

Although Braille is vital to all blind individuals, today only 10 percent of blind children in America are learning to read Braille in school. Braille literacy is the key to employment and full participation in society.

The NFB is raising awareness of this issue through a Braille literacy campaign, and the sale of a commemorative 2009 Louis Braille Bicentennial Silver Dollar. - **9,550** The number of grants by LCIF since it was founded in 1968. To date, LCIF has awarded grants totaling more than US\$680 million.
- **131,000,000** The number of doses of Mectizan distributed by LCIF to people in 15 countries around the world to treat and control river blindness.
- **53,000,000** The pounds of newspapers that did not end up in landfills because Lions in Prescott, Arizona rise before dawn to collect, sort and recycle newspapers from local residents. Lions in Prescott have been recycling newspapers for more than 30 years.

Fellow Lions:

Merry Christmas My Friend By James M. Schmidt, a Marine Lance Corporal stationed in Washington, D.C., in 1986

Twas the night before Christmas, he lived all alone, In a one bedroom house made of plaster & stone.

I had come down the chimney, with presents to give and to see just who in this home did live

As I looked all about, a strange sight I did see, no tinsel, no presents, not even a tree.

No stocking by the fire, just boots filled with sand.

On the wall hung pictures of a far distant land.

With medals and badges, awards of all kind, a sobering thought soon came to my mind. For this house was different, unlike any I'd seen. This was the home of a U.S. Marine.

I'd heard stories about them, I had to see more, so I walked down the hall and pushed open the door. And there he lay sleeping, silent, alone, Curled up on the floor in his one-bedroom home.

He seemed so gentle, his face so serene, Not how I pictured a U.S. Marine. Was this the hero, of whom I'd just read? Curled up in his poncho, a floor for his bed?

His head was clean-shaven, his weathered face tan. I soon understood, this was more than a man. For I realized the families that I saw that night, owed their lives to these men, who were willing to fight.

Soon around the Nation, the children would play, And grown-ups would celebrate on a bright Christmas day.

They all enjoyed freedom, each month and all year, because of Marines like this one lying here.

I couldn't help wonder how many lay alone, on a cold Christmas Eve, in a land far from home. Just the very thought brought a tear to my eye. I dropped to my knees and I started to cry.

He must have awoken, for I heard a rough voice, "Santa, don't cry, this life is my choice I fight for freedom, I don't ask for more.

My life is my God, my country, my Corps."

With that he rolled over, drifted off into sleep, I couldn't control it, I continued to weep. I watched him for hours, so silent and still. I noticed he shivered from the cold night's chill.

So I took off my jacket, the one made of red, and covered this Marine from his toes to his head. Then I put on his T-shirt of scarlet and gold, with an eagle, globe and anchor emblazoned so bold.

And although it barely fit me, I began to swell with pride,

and for one shining moment, I was Marine Corps deep inside.

I didn't want to leave him so quiet in the night, this guardian of honor so willing to fight.

But half asleep he rolled over, and in a voice clean and pure,

said "Carry on, Santa, its Christmas Day, all secure."

One look at my watch and I knew he was right, Merry Christmas my friend, Semper Fi and goodnight.

Dear Lion,

We are having an excellent start to our year, with a plus 4,080 membership growth for the first three months, compared to a minus 1,271 for the prior year. But what's even more exciting is that we are bringing Lionism to new areas and reaching out to new target markets.

Whether it's our new Lions club in northern Iraq, the 20 new clubs in China, or the increasing number of family, spouses and women at Lions, we are indeed working to MOVE TO GROW like never before. I am very proud of our early progress, and I owe thanks to you - the Club Leaders of the World - for your contributions to making it happen.



But while we have grown at the global level, the fact remains we are an organization of clubs. And we need to ensure that all our clubs, and all our Lion members, are being cared for, and nurtured, if we are to remain the world's largest and most effective service club organization in the years ahead.

The club is like the ginkgo tree which I adopted as the symbol of my MOVE TO GROW theme. Like the ginkgo, a club needs to be nurtured and cultivated to continue growing, it needs to stretch and move to receive sun light, and it needs to adapt to the environment around it to survive. This can also be true for clubs, especially older ones, where ways of working and meeting may have become routines, where activities and projects may have become a bit out dated, and where membership might have been going slowly down as a result.

But such challenges can be addressed, if you - the Club Leaders - create a plan and commit to action. Sometimes it's as simple as adopting a new project, or recruiting a few younger members to bring a spark of new ideas, or changing the format of your club meetings and activities to liven things up. So during the next three months, I'm humbly asking all clubs to adopt at least one new strategy to make your club even more vibrant.

And please, if you have seen more members leaving than joining in recent years, please get together with your board, or even hold a retreat with your club, to see if the reasons for this can be simply addressed. Please take note of tools outlined below that can help your club MOVE TO GROW.

What is Lions in Sight?

Most people know Lions very well for our work in sight, but too often we are not 'in sight' of the public. Some Lions even say we are a 'best kept secret'. So to increase our visibility, I have asked all clubs and districts worldwide to wareness events during the last two weeks of January 2010 in a special campaign called

The goal is very simple -- to raise public awareness to who we are and what we do.

To help you get ready, a special <u>Lions In Sight</u> section on our web site has suggested activities, promotional ideas, and helpful tools such as sample press releases, downloadable posters, newspaper ads, a new billboard advertisement, and other materials.

Global Membership Team Update

Communication, motivation and direction -GMT area leaders continue in their commitment to share information, energy, and focus with Lions leaders around the globe.

The District Governor Quarterly Membership Activity Report and the District Governor Quarterly Tracking Report will arrive in early October. These reports were developed to assist District Governors in assessing current membership status and to help guide decisions on whether to continue with current growth plans or rethink and reorganize for more positive results.

DGs should complete the report response pages and return them to the appropriate GMT leaders. Remember, GMT area leaders are here to help build on membership strengths, and to help identify challenges and areas of opportunity.

Club presidents and membership and retention chairpersons are encouraged to stay in close contact with district membership and retention chairs and district governor teams - sharing membership successes and concerns that can be passed on to the GMT.

Keeping GMT area leaders informed helps to bring your local picture into focus in a global organization and helps your voice to be heard.









It's easy - 3 steps is all it takes for a successful Lions In Sight event:

- 1. Tell the public about your club by placing an ad in the newspaper, putting club posters in shop windows or public places, or by issuing a press release to your local newspaper or television station.
- 2. Hold a community open house or set up a Lions information table at a public place where Lions can greet people and inform them about Lions activities and who we are.
- 3. Organize a project to which the public can be invited to see Lions in action and experience our kind of fun and service.

Above all, be creative and use your network of Lion friends to generate ideas for interesting events and winning promotions.

WHO IS YOUR LIONS CLUB RETENTION CHAIR?

Let me begin by providing everyone with a brief summary of the <u>Ugly MD-18 Retention Report</u> I provided our Council of Governor's last month. From July through October of this year we have lost 906 Lions in Georgia, which equates to losing 13.6% of the members we had at the start of the year. If this rate of loss continues we will lose over 40% of our members by year's end. Needless to say, the "boos" I heard were loud, but they will be getting louder and louder.

Secondly, I want to remind everyone that the <u>first MD-18 MERL Team retention action I discussed in last month's district bulletins is that clubs need to insure that <u>all new members receive Lions orientation training</u>. Clubs need to quickly make certain that new members understand what Lions and their clubs do if they want to retain them as volunteers. I also stated that I would be providing additional retention actions for clubs to adopt. When you read the State Lions Newspaper this month you will find new member orientation and eight more retention actions listed.</u>

As District 18-D's Retention Chair I presented the nine action items to one of our district zone meetings last month and discussed them with the Lion attendees. The discussion was very good! However, what I pointed out towards the end of the evening discussion is that I'm not certain how I can get clubs to implement these action item changes. Every Lions club is a volunteer club whose members independently decide what they are going to do. Therefore, my question is: Who is your Club Retention Chair?

If you log on to the LCI web site and open our Club Resource Center you will find detailed information covering a Three-Person Membership Committee. What is especially noteworthy about this committee is that all three members are to be elected by club members for three year terms and then their membership actions are to be annually evaluated by the Board of Directors to determine whether the members should be reelected. Personally, I was unaware of LCI's expectation that a club should have a Retention Chair, but my reading of the Club Retention Chairperson's Guide suggests that this leadership position could be very important in getting a club to begin to focus on membership retention and the action items I'm posting in the State Lions Newspaper. Accordingly, I'm going to ask you to please pass on my retention information to your club Retention Chair!

I'm sure that if we visit the local businesses in Cordele we can gain 20 to 30 new members for our Club. Before I started working with (Global Membership Team) and DG Clinton Holloway and Lion Jack Taylor, my goal was to see our Lions Club reach a membership of 100. That's no longer a goal. 

LCI Legal Division

The USA/Canada Forum had many terrific sessions, but the most informative was the one presented by LCI Legal Division. The presentation and discussion items were related to the most frequently asked questions that LCI Legal receives from clubs and Lions.

First, what Information does the legal division provide to Lions? Legal provides information on the LCI Program of Insurance, Constitution & By-Laws, Board Policy, Parliamentary Rules, Trademarks, Dispute Resolution, and Corporate Governance.

The majority of questions to the Legal Division concern forming a corporation, the use of funds, insurance, and trademarks. All of these are covered in depth on the LCI website/Member Resources/Legal Division. From the questions asked by the participants, I would say that funds are the No. 1 issue with most clubs. Here are some of the points covered:

- 1. Clubs are 501(c)4 according to tax laws. They are not charities. Any checks made payable to a club cannot be used as a charity deduction for tax purposes. If a club wishes to incorporate as a foundation or a 501(c) 3, then the checks would be payable to the foundation and would be a charity deduction. Of course, all funds collected by the foundation must be used for public projects/activities and cannot be used for the administrative purposes of the club.
- 2. Clubs must keep their funds separate. Clubs are to maintain an administrative account and a public projects/ activities account. The administrative account receives all dues, rental fees of buildings, fines, advertisements in Lions newsletters etc. These funds may be used for the administrative expenses of the club or public projects/activities. The Activities Account receives any funds collected from the public, public contributions, and fundraising events open to the public. These funds must be used for public projects only. They cannot be used for conventions, trips, expenses of the club, or dues.

The other area of discussion was insurance. LCI provides a general liability policy to all Lions Clubs. It contains \$1 million liability coverage for bodily injury and/or property damage per occurrence; \$2 million aggregate liability coverage; and \$1,000 limited medical expense. This policy pays to a third party providing the Lions Club is negligent. The policy excludes employment related liability, automobiles owned by a named insured, watercraft and aircraft, pollution and asbestos, and liquor liability. LCI also recommends that clubs do not engage in hazardous activities such as dunk tanks, carnivals, circuses, rodeos, amusement rides, races, rock concerts, fireworks displays, tractor pulls, demolition projects, and swimming pools. Would you believe that the No. 1 claim reason occurs at bingo games? Seems people get excited when they win and have accidents. If you contract to have a company do an event in the name of your club, you should ensure that your club is included on their general liability policy.

For more information on the use of the Lions logo and name, creating your own foundation, or detailed information on funds and insurance, check out the LCI website.

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General Electric

General Electric has a policy of matching some donations to non-profit organizations for most of their employees and retirees. The camp has been approved by General Electric and I have the information on how to handle this.

Leader Dog is proud to be a 2009 recipient of the Alfred P. Sloan Award for Business Excellence in Workplace Flexibility. This prestigious award recognizes employers across the country that are successfully using flexibility to meet both business and employee goals.

Applicants are measured against national data from the Families and Work Institute's National Study of Employers in the areas of workplace flexibility programs, policies and culture. Those ranking in the top 20% become finalists and an extensive survey on the organizations practices is sent to all employees. Winners are chosen based on a combined score of both employer and employee survey responses.

Finn proved himself to be fearless and sportsmanlike as he learned that soccer balls on the field

weren't for him. "My favorite part," says Finn's human brother Andrew "was coming home. He'd be there wagging that tail like a flag."

Janet knew that Finn's real potential outweighs how much her family will miss him. "He's going on to bigger and better things," she states confidently. And he is. Finn moved into the training program, and a more disciplined lifestyle. Instructor Linda Fisher trained Finn, and says that guide work is his true calling. "He wants to be out with people, conquering the world," she says.

Over 70 years of respecting people and dogs, these are our values. We believe everyone deserves the opportunity for success, a second chance and the precious gifts of freedom and mobility. "He can retrieve my phone and other dropped items, pull my wheelchair and open doors for me," she continues.

Wallis has a condition known as dystonia, a disease that causes her muscles to spasm spontaneously. She was at the pharmacy when a "dystonic attack" came on and she could not move. Caspin helped her pay the cashier, get the bag from the cashier and gracefully exit the store.

Wallis wanted to learn more about a career in the assistance dog world, and is currently participating in a summer internship at Canine Companions headquarters in Santa Rosa, CA.

Robin knew an assistance dog would help her son Braden, challenged with autism. She contacted several organizations who expected her to do a great deal of fundraising before receiving a dog.

"I had basically given up hope, then I learned that Canine Companions for Independence was training dogs for autistic children," says Robin.

In May 2007 Robin and Braden graduated from Team Training with Skilled Companion Camille, free of charge and free of fundraising. Since then, Camille has changed Braden's life.

"Braden is much more social, calmer in public, and is developing empathy," Robin continues. "Camille gives Braden acceptance and love, without expecting him to be like everyone else."

Diabetes on the Rise in U.S

A new Gallup-Healthways Well-Being Index survey found that cases of diabetes are rapidly increasing in the United States, with the disease now affecting 11.3 percent of U.S. adults, up from 10.4 percent in the first quarter of 2008.

The survey found that approximately 26 million people in the U.S. have diabetes, and if the trend continues more than 37 million people will be living with the disease by the end of 2015. The survey also found that the U.S. obesity rate is up about 1 percent over last year. People who are obese are almost three times as likely to be diagnosed with diabetes than those who are not obese, according to the survey. "The upward trends in obesity rates almost certainly play a substantive role in the increase in diabetes rates over the same time period," the survey's report says.

Between January and September 2009, the Gallup-Healthways survey also found a significantly higher incidence of diabetes among those who did not exercise at least a half hour on any given day in the previous week. The survey found that 8 percent of people with diabetes exercised at least 30 minutes a day four to six times per week, 9.5 percent exercised at least half an hour daily in the previous week, and 15 percent did not exercise at least 30 minutes in the week before they were surveyed. The 10 states with the highest increases in obesity from 2008 to 2009 also had a related 0.5 percent increase in diabetes incidence.

Diabetes Drug Helps Obese Adults Lose Weight

Obese adults may shed more weight with the diabetes drug liraglutide than with the weight-loss drug orlistat (Xenical, Alli), suggests a study in The Lancet this week. The finding that liraglutide was superior to orlistat was "unexpected," Dr. Arne Astrup, from the University of Copenhagen, Denmark, told Reuters Health.

Until now, liraglutide has only been tested for its blood sugarlowering abilities in people with type 2 diabetes. "This is the first state of the art trial to test its weight loss properties" in obese adults without diabetes, Astrup said.

The biggest findings with liraglutide, Astrup said, were the "clear-cut" dose-response relationship with weight loss (the higher the dose, the greater the weight loss), "the nice reduction in blood pressure, and the "cure" of patients with "pre-diabetes" - that is, poor blood sugar control not yet bad enough to qualify as diabetes.

In the study, 564 obese adults without diabetes were randomly assigned to receive liraglutide at one of four doses (1.2, 1.8, 2.4, or 3.0 milligrams), placebo, or orlistat (120 milligrams). Liraglutide and placebo were given once daily as an injection, while orlistat was given three times a day in pill form.

All participants in the study increased their physical activity throughout the trial and followed a calorie-restricted diet, which contained approximately 500 calories less than they needed each day.

People who took liraglutide lost significantly more weight than people who took placebo or orlistat, Astrup and colleagues found. Liraglutide contains a satiety hormone that helps curb appetite. Average weight loss with the lowest liraglutide dose (1.2 mg) was 4.8 kilograms (10.6 pounds); with 1.8 mg liraglutide, subjects lost an average of 5.5 kg (12.1 pounds); with 2.4 and 3.0 mg liraglutide, subjects lost an average of 6.3 kg (13.9 pounds) and 7.2 kg (15.8 pounds), respectively.

This compares with an average weight loss of only 2.8 kg (6.2 pounds) with placebo and 4.1 kg (9 pounds) with orlistat. Moreover, 76 percent of subjects taking the highest dose of liraglutide lost more than 5 percent of their body weight compared with only 30 percent on placebo and 44 percent on orlistat. Liraglutide also lowered blood pressure at all doses.

At the start of the study, about a third of subjects in each group were considered "pre-diabetic." At the higher doses, liraglutide cut the number of pre-diabetics significantly -- by 84 to 96 percent. Nausea and vomiting were reported more often with liraglutide than with placebo, but side effects were usually transient and seldom led to discontinuation of treatment.

Astrup, who is a member of the Liraglutide Obesity Advisory Board of Novo Nordisk, the company developing the drug, noted that "liraglutide has to pass phase III trials before it can reach the market in the coming years. However, the drug is available for the treatment of type 2 diabetes in Europe."

Dr. George A. Bray, from Louisiana State University, Baton Rouge, comments in a related editorial: "Whether long-term use of an injectable drug is palatable as a treatment for obesity is yet to be established."

Welcome to Liberty Day!

Liberty Day is a program for our youth. It is a way to strength citizenship in our youth through a program based on the Constitution of the United States.

This is a program started by the Lions Clubs of Denver. Georgia adopted this program in the late 1990s. There are several ways a Lions Club can sponsor a Liberty Day program.

The first way is through a school program. Lions Clubs should arrange a speaker who would be interesting to the students. This speaker could be an elected official or someone who could speak on the rights and responsibilities of citizens as granted by the Constitution. Once you have your speaker, you can receive permission of the school system to sponsor a Liberty Day event to a class or a group of students. I have found that 8th grade and up is ideal. Then order the number of Liberty Day booklets you need from me. The cost is \$.60 each and includes shipping. Also work with the teacher(s) so that they reinforce what the speaker has said through an essay or other classroom work. The students could even write a letter of thanks to the speaker/Lions Club on the subject.

Another project is with a Boy Scout troop. Boy Scouts must earn the Citizenship in the Nation merit badge as a requirement for rank promotion. Again, use the speaker and the booklets. The Liberty Day project has been endorsed by the National Council of the Boy Scouts of America. A third project is when a group of youth work a project in a public place to promote the Constitution. There are a series of questions that they can use. They would ask an adult the question--whether it is right or wrong, the adult receives either a flag pin or flag sticker. The booklets are used to coach the youth on the Constitution so that they are more confident in asking the questions as they know the answers themselves. They should work under the guidance of adults and in a place that has given permission for them to be there.
