Battery Back up) unit was installed in the data center. This will allow all computer systems to remain operational during power outages. And a new Document Imaging System has been installed. All paper that is received by International is now being scanned and is stored on the network for easy retrieval

For the Lions year 2008-09, the following improvements have been approved; Upgrading or replacement of all computers at Oak Brook, upgrading of the financial system and upgrade of the membership system. The WMMR system will be upgraded as follows; Club officer update pages will be made more user friendly. District Governors will be able to define region and zones. Region and Zone chairpersons will be able to access membership data in their area. I.D. and passwords will be distributed by letter.

Cabinet and Club Treasurers will be able to view bills on-line and make E-Payments as well. This will reduce postage costs. Club Secretaries will be able to print Membership Cards on-line. A new WMMR web site for LEO Clubs will be on-line soon. Leo Club officers (not Lions) will be able to record and maintain Leo membership information. This system will allow LCI to have name information of Leos and track the progression of Leos who become Lions.
